MINUTES OF THE UNIVERSITY SENATE October 10, 1932

The University Senate met in the Lecture Room of McVey Hall Monday, October 10, President McVey presiding.

The minutes of May 9, June 3 and August 17 were read and approved.

Professor Webb read a report on the activities of the Student Loan Committee which was ordered included in the minutes as follows:

Sociology 11. Population Movements. Three credits.

Philosophy 210a. Types of Logical Theory. Three credits.

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Philosophy 210b. Types of Logical Theory. Continuation of 210a. Three credits.

Music 110a-d. Independent Work in Music. Three credits per semester.

Hygiene/ DOa, b. Public Health. To replace 105a, b. Advanced Hygiene. Credit changed from 2 to three hours.

Hygiene 104. Maternal and Child Health. Approved April 7 as a 2 credit course. Changed to 3 credits.

German 6a, b. Scientific German. Three credits per semester.

College of Agriculture

Change Agronomy 2, Soil Management, to Agronomy 115. Same title.

College of Eggineering

 $\frac{Practical}{Prerequisites} \xrightarrow{Mechanics} \frac{9}{9} - \underbrace{Sheet Metal}_{Mechanics} \xrightarrow{Work} \cdot \ 2 \text{ credits}.$

Drop Mech. Eng. 3 (Steam Boilers), two hours per week, 2 credits.

Expand Mech. Eng. 10 (Heating and Ventilation) from two hours per week, one credit course, first half of the second semester - to a two hour per week, two credit course, first semester.

Expand Mech. Eng. 4 (Steam Engineering of Power Plants) from a two hour per week, one credit course - to a four hour per week, two credit course, first half of second semester.

Note: The new Mechanical Engineering 4 course will absorb the subject matter heretofore covered in Mechanical Engineering 3.

The following recommendation from the Graduate School was referred to the Rules Committee:

"That all applications for degrees must be made at least one month prior to the date of the commencement at which such degree is to be conferred."

On recommendation of the University Council, permission was given by the Senate for the organization of a professional social service fraternity, Beta Sigma Alpha.

President McVey read the report of the Senate Committee appointed to prepare resolutions on the death of Ellen Church Semple. The resolutions were adopted and ordered spread upon the minutes, as follows:

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"Ellen Churchill Semple 1863-1932

In the life and career of Ellen Churchill Semple the University of Kentucky had a real and abiding interest. A native of Louisville, a Vassar graduate, and founder of Semple Collegiate School, She turned in 1891 to the study of the new science of anthropo-geography, in which she was destined to establish her reputation. Inspired by Frederich Ratzel at the University of Leipzig, she returned to America a pioneer in the field of the relation of geography to history and human progress. Three authorative books and many articles now testify to her scholarly attainments, while her lectures at this University are remembered by many.

The Senate of the University learns with regret of the death of Miss Semple, and wishes to record its appreciation of her scholarly contribution to the State, and to make grateful acknowledgement of her generous spirit in the gift of books and her highly-prized Cullum Medal. The Senate would also commend to the youth and citizens of Kentucky her example of steadfast devotion to scholarship and liberal support for educational advancement.
