might and get a horse and return back to the
North Park Handle. There is plenty of sections
here that has been filed on but they have
failed to make any improvements and many are
out of the Co and some are out of the State
you see we can get rights on them and file
and send the 1st payment and papers to Austin
and we might have a little suit but there is
many according to the records in the county
that are taken that way (for non-residence)
you see if one takes 4 sections he must
settle on one known as a resident section and
the other 3 known as additional sections. And if I
should take up the one it would be all I could
take as all others around it is taken up. Now I
would advise you to put some on in your
office soon and come out here as I think
we will have no trouble in getting 4 sections
apiece. But we must act soon. But you might
wait a few days yet and am going to write to
P. at once and get him out there soon. Now
if you come you can be away 6 months out
of the year but that is all for 3 years
this is a golden opportunity and we all
should take advantage of it. But don't come
yet I will make more discoveries soon. The land
in Sherman Co is as good as any on the plains.
Hunt to go from 150 to 250 ft for water. This Co is
west of the new settled Okla. Terr. Over 100 mile
from T.H.'s place. It will cost us only \$16⁰⁰ per

I'll be in your way. Make a hurry
