The Chairman reported that colleges had reported failures by other colleges to comply with the Rules of the University Senate governing final examinations; that final examinations are set by the Calendar which means that they cannot be offered at times other than scheduled by the Calendar unless approval is received from the department chairman, dean of the college, and the Registrar; also that final examinations are to be given in all courses except special types of courses where a final examination would not be appropriate. He stated further that the number of infractions increases each year and that the Senate Council was asking the Rules Committee to reconsider the Rule for pedagogical reasons.

He also reported that the Senate Council would be studying the calendar policy of the University during the ensuing summer months as provided for in the Rules of the University Senate and anyone wishing to make any suggestions concerning calendar policy should get in touch with the Senate Council office.

The Senate approved a waiver of the Rules governing the ten-day circulation requirement so that it might consider the proposed 1974-75 academic Calendars for the University at large and the College of Law which had been circulated to the faculty under date of May 1, 1972. The Senate approved a waiver of the ten-day circulation rule in order to consider the Summary of Annual Reports of Senate Committees (circulated to the faculty under date of April 28, 1972).

After reminding the Senate that the Senate Council, in its circulation, had recommended acceptance of the Reports, the Chairman called on Dr. Adelstein to present a further report with the recommendation of the Senate Council.

Dr. Adelstein stated that he wished to present two motions. On behalf of the Senate Council he recommended acceptance of the annual Committee Reports with adoption of the full texts of these Reports to be included in the "book" minutes maintained in the Registrar's Office.

The Parliamentarian pointed out that this acceptance means that the Senate is bound by everything contained in the Reports that go in the book minutes; but that "receiving" these Reports would not carry such connotation. The Chairman stated that this was the intent on which the Council was operating, that of receiving the reports. The Senate then voted to receive the Annual Reports of the Senate Committees for inclusion in the book minutes in the Office of the Registrar.

#### RULES COMMITTEE

The subjects considered by the Rules Committee ranged widely from changes in the Rules on how to get into the University to how to get out of it - from how to be elected to the Senate to how to find out what the Senate will do - or did; from how to change a grade to how to change the calendar.

We met frequently, almost weekly in recent months, and voted energetically on such significant matters as the Senate Council forwarded to us. We have brought our results to the Senate floor with uneven results, but occasional rebuffs never dimmed our energy or ambition. We did not finish every item on our agenda, and so we promise more excitement for Senate meetings next fall, should you deem it wise to renew our option.

## LIBRARY COMMITTEE

Your Standing Library Committee has met five times during the present academic year to consider various problems and concerns of the University libraries. As a result of three of the earlier meetings, your Committee submitted an interim report to the Senate on February 14 and presented a resolution which was passed. This Resolution commended the University Administration for providing the addition to the Margaret I. King Library and then requested that regular adjustments be made in library appropriations consistent with the growth of the University to assure a budget of equivalent value with that now allowed the libraries. The Committee also requested that residual funds allocated for the addition but not required under the bids for that building be used for renovation of the King Library Building and for other library facilities.

Your Committee are very happy to report that already informal discussions of the libraries' budget have resulted in agreements for additional funds for operating expenses, three new positions, and non-recurring funds for completing the processing of the valued papers of the late Chief Justice Vinson. The Committee are delighted to report that they have been assured the funds not required for the addition will be used for renovation of the King building and for providing 6,000 square feet of library space in the proposed new biological sciences building shortly to be designed and contracted for. Your Committee are further pleased to call your attention to the work now actually begun on the addition to the King building. For these improvements and assurances of continued support from the Administration, the Committee and the whole University community are grateful.

But let us turn from improvements accomplished to improvements needed. First of all it has been observed by many, students and faculty alike, that the catalogue of the libraries is often confusing to its users and in some instances inadequate. The Committee recommend that more adequate and effective cataloguing be provided--especially by way of cross references and analyses of series, and that necessary funds be allocated for that purpose. The Committee observe also that some 14,000 or more volumes and thousands of microforms are yet uncatalogued; hence they recommend that adequate provision be made for the cataloguing of these much-needed materials. The Committee furthermore recommend that the University librarians explore fully other systems of library cataloguing than the Dewey Decimal System with the possibility in view of changing to another and more effective system.

The Committee note that additional academic programs are often instituted at the University without provision for library needs for such programs. The Committee urge the Administration to make such provisions before the institution of additional programs. In this connection the Committee note that for a number of years the libraries have received roughly 2% of the University's budget. In 1969/70 UK ranked a low 20 among the 23 libraries in the Association of Southeast Research Libraries. Virginia, for example, received 5.66%; North Carolina received

3.44%; LSU 3.05%. The Committee recommend that a minimum of 3% be established to provide the resources and services our academic programs need.

In view of the constantly expanding need for reading space for students making use of library materials, the Committee recommend that the possibilities be explored for establishing and staffing at an early date an undergraduate reading room within the dormitory complex to the south of the campus. It would seem possible that space for such reading room might be had within the residence halls themselves.

Your Committee have considered at some length the problem of the circulation of books to persons other than the University community. Great numbers of high school students and teachers, as well as others from Fayette County and elsewhere, make a very considerable use of the libraries free of all charge. (They would not think of using the University swimming pool, laboratories, classrooms, or other such facilities without proper compensation.) The Committee recommend that a proper system of limiting these users be established, perhaps in the form of a ten to fifteen dollar annual fee for the use of the Library.

From time to time a few faculty members abuse their privilege of borrowing books and holding them out of circulation indefinitely. Some ignore requests for the return of books to be reserved for classes or for the needs of students or other faculty members. The Committee recommend that after due notice the Circulation Department of the libraries be empowered to report such violations to department chairmen and ask them to request the prompt return of such needed books, and that the Library set a charge for the loss of books or the retention of books by faculty members for more than one year.

For lack of funds, some \$4,000 per year, the libraries have this year been unable to provide and circulate the Weekly Accessions List, so popular with the faculty last year. Numerous letters have been received praising the list and deploring its demise. The Committee recommend that additional funds be regularly appropriated for the publication of this list.

Your Council have requested that each standing committee of the Senate assess its value as a committee, its membership, and number. The Library Committee believe that its value is self-evident: it serves as adviser to librarians as well as to the Senate; it furnishes a means for reaching the University Administration; and it makes known faculty and student library needs. The Committee believe that the membership of the committee should be restricted to those members of the faculty only who have a genuine and abiding interest in the libraries and their use. Members, students and faculty alike, should not be chosen at random but should be asked about their interest and about the time they are willing to devote to the work of the Committee. The members believe that the present size of the Committee is much too great. It is unwieldy. Finding a time suitable for all to meet is very, very difficult. Your Committee, therefore, recommend

that members be chosen only from among those who express a genuine interest and willingness to devote time to the Committee, and that the number be very considerably reduced. An appropriate number would seem to be five or seven faculty members and two students, these to be representative of the disciplines with particular and basic library needs and interests. The Committee recommend also that the President of the University, the Vice President for Academic Affairs and the Vice President for Business Affairs be invited to attend all meetings of the Committee.

The Committee recommend that the members of the Senate study this report fully and do what they can individually and as a body to make its provisions prevail. I urge its adoption.

#### HONORS PROGRAM

Approximately 400 students were enrolled in the Honors Program during the 1971 Fall Semester. This represents an increase of about 75 students over the previous year's enrollment. Over 140 students have joined the program since 1970. The present group of students consist of 106 Freshmen, 122 Sophomores, 96 Juniors and 74 Seniors. Approximately 50 Honors Program students are registered in colleges other than Arts and Sciences. Another 50 students registered in Arts and Sciences are there as "service" students (pre-med, pre-pharmacy, etc.). The students in the Honors Program represent over 50 different majors.

At present, over 200 students are enrolled in the three Honors colloquia, being offered each semester. In addition to the work taught directly by the Honors Program, 13 departments offer special sections for superior students. In all over 600 students are participating in Honors regularly scheduled courses, either in colloquia, departmental honors courses, or both. Many Honors Program students are enrolled in independent work either in departments or in HON 395.

The present teaching faculty includes six persons plus the director. Half of them hold the Ph.D. degree and the others are expected to receive it in the near future.

The rapid growth of the Honors Program since its establish-

ment in 1960, and especially during the last several years has resulted in several problems. In an attempt to correct these problems, the Honors Program Committee in conjunction with the Director of the Honors Program submitted a request to the Senate Council for changes in the Governing Regulations to permit the Honors Program to be considered as an educational unit of the University. The Senate Council decided to withhold action on this request until an investigation and evaluation of the present Honors Program has been conducted. The Dean of Undergraduate Studies has been charged with initiating and carrying out an evaluation of the Honors Program, to encompass the academic program and the administrative functions of it. The Senate Committee on Honors Program will assist in this study which is scheduled to be completed by May 1972.

Changes in the Honors Program appear to be necessary due to its rapid growth. However, these changes cannot be made until the completion of the evaluation. It is hoped that recommendations resulting from the evaluation of the Honors Program will result in improving and strengthening the Honors Program.

The Senate Advisory Committee on Student Affairs agreed, for this year, to be mostly an advisory committee on any matter brought to it by the President of the University, Vice President for Student Affairs, the University Senate or the Senate Council.

The Senate Council requested we look at - The Rules of the University Senate (revised October, 1970) p. 54, "Evaluation of Student Character and Ability." The committee has proposed an amendment to "Evaluation of Student Character and Ability." This amendment will be presented to the Senate in the March, 1972 meeting.

Many deans have not submitted for approval a statement of form and of areas of responsibilities for their Student Advisory

Council to the Senate Advisory Committee on Student Affairs.

The committee believes that student affairs have improved at the University of Kentucky and that the Senate Advisory Committee on Student Affairs should be preserved.

Dear Dr. Flickinger:

The Senate Center for Developmental Change Advisory Committee has met on two occasions during the Fall semester to review activities of CDC and to assist in formulating plans for an intensive administrative evaluation of its role and functions. As Chairman, I have discussed the current status of CDC with Vice President Albright to obtain guidance relative to the advisability of, and procedure for initiating an intensive review, and subsequently worked with Dr. Maher of the Office of the Vice President for Institutional Planning and Dr. Beers, Director of CDC in framing preliminary plans for such a review. Action has now been initiated to undertake the review. An ad hoc committee chaired by Dr. Robert Rudd, has been appointed for this purpose.

As I noted in our earlier conversation, this intensive evaluation activity makes an independent evaluation by the Advisory Committee redundant. Therefore, we will plan to forward a copy of the ad hoc committee report with any comments which may be appropriate to you when and if this report is made available to us.

Since the reporting deadline for the ad hoc committee is to be April 15, I assume that it will be received too late to be submitted to the Senate at the April meeting. In view of this, you may consider this letter to be our interim report.

## COMMUNITY COLLEGES

Dear Dr. Flickinger:

For several years the Senate Advisory Committee on Community Colleges was a very busy Committee. Because most of its proposals have been adopted and put into operation, this is no longer the case. The Committee met twice during the first semester and has met once this semester.

Dr. Stanley Wall, University Vice President for the Community College System, attended the first meeting at the request of the Chairman. He discussed the system's structure, its growth and its goals. Some proposed modifications now under discussion in the Community College Senate were outlined. Dr. Wall told the Committee that the Community College full-time equivalent student enrollment had increased this year by 1300 over the full-time equivalent number for the fall semester in 1970.

Dr. Charles Wethington, Assistant Vice President for the Community College System, was asked to attend the Committee's second meeting. He explained the make-up of the Community College Senate and discussed the newly created academic ranks. Dr. Wethington stated that the Board of Trustees had granted to the Community College System autonomy in the areas of student admissions, probations and drops.

At this meeting a sub-committee consisting of Mr. Larry Craft and Mr. Cliff Swauger was asked to ascertain the status of proposals made by the Committee during the previous academic year. At the February meeting the sub-committee reported that these proposals had been accepted and were now in effect.

This year the Committee has only one recommendation. A faculty member in another institution can take a sabbatical, draw whatever pay is due him and, if accepted as such, can receive pay as a graduate assistant at the University of Kentucky if the rules of his own institution permit this. A Community College teacher on sabbatical and during graduate work on the Lexington campus can receive additional salary only if employed on a research project administered by the University with funds from government or private grants. This would not include the usual type of teaching assistantship. The Committee recommends that the Governing Regulations be modified so as to put a Community College faculty member doing graduate work on the

Lexington campus on the same basis in this particular respect as a graduate student who is a faculty member at another institution.

#### INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

The University of Kentucky

22 March 1972

In accordance with its charge and previous work, the Advisory Committee for International Programs concentrated this year mainly on implementation of the Academic Policies for International Programs passed by the Senate in February 1971.

Assessment as to the need for such effort on its part was essentially as follows:

- 1) There was general consensus that the degree of overall faculty commitment to the approved policies was not precisely known or readily available, although miscellaneous evidence would suggest some fairly strong support on the whole.
- 2) Another concern was that the primary factor in expansion of the international dimension of the university is not just the level of faculty support but also the amount of involvement in terms of step-by-step work on implementation of the policies by relevant faculty groups and academic administrators.

There was general agreement among the committee membership, then, that unless and until some precise procedures for implementation could be devised and suggested to the appropriate university officials and faculty groups, implementation of the approved policies would in all likelihood not occur.

On this basis, it was decided that the Advisory Committee itself provided the most obvious starting point for launching an approach of this sort aimed at the development of specific steps for implementation. Considerable emphasis was given in this respect to the need of working closely with and, wherever feasible, through the Office of International Programs (OIP) on these and other related matters involving international programs.

The various endeavors of the committee along these lines may be briefly summarized as follows:

EFFORTS TOWARD IMPLEMENTATION

The committee met several times during the Spring of 1971 to try to work out something in the way of an overall plan or strategy for implementation; which it would attempt to pursue during this current academic year.

During these meetings it became apparent that the task of implementation represents a very large and difficult undertaking, and as such poses many hard questions. Obviously, all the policies cannot be implemented at once. There also is the problem of whether all of them can be equally and completely adopted. Under existing budgetary limitations in the University, progress will be slower than seems desirable. On the other hand, however, some steps toward implementation are possible and modest progress is feasible without substantial increases in the way of additional funds and resources.

Given these considerations, together with other communication from around the campus, it appeared that an important initial step toward implementation of the policies might be that of trying to set some sort of priority among them.

Accordingly, the following priorities for implementation of the policies were established by the Advisory Committee around May and June of last year:

<u>ORDER OF PRIORITY</u>	<u>RELEVANT POLICIES</u>
Highest Priority: On-Campus Programs	
1st -- Curriculum Development	I, II, IV
2nd -- Administration	X
3rd -- Student Area	V
4th -- Continuing Education	VI
Lower Priority: Off-Campus Programs	III, VII, VIII, IX

Although the order of priorities might be discussed and revised as changing circumstances may indicate or warrant, implementation will necessarily have to be carried out in most cases via fairly small and somewhat detailed steps.

In view of this situation, the Advisory Committee has tended to proceed on several fronts and in a more or less opportune, on-going fashion. Consequently, the attempt to this point has been primarily one of trying to make some contribution toward getting the long, arduous process of implementation at least underway in a few areas. A main tactic in this respect has been to do whatever possible and appropriate on its part to help initiate, foster, aid, and support various efforts aimed at the identification of opportunities and procedures for suggested steps to be taken on each set of policy priorities which it has recommended.

MAJOR WORK AND ACTIVITY

Committee work and activity over the past six months or so has included among other things the following major items:

--Cooperation with the Latin American Council, the Committee on International Students, and other groups involved in various international programs.

--Participation with OIP and the Office of the Undergraduate Dean in development of the Topical Major in International Studies now offered as part of the undergraduate program.

--Inquiry into and recommendation concerning the World Campus Afloat Association on behalf of the University in terms of its possible affiliation with this group.

--Support of the joint recommendation by OIP, the Patterson School, and the Advisory Committee that the University join the newly formed Committee on the Future of International Studies (COFIS). This group was recently established to serve an interim function until one of the permanent organizations, such as the American Council on Education, reactivates its international relations committee.

--Review and committee approval of the request by OIP for a budget increase for the Biennial Year 1972-74; which has been submitted to the appropriate units of the Administration. Upon examination, it was concluded that this request represents a relatively small but long overdue and much needed increase in funds for the international program. Some modest expansion in the staff and resources of OIP would definitely seem in order if the University hopes and actually aspires to move more effectively toward further advancement and development in its international dimension, especially in terms of the educational components. Compared with other universities which have made substantial progress in internationalizing their programs, the University of Kentucky staff for helping obtain outside funds and for program planning, coordination, and administration in this area is critically small.

There are several fairly recent and more or less current activities that might also be mentioned here.

--Around the first of the year, the committee lent its advice, support, and requested participation on a successful action initiated by the Director of OIP in cooperation with the Undergraduate Dean and the Director of the Patterson School to work with the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs in the development of guidelines and recommendations for more concrete and effective steps to be taken toward implementation of the Academic Policies for International Programs. This endeavor is still in progress, having reached the stage where a joint report on the subject requested by the Vice President from the Undergraduate Dean and the Director of the Patterson School has been submitted to him and is now under his consideration for further action.

--Another matter of some immediate concern relates to the developments now taking place with regard to the undergraduate program in the College of Arts and Sciences. The committee recently accepted for discussion a proposal made by several of its members that this present situation in Arts and Sciences offers an opportunity with several possibilities for inclusion of some additional international education elements in the undergraduate curriculum. (It should be noted that this proposal was made essentially in terms of the new B.A. and B.S. degree programs recently proposed by Arts and Sciences.) There was considerable indication that this view might certainly deserve some further attention and closer examination, since it may well have a number of important implications and potentialities from the standpoint of implementation of the Academic Policies for International Programs pertaining to curriculum development.

This review of the major efforts and items of work over the past year is submitted by the Advisory Committee for International Programs as its annual report to the University Senate for the year 1972.

#### PRIVILEGE AND TENURE

Report of the University Senate Advisory Committee on Privilege and Tenure

The Committee conducted investigations on ten cases and was consulted by the University administration on several others. Two cases are under investigation at the present time.

Dr. Adelstein stated that there were recommendations in two of the Reports received: those of the Library Committee and the Community Colleges Committee; that the Senate Council had requested additional information from the Library Committee on the recommendations contained in its Report; and that on behalf of the Senate Council he wished to recommend that the Senate approve the recommendation contained in the Community Colleges Committee Report for transmittal to the President for presentation to the Board of Trustees since this recommendation contained financial and administrative implications. He then read the recommendation as follows:

that Governing Regulations be modified so that a Community College faculty member, doing graduate work on the Lexington campus, be put on the same basis as a graduate student who is a faculty member of another institution and who takes a sabbatical leave, draws whatever pay is due him and, if accepted as such, can receive pay as a graduate assistant at the University of Kentucky.

Following discussion in which it was pointed out that the Senate would be approving enabling legislation only but would not be spelling out the details of what will or will not be approved by those making changes in the Governing Regulations; that more specific wording is needed to make it possible to do exactly what is intended, motion was made to recommit the proposed recommendation to the Community Colleges Committee for rewording of the proposed changes to be made in the Governing Regulations. By a hand count of 54 to 48 the Senate voted to recommit the recommendation to the Community Colleges Committee for specific wording to be incorporated into the Governing Regulations when it is considered by the Board of Trustees.

On behalf of the Senate Council, Mr. Hopson presented the following proposal to change the Rules of the University Senate, Section III. D.1., Grade I (the proposal had been returned to the Senate Council for additional study by the Senate at its April 17, 1972 meeting; had been reworked by the Council and recirculated to the faculty under date of April 26, 1972):

Grade I: The grade I means that part of the work of the course remains undone. It shall be given only when all other work done by the student in the course has been of satisfactory quality and there is a reasonable probability that a passing grade will result from completion of the work. The instructor shall not give an I grade when the reason for incompleteness is unsatisfactory to him, or when it is not feasible for the student to complete the work, or when the work done in the course to date would result in a failing grade.

An undergraduate student shall have the option of having the I grade as a permanent part of his record. If the student elects to complete the course in order to change the I grade to a letter grade, he must do so before graduation, but in no event after a lapse of two years from the date the I grade was awarded. If the student does complete the course under this condition, the instructor shall forward to the Registrar the appropriate letter grade to replace the I. If the student elects to retain the I grade in a course required for graduation, or is unable to complete such a course because of the two-year limitation or for any other reason, he must retake it and satisfactorily complete it with a letter grade in order to graduate.

Motion was made to amend the proposal to change the fourth line in the second paragraph to read:

". . . complete the work before midterm of the semester after the student re-enters the University but no later than two calendar years . . ."

so that the sentence would read:

". . . . If the student elects to complete the course in order to change the I grade to a letter grade, he must complete the work before midterm of the semester after the student re-enters the University but no later than two calendar years from the date the I grade was awarded. . . ."

At this point in the consideration of the proposed amendment the Chairman asked Dr. Michael Adelstein to assume the Chair since the matter under consideration was assigned to him as a member of the Council and he wished to respond to the proposed amendment.

Following further discussion motion was made and approved to close debate on the proposed amendment. The Senate then voted to defeat the amendment.

Motion was made to amend the proposal on the floor to substitute the word "possibility" for the word "probability" in the fourth line of the first paragraph. The Senate voted to make this substitution.

Motion was made to amend the first paragraph to read:

"Grade I: The grade I means that part of the work of the course remains undone. It shall be given only when there is a reasonable possibility that a passing grade will result from completion of the work. The instructor shall not give an I grade when the reason for incompleteness is unsatisfactory to him.

The Senate voted to approve this amendment.

The Senate then approved the original motion on the floor, as amended twice.

The Chairman returned to the Chair for consideration of the next item on the Senate agenda.

On behalf of the Senate Council, Mr. Hopson recommended that the following proposed amendment of Section IV of the Governing Regulations be approved and endorsed, and that this amendment be presented to the Board of Trustees with the Senate's recommendation that it be adopted by the Board at its next regular monthly meeting.

#### IV THE UNIVERSITY SENATE (University System)

In the first paragraph change the word "members" to "membership".

It was pointed out that the second paragraph had been inadvertently omitted and should be included and changed editorially to read:

The elected membership shall number 185, of which 160 members shall represent the faculty and 25 members shall represent the student body.

Mr. Hopson accepted this as a friendly amendment.

Leave the third paragraph as presently constituted.

Change the fourth paragraph to read as follows:

The elected student membership shall consist of and represent the members of the full-time student body in the various colleges of the University System. Each college shall be allotted at least one student representative. The remaining student membership positions shall be apportioned among the colleges on the basis of relative student

populations of those colleges for the school year in which student membership elections are held. Students with no declared major shall be represented through the College of Arts and Sciences. Yearly adjustments shall be made to keep apportionment equitable, with the elected student membership maintained at 25. Each elected student member shall be a junior, senior, graduate or professional student, and shall not be on either academic or disciplinary probation and shall serve for a term of one year and shall be eligible for re-election as often as he or she remains a full-time undergraduate, graduate or professional student in the University System. If a student should at any time become ineligible to serve (e.g., by relinquishing his or her position as a full-time student being placed on academic probation, or violating the Senate attendance regulations), the administrative head of the group represented shall declare a vacancy and designate that member from the eligible student body who at the last election received the next highest vote to serve for the duration of the elected student member's ineligibility.

In the fifth paragraph delete the word "and" in the fourth line and add "and the President of the Student Body" to the end of the paragraph.

A friendly amendment was presented and accepted to add the feminine pronoun also wherever the masculine pronoun appears in the Governing Regulations.

Following discussion an amendment was presented to recommit the proposal for the purpose of retaining the present number of 17 student members and to reapportion among the colleges according to the approximate 1 - 1,000 student population ratio.

The Senate voted to close debate on the amendment. The Senate then defeated the amendment.

Following further discussion the Senate again voted to close debate on the original proposal on the floor. The hand count to close debate was 63 to 22.

The Senate then voted to approve the proposed amendment of Section IV of the Governing Regulations for presentation to the Board of Trustees at its next regular monthly meeting with a recommendation for its adoption.

The Chairman thanked the Senate for a year of hard work and wished each of them a happy summer.

The meeting adjourned at 4:38 p.m.



FACULTY CODE  
September 1972

The Faculty of the University System of the University of Kentucky has long subscribed to the principles of academic freedom, which recognize and confirm a faculty member's freedom in research and teaching, and in his activities as a private person. As a concomitant to these freedoms, we in turn acknowledge our responsibilities as a faculty to provide an atmosphere of free inquiry and expression for our colleagues and students, and to foster learning and maintain a climate conducive to the transmission, exploration, generation and preservation of knowledge. Furthermore, we recognize our collective obligation to the pursuit of excellence in teaching, research, and service, and also our individual duty in our specific University assignment to contribute to human knowledge, understanding, and betterment.

We therefore affirm and adopt the following statement of ~~ethical~~ responsibilities to our colleagues, our institution, and our students. We do so at this time not because an atmosphere of abuse or violation exists, but because we wish to express our commitment to the community of scholars and the advancement of learning.

I. APPLICABILITY:

This Code shall apply to all faculty members associated with the University System of the University of Kentucky and to all graduate students or other personnel having teaching or research assignments in that System.

II. FACULTY RESPONSIBILITIES:

The faculty of the University System of the University of Kentucky hereby subscribe to the following ethical responsibilities:

A. General Relations

1. To respect the rights of all campus members to pursue their academic and administrative activities;

2. to respect the rights of all campus members to free and orderly expression;

B. Administrative Relations

1. to utilize the property of the University in accordance with the rules governing its use which have been duly promulgated;
2. to comply with the Governing Regulations, the Administrative Regulations, and the rules and regulations promulgated and approved by the University Senate;
3. to act with ~~ethical~~ propriety in all dealings with members of the University community;
4. to engage in consulting outside the University assignment only in accordance with the provisions promulgated for same;
5. to indicate that he or she does not speak for the University of Kentucky when speaking as a private person if the institutional affiliation is mentioned;

C. Student Relations

1. to uphold the student academic rights as set forth in the Rules of the University Senate;
2. to present the subject matter of a course as announced and approved by the faculty in accordance with the procedures set forth by the University Senate for this and to avoid the persistent intrusion of material which has no relation to the subject;
3. to meet classes as scheduled in accordance with University regulations; (absences caused by illness, emergencies, attendance at scholarly meetings, occasional professional service, pedagogical experimentation, and the like, are exceptions but these should be approved by the department chairman and substitutions or reschedulings should be arranged.)

4. to be available to students for advising and other conferences, preferably by posting office hours and/or by allowing students to arrange for appointments at other mutually convenient times;
5. to arrange for appropriate interaction and communication with graduate students in the direction of their theses;
6. to return to, discuss with, or make available to students all papers, quizzes and examinations within a reasonable period of time, unless the confidentiality of the examination precludes; and to give final examinations in accordance with procedures approved in the Rules of the University Senate;
7. to inform students when their individual or collective efforts may be used for professional or personal advancement of the faculty member, or when the student(s) are to be used as research subjects, and in either case, to ensure that the student may elect not to participate without prejudice to his or her academic standing; and to recognize appropriately any significant contribution by the student(s);
8. to respect the right of the student to privacy, including privacy of desk, carrel, and office space, as well as refraining from improper disclosure of the student's social or political views or activities;
9. to keep himself or herself well informed of the academic requirements of the University affecting students whom he or she advises.

III. ENFORCEMENT:

1. Any member of the University community (faculty, staff member, or student) with a complaint about an alleged violation of these responsibilities shall process it through normal channels. Accordingly, the process should begin with discussion with the person accused of the violation. If a satisfactory solution between the parties cannot be accomplished then the accused's immediate supervisor or, if the complainant is a student

the Academic Ombudsman should be asked to mediate. If such mediation proves unsuccessful then the matter should be forwarded to the next Administrative level by the supervisor or Academic Ombudsman together with a written report concerning the matter with copies of the report to the parties involved. This process of mediation and report should follow normal channels up to and including the dean of the College to which the person accused of a violation is assigned.

2. In the event that after the appropriate processing through these channels the dean is unable to mediate satisfactorily between the parties, or in the event that the dean is himself the complaining party and is unable to accomplish a satisfactory solution with the accused, he shall make a written report containing his recommendations and findings and forward it to the appropriate academic vice president through the University Senate Committee on Faculty Responsibilities with copies to the accused and the complainant. Upon receipt of the report from the dean, the committee shall set a date for a hearing which must be within thirty (30) days of receipt of the Dean's report. The committee shall then determine whether to hold closed or open hearing(s) after consultation with the parties in dispute. After the completion of the hearing(s), the committee shall forward its recommendations to the appropriate vice president with respect to (1) whether or not the accused has violated the Code, and, if so (2) the type of sanction, if any, which should be imposed.
3. The vice president shall make a final decision after review of the report of the committee. In any event, however, the accused shall have the normal right of appeal to the President and the Board of Trustees in accordance with established procedures.

#### IV. SANCTIONS:

1. A warning that conduct violates the Code as interpreted.
2. A reprimand:
  - (a) Informal (to accused only);
  - (b) Formal (to accused with notice to his administrative superior);

3. Forfeiture of pay from present salary for actual monetary damage suffered by the University through unauthorized use of University property.

\* 4. Recommendation for proceeding under KRS 164.230. (dismissal for reasons of "incompetency, neglect of or refusal to perform his duty, or of immoral conduct".)

V RIGHTS OF THE ACCUSED:

1. In all proceedings under this Code:

- (a) to be heard in his or her own defense;
- (b) to be informed in writing of the complaint with full particulars and to be given at least 20 days before any action is taken to answer the complaint;
- (c) to enjoy professional privileges while appealing or undergoing a hearing process. (This does not mean that a change of assignment cannot be made in accordance with the Governing Regulation X., B. 11.)

2. With regard to all proceedings of the Committee:

- (a) to be entitled to receive a copy of all rules and procedures governing the actions of the Committee in sufficient time to familiarize himself or herself of them;
- (b) to be entitled to counsel and to question the witness(es) against the accused and to present evidence and/or witness(es) in his or her own behalf in all Committee processes;
- (c) to challenge the impartiality of anyone sitting on the Committee and to <sup>have</sup> request the replacement of up to two of the members of the Committee;
- (d) to refuse to give testimony which might tend to be detrimental to him or her,

*which will not be held in consideration by the committee*

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\* Nothing in this document is intended to inhibit in any way the right of the appropriate academic vice president to initiate charges against a faculty member under KRS 164.230 in accordance with the procedures established by the Governing Regulations so long as no written report has yet been received by the Committee from the dean.

VI. RIGHTS OF THE COMPLAINANT:

No member of the University or community shall be penalized academically or professionally for filing or processing a complaint in good faith under this Code.

VII. STATUTE OF LIMITATIONS:

Any complaint processed under these procedures must be initiated within ~~sixty (60) days~~ <sup>of stated herein</sup> of knowledge of the alleged violation of the University or Academic Responsibilities as stated herein, but in no event later than one year after the actual commission of the alleged offense.

VIII. COMPOSITION OF COMMITTEE:

The Committee on Faculty Responsibilities shall consist of: 1) a basic panel consisting of six regular and three alternate members together with a chairman (who shall be non-voting except in the case of a tie vote) all of whom shall be tenured members of the University faculty of at least the rank of Associate Professor, and, 2) two separate panels, one of six undergraduate students who shall have at least junior status and one of six graduate and/or professional students of whom at least half have teaching or research responsibilities. When neither the complainant nor the accused are students, the Committee shall operate solely with the basic panel. If however, the complainant or the accused is a student, he or she shall have the right to have two members of the panel appropriate to the student's status added to the basic panel. The two students shall be chosen at random by the Chairman of the Committee.

Furthermore, if in any case the accused is a graduate student, he or she shall be entitled to have two graduate students selected from the graduate student panel by the Chairman on a random basis. In the event that the accused and complainant are both graduate students, however, only two students from the graduate panel will be selected. The six regular basic panel members and the three alternates shall be selected by the President of the University from a list recommended by the University Senate Council in accordance with established procedure. The Committee members shall serve three year terms on a staggered basis as shall the alternates. The student panel members shall be selected by the President from a list submitted by the Student Government

in accordance with established procedures. In the case of the graduate students, the Student Government is directed to consult with the GPSA in making its recommendations. The term of office for each student member shall be one year and the individual member can be selected to serve a second year.

The recommendation of the Committee shall be determined by majority vote. In the event of a tie vote, the tie vote shall be broken by the decision of the chairman. The findings and recommendations of the Senate Committee shall be transmitted to the complainant and the accused as well as to the vice president. The vice president shall thereupon make his decision and report it to the accused, the complainant, and the forwarding dean with copies to the Chairman of the Committee.

The Committee shall be designated as a Senate Advisory Committee and shall accordingly make annual reports to the Senate.
