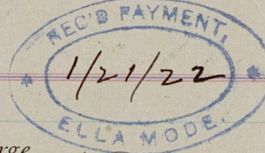

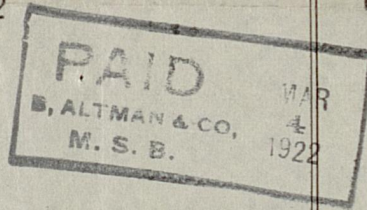

LAST WILL AND TESTAMENT
AND TWO CODICILS

OF

MARGARET A. MEANS.

[NOTE: Miss Means died December 31st, 1921. The following Will and Codicils were admitted to probate as a will of real and personal property by the Surrogates' Court of the County of New York on the 7th day of April, 1922, and Letters Testamentary thereon were granted to the United States Trust Company of New York on the 7th day of April, 1922.]

I, Margaret A. Means, of New York City, New York, being of sound mind and disposing memory, do make and publish this, my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills and codicils by me at any time made.

First: I nominate and appoint the United States Trust Company of New York executor of this will, should I reside and be domiciled, at the time of my death, in said City of New York.

Second: I will and direct that all just debts and claims against me, and my funeral expenses, and the expenses of administration upon my estate, be paid, by my executor, out of my estate.

Third: I will and direct, that no appraisement or sale be made of any of the jewelry or of any of the clothing belonging to me at my death, and I give and bequeath all of same in kind to my three nieces, daughters of my brother, John Means, viz: Eliza I. Seaton, Lilly Maynard, and Rose Means Bullard, the survivors, or survivor, of them and the issue surviving me of any of them deceased at my death, to be divided equally among them by

the executor of this will upon such valuations by my nephews, Ellison C. Means and Thomas M. Adams, or the survivor of them, as they, or such survivor, deem just and equitable, such issue of any of them deceased to take the share that the decedent would have taken if living. But, if said Ellison C. Means and Thomas M. Adams, decline to act as such appraisers, or if I survive both of them, then such appraisement shall be made by the said three daughters of John Means, the survivors, or survivor, of them.

Fourth: I will and direct that no appraisement or sale be made of any of the household goods and furniture, books, pictures, clocks, carriages, harness, horses, cattle, or other property of any kind, used in, or about, the premises where I shall reside at the time of my death, (said property of any kind not to include said jewelry and clothing) and I give all of same in kind to my five nephews, Thomas M. Adams, Thomas H. Means, Harold Means, Ellison C. Means, and Thomas M. Culbertson, the survivors, or survivor, of them and the issue surviving me of any of them deceased at my death, to be divided equally among them by said executor upon valuations such as said Ellison C. Means and Thomas M. Adams, or the survivor of them shall deem just and equitable, such issue of any of them deceased to take the share that the decedent would have taken if living.

Fifth: I give, bequeath, and devise, all the residue and remainder of all my estate, personal, real and mixed, wherever located or situated, of which I shall die possessed, or in any manner entitled, to be equally divided among my brother, John Means, and my nephews, Thomas M. Adams, and Thomas M. Culbertson, the survivors, or survivor of them, and the issue surviving me of any of

them deceased at my death, to have and to hold absolutely and in fee simple, such issue of any of them deceased to take the share that the decedent would have taken if living.

Sixth: By a will executed by me, August 16th, 1890, I gave to my brother William Means, and his issue one fourth part of my estate. But, by this will I give him nothing, for the following reasons: On, or about, February 8th, 1897, the United States Circuit Court of Appeals for the Sixth Circuit, in case No. 367, Cowen et al, trustee, &c—vs. Adams and Means, Admrs, et al, construed that the fifth clause of my Father's will converted about \$136,000—and interest, that said William Means owed my father at his death, into a gift to said William Means, which construction I know is contrary to my Father's actual intention. By that construction, said William Means and those claiming under him will, probably, receive from my Father's estate a much greater sum than otherwise they would have received, said sum that will, probably, go to Wm. Means above the amount that my Father intended him and those claiming under him to receive by his will, is probably, nearly as large as, or, perhaps, larger than, one fourth of my present holdings. Also, said William Means is now indebted to me in the sum of about \$32,000.00 which he is not likely to pay. And said suit has entailed upon the Administrators of my Father's will large expenditures for costs and expenses, the greater part of which will, ultimately, fall upon the legatees under this will. I, therefore, deem it just not to make said William Means and his issue, legatees under this will.

Seventh: No legatee^s or devise^es under this will has ever talked with me as to how I ^{sh}ould dispose of all or any part of my estate by will or other-

wise. Nor have they or any of them ever tried in any way to influence me as to the disposition of all or any part of my estate by will or otherwise. The disposition of my estate herein made is my own voluntary act, not suggested by, and not influenced by, any persons, or person, whomsoever.

Eighth: I will and direct that any and all moneys and property, personal, real, and mixed, that at any time becomes vested in any female under and by virtue of this will, wherever she may be domiciled, shall be, and all proceeds, and issues, and income, thereof, remain, her sole and separate property for her own separate use, and free from the control or interference of any husband she may at any time have.

Ninth: Wherever the word issue is used in this will I desire that it be construed to mean lawful issue.

Tenth: My brother, John Means, during most of the time since I became eighteen years of age, has attended to the greater part of my business as my agent, and I have approved and ratified all his acts in the premises. He has settled with me, accounted to me, and turned over to me all moneys, properties, securities, and assets, of mine of every kind and description, and is not indebted to me in any sum, nor has he in his possession any property, or assets of mine of any kind.

Eleventh: If my domicil, at my death, should not be in New York City, then, I hereby nominate and appoint my said nephews, Thomas M. Adams and Ellison C. Means, or the survivor of them, executors, or executor, of this will, provided, I shall, at my death, be domiciled in a state where they, or the survivor of them, can lawfully so act. But, should either of them decline to act, or be incapacitated by law, or for any reason not act as

such executor, then I desire that the other of them act as sole executor of this will, provided he shall not be incapacitated or decline so to act. But should I survive both of them, or should both decline to act, or should both be incapacitated for any reason, then, I desire the proper court upon the nomination in writing of a majority of my said brother, John Means, my said three nieces, his daughters, and my said five nephews, who may then be living, to appoint a proper person to execute this will; who when appointed and duly qualified shall be vested with, and be subject to, all the powers, rights, duties, authority, responsibility, and liability, as said named executors, or executor, would be, should they or either of them, act as such executors, or executor, of this will.

Twelfth: I hereby authorize and empower the executors, or executor, of this will, to compromise, adjust, discharge, in such manner as they, he, or it, deem proper, and advantageous to my estate, the debts and claims due me, and to settle my accounts and affairs, and if they, he, or it, deem it most advantageous for my estate, to sell, by private sale, or in such manner, upon such terms of credit, or otherwise, as they, he, or it, deem proper, all or any part of the personal property of my estate, other than that mentioned in clauses Third, and Fourth, of this will, and deliver same, and receipt for moneys paid, or accounted for, to my estate by purchasers or others, who shall be exonerated by such receipts from all liability in respect to the application of the money. any or all of the legatees under this will according to their respective shares, including any legatees who may be such executors, or executor, at such valuations as such executors, or executor, deem just and equitable, and I desire that the divisions and distributions in this will provided for be made from time to time as soon and as rapidly after my death as reasonably practicable, so that no large sum of money will unnecessarily be idle for a long period of time. And I will and direct that no final settlement of my estate can in any event be required before three years after my decease.

Fourteenth: This will is written on two sheets of legal cap and on six pages thereof, and is signed by me on on 5th line of the seventh page, and by the witnesses on the seventh page. In testimony hereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this 3rd day of May, in the year of our Lord, 1897.

First: If at the time of my death there shall be living with me a house maid who shall have been in my employ for five, or eight, years, or more, last before my death, I hereby will and direct that the executor or executors of my said will shall pay her five hundred dollars if she shall have been in my employ for the last five years before my death; but shall pay her one thousand dollars if she shall have been in my employ for the last eight, or more years before my death, as a reward in addition to her wages for faithful services; and if at the time of my death there shall be living with me a cook who shall have been in my employ for five, eight, or more years, last before my death, then I hereby will and direct that the executor, or executors of my will aforesaid shall pay her five hundred dollars if she shall have been in my employ for the last five years before my death, but if she shall have been in my employ for the last eight or more years before my death then I will and direct that my said executor or executors shall pay her one thousand dollars, as a reward in addition to her wages for faithful services.

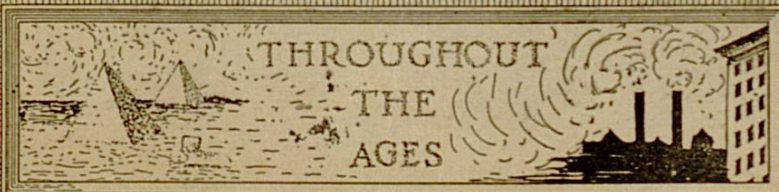

PIPE BUYING ACTIVE

It has been a long time since the volume of business in cast iron pipe has been as large proportionately during the winter as the present season. In view of dull business conditions in other lines, cast iron pipe is a bright spot.

It is believed this is due to the fact that pipe makers have done everything possible during the past year to hasten their own readjustment from war conditions. They have followed the practice of taking the initiative in reducing prices to meet public sentiment and thus compelling to a certain extent corresponding readjustments in their raw material requirements. The result has been that this winter pipe buyers began to realize that at last the thing they had been waiting for—normal prices—had arrived. Believing the spring buying season would develop business to such an extent as to delay deliveries, the trade therefore has transacted more winter business than is customary. It looks now like 1922 will be one of the biggest cast iron pipe years in a decade.

In the annual review of cast iron pipe for 1921, the *Iron Age* in its issue of January 5, 1922, states in part as follows:

"At the first of the year (1921) we reported that: 'Business has fallen very flat. Plants with old orders are running at perhaps 25 per cent capacity; other plants are shut down completely. Buyers of pipe are waiting for pig iron market to become stabilized.' About the first of February many of the shut-down

Surely, the question need not be argued. The user is concerned in the maker. Things affecting the maker affect the product and so likewise affect the user. Therefore, we believe the users of cast iron pipe to be interested in some data just compiled for the year 1921 showing the stability of Acipco's pipe making organization.

Out of a shop working force last year of 1103 men, 1001 men had been with this Company a year or more. And 301 of those men worked through the year 1921 with a loss of 4 days or less during the year, from all causes, including sickness. Approximately 15 per cent, or 161 of these men to be exact, actually worked every day of the year which the shop was in operation.

Those figures reveal a situation that has a bearing on every pound of cast iron pipe ship-

ped out of this plant. A steady workman is reliable and efficient. He is personally interested in his job and in doing his work right or he would not remain in the same employment. Pipe, or any other product, made under such conditions is more than just so much pipe. It becomes the handiwork of craftsmen and worthy of consideration for what it really is.

The percentage of workmen with one or more years service record has grown in our plant as follows in the past ten years:

This record counted against a man any absence by reason of illness, vacation or anything except injury due to accident while at work in our plant.

RAILROAD EARNINGS 3.4 PER CENT

In past issues we have had something to say about railroad freight rates. We believe they should be reduced.

We have just seen a news report that the estimated net operating income of American railroads in 1921 is 3.4% and that when reports from all the carriers are in, the net income will be 4% and probably more.

This is small. We believe investments are entitled to a larger earning capacity on their real value. But is it small, in view of the railroads "watered" stock, and is it small for 1921? In this same year the great majority of industries not only failed to make a net income, but piled up a deficit. The point we would make is that in the face of the most disastrous year probably American business has ever known, American railroads made a net operating income of approximately 4% on their valuation,—they made much more probably on the actual money invested.

By coincidence, the same issue of the newspaper announcing railroad earnings, reported a deficit of Morris and Company, meat packers, of \$5,063,506 for 1921. A big Chicago mail order house was recently reported to have a deficit of nine million dollars. Lumber men say 50% of the present consumer cost of lumber is cost of freight. As we have stated before, often 50% of consumer cost of cast iron pipe is freight.

The railroads can not be criticised simply for making money. But they should be criti-

cised for making money when the very industries upon which their life depends are losing money. We hear much these days of industry's dependence on the railroads. It is true. But there is another side to the question—the railroads are also dependent upon industry.

After all, the thing is a matter of balance. Neither railroads nor industry can continue to profit at the expense of each other. We would not minimize the trouble of the railroads. We know they exist. But we refuse to accept them as an excuse for the high freight rates about which the Interstate Commerce Commission is now gathering evidence.

The testimony of Clyde M. Reed, chairman of the Kansas public service commission, is reported from Washington by the New York Journal of Commerce as follows:

"Backing up his contention about the comparatively good condition of American railroads, he said the business failures in 1921 numbered 19,982, a larger number than was to be found in any year of the country's history, the total liabilities being \$750,200,000. That sum was double the liabilities of any prior year, save one. In the face of the most disastrous year American business ever knew, he remarked, there were fewer miles of railroad in hands of receivers than in any year since 1912 and less than half of 1915, 1916 or 1917.

"One-fourth of all flotations in 1921, he said, were made by railroads and at a lower rate of interest than industrials or public utility concerns, and the decline in railroad securities, he said, was not greater than the decline in Government bonds.

"As to capital needs, he said their maturing obligations for the three coming years would aggregate \$207,000,000, as against \$302,000,000 in 1921 alone. In other words, their heavy burdens have been shifted so they will need to do less financing in the current and two following years than they did in 1921."

The report of railroad earnings is as follows:

(Washington Bureau of The Journal of Commerce.)

Washington, Feb. 5.—The American railroads, valued at \$18,599,000,000, will show a net operating income of 3.4 per cent for the calendar year 1921, according to the latest reports.

Returns from 136 class 1 carriers for December show net earnings of \$42,399,466. These same railroads during December of the previous year recorded a deficit of \$3,427,000. When the reports from all the carriers are in for the last month of 1921 it is expected that the net operating income will be not in excess of \$50,000,000.

The lines in the Eastern district show a 991 per cent increase over the last month of 1920.

ARSENAL BUYS PIPE

The United States Government has awarded contracts for installation of cast iron pipe at Raritan Arsenal, Metuchen, New Jersey, on specifications reading in part as follows:

No. 1. Description of work.

"A contractor shall furnish all labor and all material except that listed in paragraph No. 2 entitled "Material furnished by the Government," required in the disconnecting and removing 4", 6", and 8" wood pipe line located along the lines shown in drawing 6190-160, the wood water mains to be replaced with cast iron pipe, including removal of valves and specials unsuited for connection with cast iron mains and fire hydrants as shown, and to furnish all materials and labor for laying approximately 1100' 4", 5000' 6", 5200' 8", cast iron class "B" water pipe, also the furnishing of the following material: 11 valves and 11 valve boxes listed, also 81 cast iron fittings as shown on drawing No. 6190-160 and described in these specifications pages 1 to 13 inclusive

"(C) The contractor shall have the right to use all cast iron fittings, valves, valve boxes, cast iron pipe and hydrants which are located on existing line to be replaced, provided they are in good condition and can be used in connection with the new cast iron pipe line."

plants have reopened. Operations continued in increasing volume and at the middle of April we reported that 'Pipe is the one commodity in the iron and steel industry for which there is a full-fledged demand.' In December the demand was still considerable, being greater than normal for that season of the year.

"Present momentum will carry the buying movement well into 1922. Many pipe laying jobs are being planned for the spring. At the close of the year, the oil companies, liberal purchasers but for some time dormant, came into the market again for flanged pipe and will continue in 1922. To keep pace with the building movement water systems will be extended; smaller pipe will have to be replaced with larger sizes; municipalities that postponed purchases will finally close. The year ahead appears promising."

The gas pipe listed above is in accordance with the specifications of the American Gas Institute as to weights and thickness.

Standard and Heavy are used for water service. It will be noted that the metal thicknesses shown in these two classes are the same as in the first two classes of the American Water Works Association specifications, but the weights per foot are slightly less. This is accounted for by the fact that this pipe is 16 feet long and the weight of the bells is spread over a greater number of feet. Section for section, the weights are the same.

We recommend Standard up to 200 feet head or 86 pounds pressure, and Heavy up to 300 feet head or 130 pounds pressure.

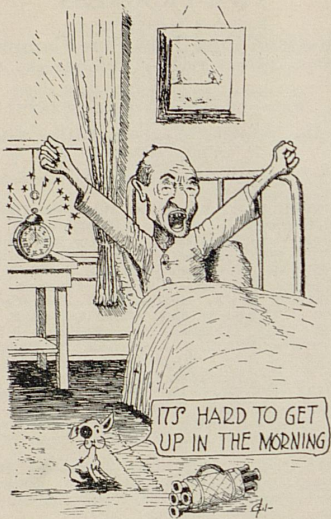



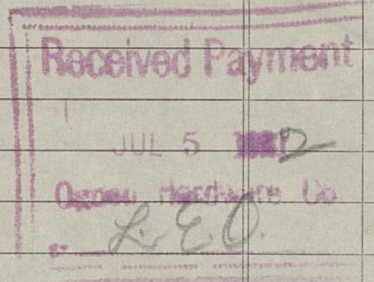

Denominations \$1,000.00.

Said bonds bearing date, January 15th, 1921 and at four and three quarter per cent (4 $\frac{3}{4}$ per cent) interest per annum, payable semi-annually on January 15th and July 15th, of each year. The July 15th, 1922 and earlier coupons omitted. Said Bonds will mature as follows:

\$10,000.00—January 15th, 1957

\$20,000.00—January 15th, each year 1958, 1959, 1960 and 1961

The interest will be payable at First National Bank, Cincinnati, Ohio, unless the purchaser of the entire offering desires the payment of interest in Chicago or New York at a Bank mutually agreed upon. No bid of less than par and accrued interest to date of delivery of bonds can be accepted.

Delivery of and payment in full for bonds will be November 1st, 1922.

Certified check for 2 per cent of the bonds bid for must accompany bids, such check to be payable to the Mayor of the City of Ashland, Kentucky. Checks of unsuccessful bidders will be returned upon the award of the bonds. No interest will be allowed upon the amount of the check of a successful bidder and such check will be retained, to be applied in part payment for the bonds or to secure the City against any loss resulting from the failure of the bidder to comply with the terms of his bid.

Address all bids to Board of Water Commissioners, Ashland, Ky.

The Commissioners reserve the right to reject any or all bids and readvertise the bonds or any portion of the same remaining unsold.

An election was held November 2nd, 1920 when bonds in the amount of \$250,000.00 were approved by more than two-thirds of the votes cast for or against their issue. The other \$160,000.00 so approved were sold September 29th, 1921 and the proceeds expended in constructing a complete filter plant, a second reservoir, mains, meters, etc. Their legality having been approved by Squire, Sanders and Dempsey, Attorneys, Cleveland, Ohio.

The population of Ashland, Kentucky, as per Federal Census of 1920 was 14,729 and is now more than 20,000 by reason of normal growth and by the extension of the City limits.

Taxable by the City of Ashland the assessed valuation of real estate and personal property in 1921 was \$17,585,000.00. The actual true valuation of real estate, personal property, raw materials machinery, etc. subject to taxation by the State of Kentucky is estimated at \$35,000,000.00 or more.

The purpose of the present issue of bonds is to provide for additional mains, meters, etc., to meet the needs of a rapidly growing City.

As of July 1st, 1922 including present issue of \$90,000.00 Water bonds, Ashland had outstanding:

Water Bonds	\$696,000.00
School Bonds	185,000.00
Floating Indebtedness (Jan 1, 1922)	162,536.96
Sinking fund for Water Bonds	32,652.15

The City has never defaulted on interest or principal or its bonds issued for municipal purposes.

The City Council levies annually for sinking funds and interest for Water Bonds. The earnings of the Water Works for the forty four months following the purchase of the Water mains (Nov. 1st, 1918) have been more than sufficient to meet the interest on all Water Bonds outstanding and for proper depreciation and replacement charges.

5 per cent outstanding School bonds are retired annually by payment in full. The School property owned by the City of Ashland has cost \$428,751.89 for present buildings and sites. The High School completed in 1918, is a modern brick building erected and equipped at a cost of \$166,189.91. Two school buildings of up to date design are now in process of construction at a total cost of \$250,000.00.

Central Park, owned by the City, contains 45 acres, is situated in the beautiful residential district and is worth \$500,000.00. The City Hall, Fire Houses and land may be valued at \$50,000. The Park, City Hall, Fire Houses and land are paid for in full.

Ashland has 26 miles of paved streets and 4 miles of paved alleys. The paving has been charged to the abutting property; all the cost thereof and the interest being payable in ten (10) annual installments with privilege of anticipating, a lien being given on the abutting property to secure payment of bonds. The City being chargeable only where it owned abutting property or where the value of the abutting property is less than double the cost of paving and then only for its proportionate share. Since April 1904 more than \$1,000,000.00 of such bonds have been sold and only \$110,500.00 are outstanding of which none are past due.

The first sale of town lots was in 1854. Ashland is now a City of Third Class, Kentucky Statutes and its rapidly increasing population will soon permit it being made a City of the Second Class. It is known as the "Park City" and is famed for well paved streets, lined with beautiful trees, its excellent schools, great manufacturing plants, fine homes and general prosperity. It is at the gate way of the coal region of the Chesapeake & Ohio and Northfolk & Western Railways. A large proportion of its working people are members of local building and loan associations and own their homes. It passed through the great war without a serious strike largely because of its home owning population.

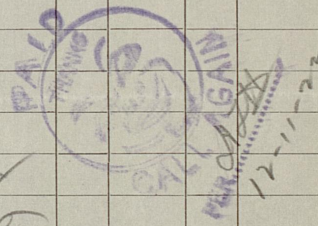

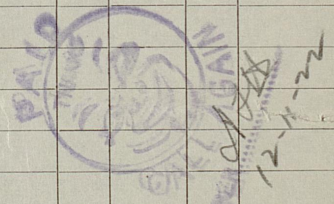
