# RevampFraternityRowPlan Since Greeks Have Defaulted

Since a majority of the fraternities on campus don't seem much interested in the University's recently proposed Fraternity Row development, we think the project should be revamped to provide housing for independent students.

Only five groups turned in applications for a house in the eight-unit project and it's quite possible some of these five may be forced to back out. University officials are currently investigating the applicants to see if they can meet necessary financial obligations.

Several Greek-letter groups have expressed a desire to participate in the development but most of them seem to feel that it would be too expensive. Another disadvantage cited by the fraternities is that they would never hold clear title to the houses and land, even after paying off the original cost on each individual house.

#### UK Students Outdo Their Elders Easily

One thing can be said for UK students no matter what their other faults. Without even half trying they can outdo their elders.

Only about a fourth of the student body took the trouble to go over to the Student Union Tuesday and cast their ballots in the campus mock election. This is far below the national average for presidential elections. At least half our elders generally manage to get to the polls.

One lone vote decided whether or not California, Idaho, Oregon, Texas, and Washington were to become states. Three presidents—Thomas Jefferson, John Quincy Adams, and Rutherford B. Hayes—were elected by one-vote margins in the electroacilege. In a democracy the individual does count for something, but only if he wants to be counted. Let's hope the eligible UK students do a little better on November 4 than they did Tuesday.

I was present at the pep rally which was held last Friday evening in front of the Coliseum. Needless to say it was a big step in the right direction. It was the first and the biggest rally I have attended since coming to the University. That isn't saying a whale of a lot though, as the student body could have made a better showing than they did.

There are about 5700 students in school at the present time. From the 2000 persons present at the rally, my estimation is that only one-fourth of the student body was there. It wouldn't have taken much time for the rest of the students to show up for 45 minutes and give a little added incentive to the group.

I would like to suggest that the pep organization that handled this rally not let it drop now. Let's go on to make this school not the coldest school in the South, but the most spirited. Let's fan the spark that came to the fore last Friday evening.


