WASHINGTON, February 13.—Secretary Lincoln has acted with great promptness and efficiency in the matter of distributing relief money, provisions and clothing. He did not receive the signed bill till 5:30 P.M. yesterday. But in advance of getting it, in order to have the work under way, he sent the following telegram to each of the addresses hereinafter named, generally the Mayors of the respective towns, the amounts set opposite being filled in the blank:

WAR DEPARTMENT,
WASHINGTON, D. C., February 12, 1884.]

To the Mayor of ——:

You are authorized to purchase and distribute subsistence stores, clothing, and other necessary articles to persons made destitute by the floods, within your reach, to an amount not exceeding \$—. Careful records of purchases should be kept, to enable the Department officer to adjust accounts when he can be sent. You will be expected to give the officer your receipt for the stores, and act as agent of this Department for their distribution. Please advise me by wire the number of destitute, and whether purchases can be made in your locality.

LINCOLN.

To the following Mayors: Marietta, Ohio, (for Marietta, Harmar and vicinity), \$2,000; Point Pleasant, W. Va., \$500; Guyandotte, W. Va., \$500; Mason City, W.
