The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

Prof. Milford White reported on behalf of the ~~Bulletin of com.~~ having in charge the issuing of a summer school bulletin, reported that the committee had elected Prof. Davis editor of the bulletin, and that it would soon be issued.

On account of the absence of Prof. J. C. White it was deemed best to defer the discussion of the proposed changes in the Scientific course until he could be present, and the meeting therefore adjourned.

Discipline</sup> Mr. W. H. Durham appeared before the faculty on the charge of disobedience of orders given by Prof. Wernicke, having previously appeared before the Board of Discipline, which Board had recommended to the Faculty that Mr. Durham be suspended until examination work.

Prof. Wernicke stated that he was greatly disturbed in his class work by loud noises in the chapel at the second hour.

Prof Wernicke went to the chapel, found the man who was causing the disturbance and who ceased at his request.

Upon his return to his room, the voices were resumed. He went to the chapel again and ordered everybody to leave the room.

This order was complied with after some hesitation by all except Mr. Durham, who ^{Ente}

W.H.Durham declined to leave or to give his name to Prof Wernicke. Prof Wernicke therefore remained by Mr. Durham until Mrs. Patterson arrived and identified him (Durham). Prof Wernicke asserted ^{but he refused} that he ordered Mr. Durham to go to Mrs. Patterson with him.

Mr. Durham stated to the faculty that he was in the chapel at the time referred to, because his class had been dismissed by Prof. Neville, and attendance at chapel was the college duty next in order. He had made no disturbance and declined to leave the room because he considered it his right and duty to be there. He admitted having refused to give his name to Prof. Wernicke.

A discussion relative to the penalty to be inflicted showed considerable diversity of opinion and resulted in several votes upon various propositions, a compromise being at length effected by a vote to suspend Mr. Durham until Apr. 15th. votes recorded as follows.

Upon motion it was ordered that a committee be appointed to arrange for such entertainment of the ^{four days} Educational Conference, at the college as may be deemed expedient. Mrs. Patterson appointed ^{Prof. Brooks, chairman} Maj. Burtt (chairman) Prof McKenzie, Palmer, and James G. White.

Upon motion adjourned.
