



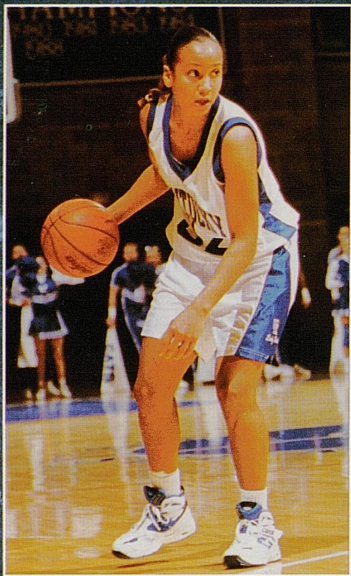

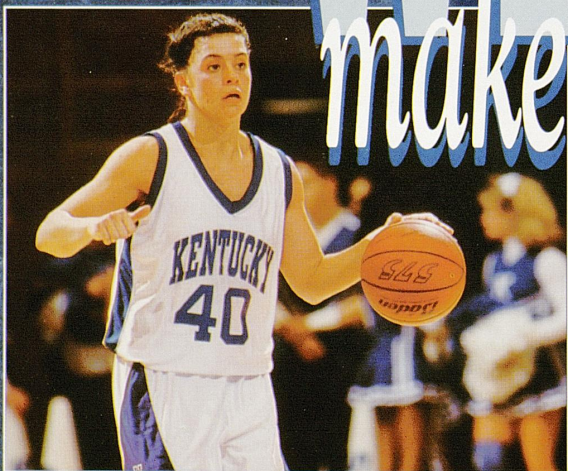


Sophomore Shaunda Roberts (above) will be an offensive and defensive threat to opponents as a forward.

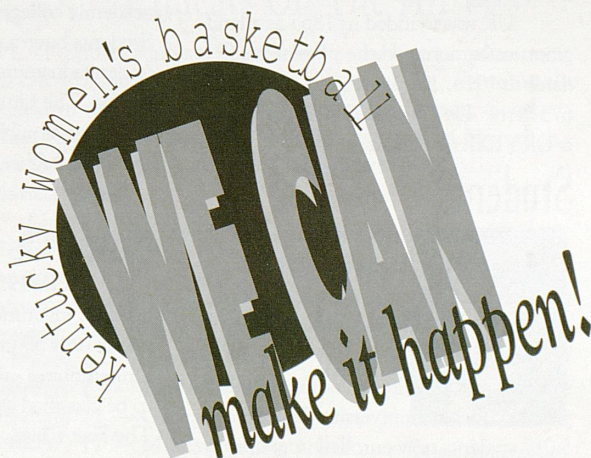

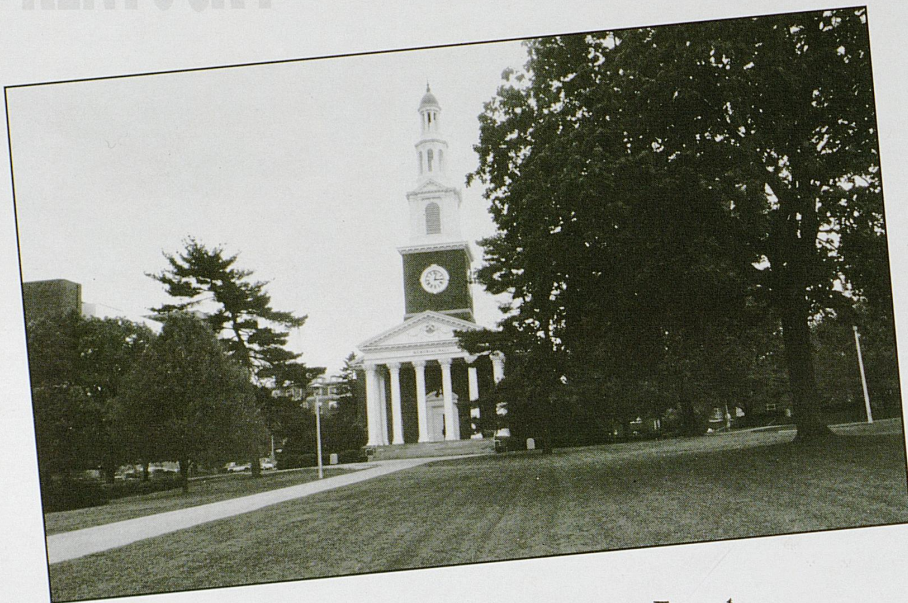

From its modest beginnings in 1865, when it was known as State College, the University of Kentucky has grown into one of the nation's most outstanding institutions of higher learning. As a comprehensive land-grant university, UK offers an educational experience that cannot be matched anywhere in the Commonwealth. In fact, only a small number of institutions across the nation can offer the wealth of opportunities that awaits students at UK. At Kentucky, there is a tradition of value.

History

UK was founded in 1865 as a land-grant institution, and the present name dates to 1916. The Lexington campus has 673 acres. Dr. Charles T. Wethington, Jr., is UK's 10th president.

Students

The University of Kentucky now has more than 70,000 students, with 24,000 on the Lexington campus and 46,000 at the 14 community colleges across the state. UK now educates 40 percent of all the students in Kentucky attending a public or private college or university. There are 5,077 students now enrolled in graduate school with 95 master's and 57 doctoral programs offered.



Faculty

There are 1,720 full-time faculty on the Lexington campus and 1,125 faculty in the community colleges. Faculty brought in more than \$100 million in grants, contracts, and gifts to the University during the last academic year.



Academic Programs

Currently, there are 16 academic colleges and a graduate school. Students have a choice of 108 undergraduate majors from which to choose. The University is recommended in a number of publications for its value in providing higher education.

Research

UK ranks among the Top 100 research institutions in the nation, and is one of only 59 public universities in the United States - the only one in Kentucky - to be classified as a Research University of The First Class.



Medical Center

The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center, including a 473-bed hospital, is located on the Lexington campus. More than 2,800 students are enrolled in its five colleges - medicine, dentistry, nursing, pharmacy, and allied health professions.

Library

The UK Library System contains more than two million volumes and is interconnected by computer with each of the 14 community colleges. The library is ranked 34th among the 108 top university research libraries in North America based upon the number of volumes held. The University has begun construction on new \$58 million state-of-the-art library.



Sports

The current number of UK sports on the varsity level is 21 - 10 men's sports, 10 women's sports, and 1 coed sport. The men's sports are football, basketball, baseball, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, swimming, golf, and soccer. For the women, UK sponsors basketball, volleyball, swimming, golf, tennis, gymnastics, cross country, indoor and outdoor track, and soccer on the varsity level. The single coed sport is rifle.

The UK men's basketball team has been prominent nationally for 50 years under the leadership of four coaches, Adolph Rupp, Joe B. Hall, Eddie Sutton and Rick Pitino. The UK football program also offers the excitement of top-level competition in the Southeastern Conference and is headed by Coach Bill Curry.

NAME CHANGE

The UK women's basketball team should no longer be referred to as "Lady Kats". The team should now be referred to as UK Women's Basketball. The nickname will be the University mascot - Wildcats.

MEDIA PASS LIST

Requests for home game credentials should be directed to Gail Dent, preferably in writing at least one week in advance. A media list will be located at the Euclid Avenue pass gate (main entrance).

PHOTOGRAPHERS CREDENTIALS

Credentials will be issued to only accredited photographers or those on special assignment. Photographers are asked to stay behind the baseline on each end of the court.

PARKING

Parking is available in front of and behind Memorial Coliseum. There is also a lot adjacent to the Coliseum. No pass is required.

TELEPHONES

Long distance telephone lines are available in the Athletics Media Relations Office in the Coliseum. Fax machine service is also available. There will be one telephone line available for visiting radio on the press row side of the Coliseum. Radio personnel are asked to submit a request on company letterhead at lead two weeks in advance of the game to be broadcast.

PREGAME MEAL

Pizza and soft drinks are available to working media in the Athletics Media Relations office 45 minutes before tipoff.

POSTGAME INTERVIEWS

Players and coaches will be available to the media following the 10-minute cooling off period at the end of each game in a designated area in the Coliseum. The visiting coach and requested players will precede the home coach and players, unless otherwise specified. Each press conference will last no longer than 20 minutes. SIDs from each school will be asked to coordinate any other requests following both press conferences.

DAILY INTERVIEWS

Media wishing to interview players or coaches should make arrangements through the UK Athletics Media Relations Office. The best time to interview players is generally following practice (3:30 p.m.). Special arrangements may have to be made due to class schedule. The best policy is to call in advance. The best time to interview coaches is generally in the morning hours.

STATISTICAL INFORMATION

Statistics will be available in the Athletics Media Relations Office following each game. Statistics for WORKING MEDIA ONLY will be available via Fax-On-Demand. Contact the UK Athletics Media Relations Office for more information.

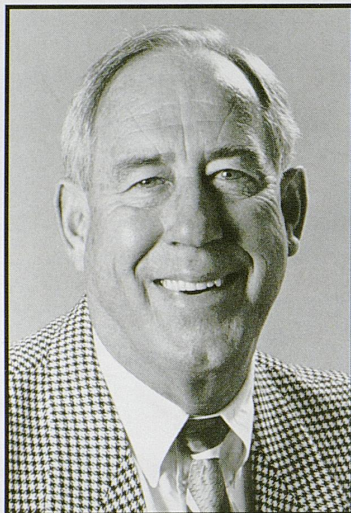

C. M. Newton

Director of Athletics



WHEN

(C. M.) NEWTON BECAME THE
UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY'S
SEVENTH DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
ON APRIL 1, 1989, HE HIT THE
GROUND RUNNING.

After a little more than
six years on the job, Newton
has become one of the most

popular public figures in the Commonwealth of Kentucky. In addition to a lengthy, impressive list of credentials, Newton brought to Kentucky a sparkling reputation of integrity at a crucial time in the history of UK Athletics. In accepting the position at his alma mater, Newton summarized his goals and objectives by saying, "I have a resolve to try very hard to continue that great tradition, and at the same time, to totally do it within the NCAA and SEC rules and not sacrifice the academic integrity of this University."

Newton capped an illustrious basketball coaching career by leading his final Vanderbilt University team to a 19-14 record, a second-place SEC finish and its second consecutive NCAA Tournament appearance during the 1988-89 season. He was named SEC Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and also received the Kodak NABC District IV Coach of the Year award. Newton served as head basketball coach and associate athletics director at the Nashville school from 1982 to 1989, compiling a 129-115 record. In 32 years of coaching at Transylvania, Alabama and Vanderbilt, Newton compiled a 509-375 record overall. His Alabama teams won three consecutive Southeastern Conference championships.

Perhaps more impressive, however, was Newton's ability to produce winning teams that also possessed exceptional academic credentials. During Newton's tenure at Vanderbilt, 18 Commodores were named to the Academic All-SEC team, over 50 percent more than any other league school. And including his last graduating class, all 21 seniors received their diplomas. Newton is highly regarded on the national level. He has served on the board of directors of the National Association of Basketball Coaches. He worked six years on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee, serving as chairman of that elite group for five of those years. He currently serves as president of

USA Basketball, the nation's governing body for international basketball, and as chairman of its Games Committee, which is responsible for all international competition, including the Olympic Games. He is also a member of the prestigious NCAA Division I Basketball Committee, and is chair of the NCAA Committee on Basketball Issues.

Newton has literally circled the globe to promote the game of basketball. He served as team manager, a combination coaching and administrative position, on the 1984 U.S. Olympic team that won the gold medal. Indiana coach Bob Knight, who tabbed Newton for the Olympic staff, called him "the finest gentleman in our business." In 1983 and 1987, Newton took his Vanderbilt squads to the Republic of China (Taiwan) to represent the United States in the R. William Jones Cup International Tournament, winning the gold medal in 1983 and the silver in 1987. He has also conducted coaching clinics in numerous countries.

Newton began his coaching career at Transylvania College (now Transylvania University) in Lexington. Recommended for the job by Coach Rupp, Newton guided Transy to a 169-137 record in his 12 years at the helm despite the handicap of a limited scholarship program.

In 1969, once again with the backing of Rupp, Newton answered a call from Paul "Bear" Bryant to take on the challenge of building the downtrodden Alabama basketball program. During his 12-year tenure, Newton orchestrated a complete turnaround in the Crimson Tide's basketball fortunes, compiling a sparkling 211-123 record. In addition to the three SEC championships, Newton guided the Tide to two trips to the NCAA Tournament and four berths in the NIT. A satisfied Bryant once remarked "C.

M. Newton is a winner, and that's important, but more than anything else, he wins or loses with class, and that's more important."

With few horizons left to conquer at Alabama, Newton resigned at the end of the 1980 season to accept a job as assistant commissioner of the Southeastern Conference. A year later, when Vanderbilt athletics director Roy Kramer was searching for a coach of national stature to head the Commodore basketball program, Newton was the obvious man for the job.

Newton was born Feb. 2, 1930, in Rockwood, Tenn. He grew up in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla., where he was eventually named a charter member of that city's Sports Hall of Fame, along with Chris Evert, Julius Boros, and the late Brian Piccolo. After high school, Newton enrolled at UK on a basketball scholarship. He was a letterman on the Wildcats' 1951 national championship team. Also a standout baseball pitcher, Newton hurled in the New York Yankees minor league system before entering college coaching.

Newton and his wife, Evelyn, have three grown children — son Martin, and daughters Deborah and Tracy — and four grandchildren.

"With Bernadette and her staff, we are in a new era of women's basketball which will be exciting and a tremendous challenge because of the competitiveness of the SEC and women's basketball nationally.

"Our goal is to become competitive for a championship in the SEC and on the national level.

"From an administrative point of view, we've totally made a commitment to achieve the goal and with Bernadette's leadership, the goal is definitely achievable.

"I will do everything within my power to see that we achieve our goals with women's basketball."

Charles T. Wethington

University President



Charles T. Wethington, Jr. was named the University of Kentucky's 10th president on September 18, 1990 after serving as interim president for nine months. Prior to assuming the post, he served as Chancellor of the UK Community College system since 1982.

Wethington began his career in higher education in 1965, as an educational psychology instructor on the Lexington campus of the University and entered administration two years later when he was named director of Maysville Community College. In 1971 he moved to the system office in Lexington as assistant vice president, and became vice president of the Community College System in 1981.

In the University reorganization of 1982, he was named chancellor of the UK system, one of the three major sectors of UK.

Under his leadership the Community College System has set enrollment records and added an entire new college at Owensboro.

Wethington earned his master's and doctorate degrees at UK after completing his undergraduate work at Eastern Kentucky University.

The Casey County native has been active on the national higher education scene, serving as legislation committee chairman of the National Council of State Directors of Community and Junior Colleges before moving to the chairmanship in 1985.

He has been vice chairman of the Executive Council of the Southern Association of College and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and was a member of

the search committee for the executive director of the Commission.

He has been in demand nationally in the accreditation process of community and junior colleges.

During 1957-61 he served as a cryptolinguist in the U.S. Air Force Security Service. He studied Russian at Syracuse University, 1958-59.

Wethington, born Jan. 2, 1936, in Merrimac, Ky., is married to the former Judy Woodrow, a Danville native. They have a son, Kennan, and a daughter, Lisa.

Bernadette Locke-Mattox

Georgia, 1981



ON MARCH 14, 1995, the University of Kentucky took a step toward the future, hiring a sought-after, proven recruiter to

take its women's basketball program to the next level. Bernadette Locke-Mattox, in her fifth year at UK, returned to the coaching ranks after one year as Assistant Athletics Director and Senior Women's Administrator at the University, to head the women's program.

Locke-Mattox will undoubtedly bring a unique perspective to recruits, having worked with powerhouses in both men's and women's basketball. She earned national recognition when she became one of the first female assistant coaches on a Division I men's basketball staff when Coach Rick Pitino added her to the program in 1990. Locke-Mattox silenced the skeptics over the next four seasons as she became a valuable contributing member of the staff, working with the players in individual instruction sessions, as well as excelling in game assignments and supervising players' academic affairs.

Locke-Mattox is also highly regarded in women's basketball circles. She served as a top recruiter as assistant to head coach Andy Landers at her alma mater, national power Georgia. During her five seasons with the Lady Bulldogs, Locke-Mattox helped guide the program to national rankings, NCAA Tournament berths and many SEC honors. While at Georgia, she also helped recruit two of the best female basketball players to play the game, Teresa Edwards and Katrina McClain.

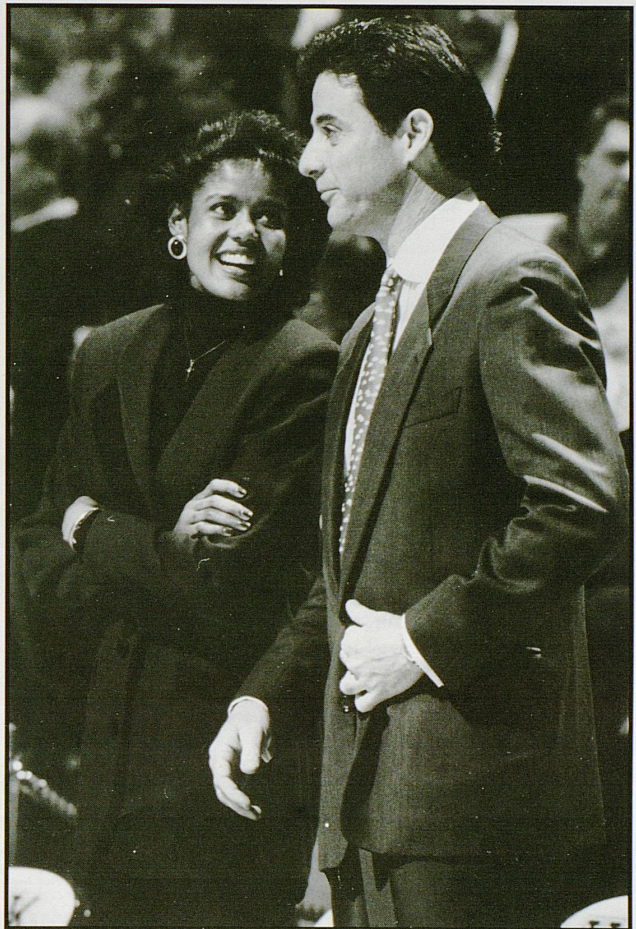
Locke-Mattox's success actually began as a collegiate player, as she led Georgia in scoring and to the 1981 National Women's Invitational Tournament title. She was also the first female athlete to earn All-America status at Georgia.

A native of Philadelphia, Tenn., Locke-Mattox played basketball for Loudon County High School. Prior to attending Georgia, she

attended Roane State Community College and played basketball for two seasons there under Andy Landers. After graduating from Georgia in 1981 with a bachelor's degree in education, Locke-Mattox remained there three seasons as a graduate assistant before leaving in 1984 to study Computer Science at DeVry Institute of Technology in Atlanta. She worked briefly for the Xerox Corporation before returning to Georgia as an assistant coach.

Since coming to UK in June of 1990, Locke-Mattox has become a frequently requested speaker at various business, community and sports-related functions. She has received numerous community and national awards and volunteers her time to local organizations. She has also worked in television broadcasting, and has served as television color commentator for UK men's basketball and women's SEC basketball games.

Locke-Mattox and her husband Vince reside in Lexington and celebrated the arrival of their first child, Vincent Alexander, in May.

Q: In your first year as head coach at Kentucky, what goals will you set and what will be your overall expectations for the team?

A: My first task will be implementing a new style of play and a new system and that will take time. With that, I'll try to make it fun and exciting for the team and the fans.

Q: What other changes can fans expect to see?

A: The fans will see more three-point shooting, running, pressing and an up-tempo style of play. What we really want to do is create more havoc and confusion for the opponents. We need to improve our three-point shooting as a team and we'll work hard on that throughout the season. We'll also work hard on improving individual shooting because that is key.

Q: What type of players are you hoping to recruit in order to get your program to the next level?

A: Obviously, recruiting is a big key for the success of a program. With our style of play we'll go after the top players in the country. Our goal is to become one of the premier teams in the nation — and you have to have top players in order to be a national contender. We'll recruit across the country, but we want to start in-state and bring those outstanding players to the University of Kentucky.

Q: You just hired a very talented staff. What are some of the characteristics that make each one of your assistants special?

A: I have put together an outstanding staff. Carolyn Peck was an All-American at Vanderbilt and played professionally in Japan for two years. She was an outstanding post player and coached for two years at the University of Tennessee.

Carolyn knows what it takes to win in the SEC and across the nation. She's very energetic and her talents will lead her to become one of the top recruiters in the nation. She brings to our staff knowledge of the game, especially at the post position.

I am thrilled to have Ken and his level of experience and knowledge working with the program. He's an accomplished high school coach who should make an easy transition to the college game. Ken has over 14 years of experience in coaching and was very successful throughout his high school coaching career in Georgia and Tennessee. Ken's expertise will be vital to the program. I think his knowledge of the game and his teaching skills will be assets to our women's program at Kentucky.

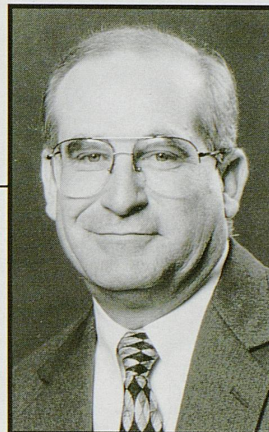
Q: One of the first changes you made was to switch the team's nickname from Lady Kats to Wildcats. Why?

A: The reason I did that is because I want our name to be more uniform. I believe the decision to change is up to each coach. You have Wildcats basketball, Wildcats volleyball, Wildcats gymnastics... I'd also like to add that I totally admire what the "Lady Kat" teams did in the past and I'm not trying to take anything from them or their accomplishments.

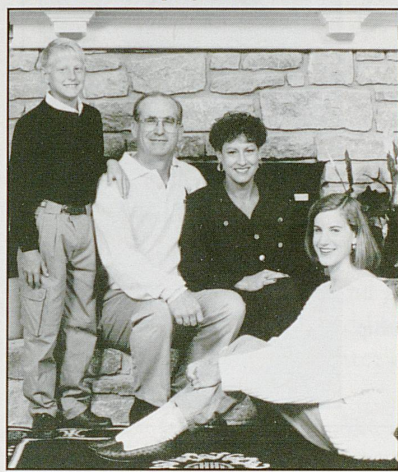
Q: Talk about the 1995-96 schedule.

A: The SEC is the top conference in the nation and that in itself is tough. I think we have one of the stronger schedules in the country. We lead off with our Invitational and then host Ohio State, with whom UK has had some very exciting games in the past. One of our most exciting matchups will be the Big 10-SEC Challenge, where we play Indiana and Tennessee plays Purdue. That will be televised on ESPN. We go to two tournaments—the Northwestern Tournament and the Big Four Classic. The Big Four features two ACC powers — Duke and N.C. State. We also have intrastate rivalries against Western Kentucky in Bowling Green and Louisville in Lexington. Syracuse and Miami (Ohio) were added this year. We begin our SEC schedule in December against Florida in Orlando. And then we head into the bulk of the conference schedule in January.

Ken Byrd Tennessee, 1972



BYRD, A 14-YEAR VETERAN OF GIRLS' HIGH SCHOOL coaching, begins his first season as an assistant coach at Kentucky. Byrd brings a wealth of coaching and administrative experience to Kentucky's women's basketball program.



A native of Friendsville, Tenn., Byrd has coached high school basketball throughout Tennessee and in Georgia. For the last seven years he coached the girls' team at Bainbridge High School in Bainbridge, Ga., leading the squad to two sub-region championships and one regional championship. While at Bainbridge he served as the Director of In-School Suspension programs and was an assistant football coach.

He also served as an Assistant to the County Athletics Director, coordinating two middle school athletics programs and high school basketball programs.

Prior to his stint at Bainbridge High, Byrd was the head girls' basketball coach at Greenback High School in Greenback, Tenn., from 1981-1986. Under his guidance, Greenback High won three district championships, two regional championships, three sub-state Tournament championships and was a runner-up in the state championship. His accomplishments earned him three District Coach-of-the-Year awards and an East Tennessee Coach-of-the-Year honor. In addition to teaching math, science and physical education at Greenback, he also coached girls' softball.

From 1979-1981 he was an assistant girls' coach and head football coach at William Blount High School in Maryville, Tenn. He began his high school coaching career at his alma mater, Friendsville High School, as the assistant boys' basketball coach from 1974-1979.

Coach Byrd earned his bachelor's degree in Education from the University of Tennessee in 1972. He earned his master's degree in Administration from Nova University in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. Byrd and his wife Chris have two children — Kamie (14) and Kolby (9).

Carolyn Peck Vanderbilt, 1988

to Kentucky with a strong history of working with top players and programs.

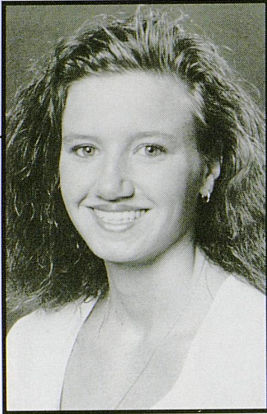
While at Tennessee, Peck learned from one of the most respected coaches in the league — Pat Summitt — while helping the Lady Vols to the NCAA Regionals two years ago and a runner-up finish in the NCAA Finals last season. Prior to her

stint at Tennessee, Peck played professional basketball for the Nippondenso Corporation in Japan from 1991-93, helping the team to a third-place finish in its league in 1993. She was third in the league in rebounding in 1991 and 1992.

The 6-foot-4 Peck was a standout center at Vanderbilt from 1984-88. She was team captain her junior and senior seasons and played her way onto three top-10 career statistical lists and several other all-time stats lists at Vanderbilt. She earned her bachelor's degree in communications from Vanderbilt in 1988 and went to work for a Nashville television station as a marketing consultant shortly thereafter. She then sold pharmaceuticals for Merck Sharp and Dohme, a Fortune 500 company, for two years.

The Jefferson City, Tenn., native was a two-time high school All-American and Miss Tennessee basketball at Jefferson County High School.

Peck, who speaks some Japanese, is single and resides in Lexington.



Kerry Cremeans

Florida, 1994

Kerry Cremeans enters her second season as a graduate assistant for the women's basketball program. Cremeans is familiar with the SEC, having played collegiate basketball at the University of Florida.

While at UF, Cremeans provided leadership and was a consistent threat from three-point range. As a senior, she received the Unsung Gator Award, Highest team GPA Award and the 1994 Dedicated Gator Award for her relentless work in the weight room.

On the court, Cremeans nailed at least one three pointer in 19 consecutive games. She played in all 29 games as a senior, starting 22 times and averaging 25.4 minutes of playing time.

Cremeans scored a career-high 27 points against Alabama and grabbed a career-high seven boards against LSU as a senior.

Off the court, Cremeans made a name for herself in the classroom. The Wheelersburg, Ohio native is a three-time All-SEC Academic Honor Roll honoree and was named the Gator Booster News Student-Athlete of the Week. She was a district finalist for GTE Academic All-America honors and was nominated for an NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship.



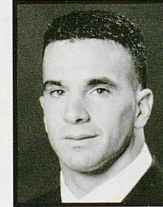

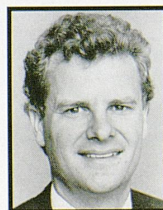

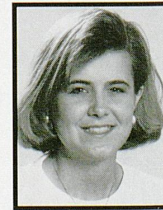

The University of Kentucky continues to keep the term “student-athlete” in the proper perspective — student first, athlete second. The University of Kentucky opened the nation’s first academic center for student-athletes in 1981. The academic center is known as the Center for Academic and Tutorial Services (CATS).

CATS is located inside Memorial Coliseum. The center, specifically designed with the student-athlete in mind, contains a large general study area along with numerous smaller rooms used for tutoring. CATS expanded in 1994 and added a language library, additional tutoring rooms, a media center and a new computer facility.

“Our Center for Academic Services (CATS) at the University of Kentucky was the first of its kind and is like no other academic center in the country,” said UK coach Bernadette Locke-Mattox. “CATS offers tutorial assistance and computers, along with many other resources for the student-athletes. The CATS facility provides an uninterrupted study environment for our athletes to successfully complete their undergraduate degrees.”

While Locke-Mattox’s views on academics are echoed throughout the athletics department, former UK Football Coach Jerry Claiborne also put the importance of CATS in perspective when he said: “There is no question, the CATS Center is a very important part of not only the UK Football program, but the entire athletics program. Academic pursuits come first at Kentucky.”

Bob Bradley, Assistant A.D. for Academics, supervises CATS and is

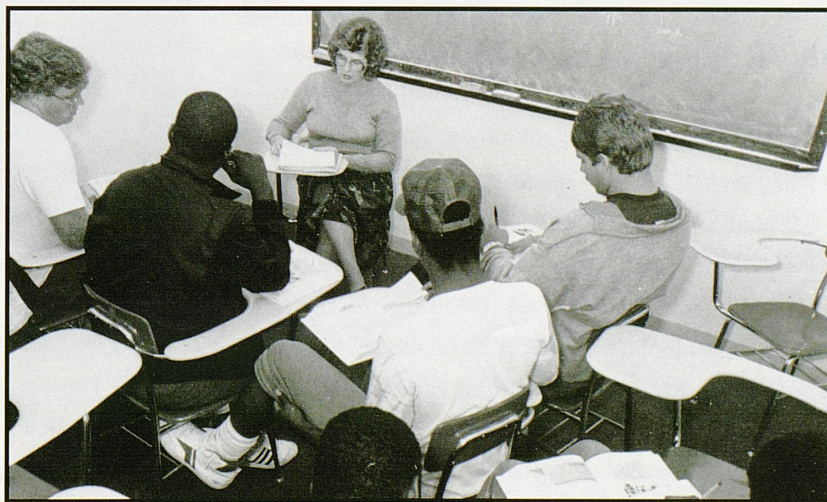

by Barbara Deniston, Mike Haley, Sheila Breeding, and Darren Bilberry. CATS also employs five graduate assistants and numerous tutors, both from the University and the Lexington community.

“CATS is an incredible advantage to a student-athlete,” Bradley says. Bradley also says it helps to have head coaches that place such a strong emphasis on academics. “Many support systems across the nation do an excellent job in helping their student-athletes,”

Bradley said. “I have been blessed at Kentucky.”

The philosophy at the University of Kentucky is this: Colleges should be able to afford the student-athlete with every opportunity to succeed not only in athletics, but in academics as well. Looking at recent statistics in Academic Honor Roll selections and graduation rates, it is clear that Kentucky is standing by its philosophy.





THE 1995-96 SEASON, AS WELL AS THE FUTURE, looks bright for the University of Kentucky women's basketball program. The season is new, the era is new and, perhaps most notably, the coach is new. Although this will be a new experience for first-year head coach Bernadette Locke-Mattox, she definitely will be an asset for the program as she brings with her valuable experience in coaching both men's and women's basketball.

This season, Locke-Mattox will try to mold the Wildcats with her own philosophies and mesh them with strategies she learned while at her alma mater, Georgia, and from her four seasons as assistant to UK men's basketball coach Rick Pitino. The end result should be a rise in fan excitement and an improved playing level of returning players, who have shown spunk, talent and the will to win.

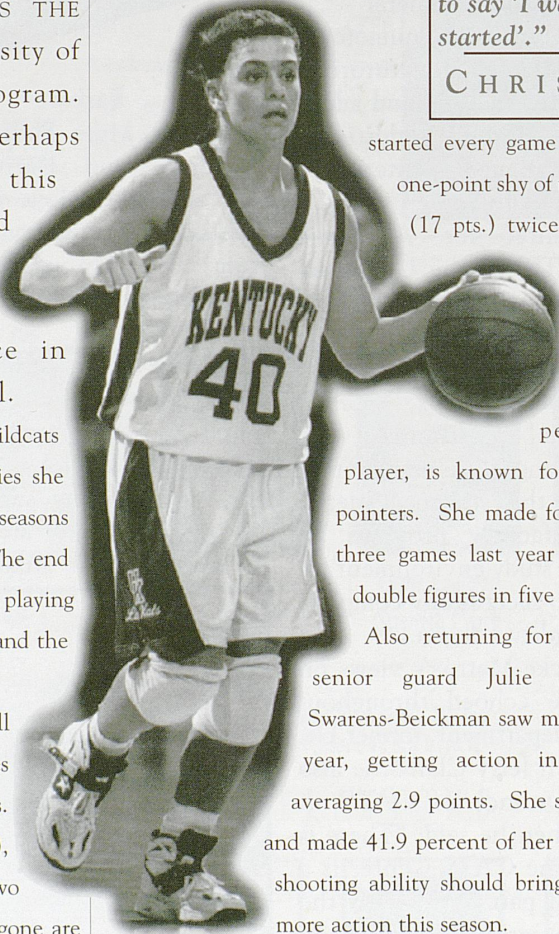
The first task facing Locke-Mattox and her staff will be filling voids. UK begins this season without the services of four starters, who combined for an average of 35.8 points. Gone is All-SEC guard/forward Stacey Reed (graduation), who led the team in scoring and rebounding the last two seasons and assists and steals the last four seasons. Also gone are center Karri Koach (graduation), guard Chrissy Roberts (personal reasons), forward Keeoma Wardford (personal reasons) and forward Stephanie Baker (graduation). Reed and Koach were the two most recognized offensive forces last year. Reed led the team with averages

of 13.2 points and 6.8 boards per game. Koach was right on her heels, averaging 12.4 points and 5.9 boards per game.

Leadership duties will probably shift to senior guard Christina Jansen, who has been a regular in the starting lineup since her sophomore season. Last season she averaged 6.8 points and 3.1 rebounds per game. She

CHRIS JANSEN



started every game last year and came one-point shy of tying her career-high (17 pts.) twice, scoring 16 against

nationally-ranked Western Kentucky and South Carolina. Jansen, a perimeter-oriented player, is known for launching three-pointers. She made four three-pointers in three games last year and also scored in double figures in five other contests.

Also returning for her final season is senior guard Julie Swarens-Beickman. Swarens-Beickman saw more playing time last year, getting action in 27 games, while averaging 2.9 points. She started in four games and made 41.9 percent of her shots. Maturity and shooting ability should bring Swarens-Beickman more action this season.

Playing at small forward are 5-11 sophomore Latasha Peterson, 5-10 sophomore Shaunda Roberts and 6-2 sophomore Vonda Jackson. Roberts played in every game, finishing fifth on the team in scoring with an average of 6.5 points and 2.4 rebounds per game. She hit double figures in eight games, including a season-high

performance of 18 points on the road against Cal State-Northridge. Roberts can hurt opponents in the paint or on the perimeter, as she did against Marshall, hitting 5-of-9 field goals, including three 3-pointers.

Peterson (1.7 ppg) provided depth last season, playing in 20 games, averaging 6.4 minutes. Although shoulder injuries hampered her at the beginning of the season, she scored in nine games, including a seven-point performance against Morehead State.

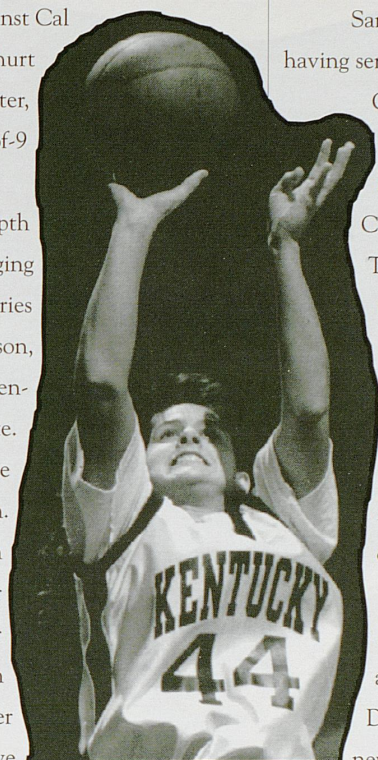
Jackson (5.0 ppg) brings more size to the Wildcats' power forward position. At 6-2, Jackson was on her way to an outstanding freshman season last year when she suffered a dislocated shoulder eight games into the season, which sidelined her for eight games. Prior to her injury, Jackson had scored 10 points five times. She ended her freshman year having played in 20 games with one start, and averaged five points and three rebounds.

Junior guard Stephanie Higginbotham (1.8 ppg) returns to the squad after

missing most of last season following shoulder surgery.

The addition of assistant coach Carolyn Peck should improve UK's post play, as the young-but-talented duo of 6-3 sophomore Kim Denkins and 6-2 junior Anne Sarkalahti take charge at center.

Denkins played in 27 games and started in nine of UK's last 10 matchups. She averaged 5.4 points and 5.3 boards per game. Denkins scored in 25 games, hitting double figures four times. Her season-best performance was 14 points against LSU. Denkins grabbed at least five rebounds in 16 games. She had 10 against Eastern Kentucky and nine against Auburn during the regular season and again in the first round of the SEC Tournament. She was second on the team in blocked shots with a total of 16, including three against EKU.



Sarkalahti, nicknamed "Finland", hasn't seen much action, having served as a backup to Wildcat centers Jocelyn Mills, Jennifer Gray and Karri Koach the last couple of years. She played in 13 games last season, averaging just under three minutes of playing time, and scored two points against California State-Northridge, Marshall and Morehead State. The newcomers will add plenty of depth to the program as they make the transition to the collegiate game. Tiffany Wait, a 5-10 guard/forward from Hot Springs, Ark., may see immediate action. Wait averaged 21.3 points, 10 rebounds, 4.5 steals and six assists per game at Lake Hamilton High School. In addition to being named Miss Arkansas Basketball, Wait was an all-state and all-conference player for three consecutive years.

Shawn Manning, a 6-1 power forward from Metairie, La., averaged 12.4 points, six rebounds and five assists at Ecole Classique High.

Domonique Mitchell and Marcia Webb round out the list of newcomers. Mitchell, a 5-7 point guard from Louisville

Pleasure Ridge Park, averaged 14 points and eight rebounds per game as a senior. She was a two-time co-captain and was named honorable mention all-state after leading PRP to a 15-9 record as a senior.

Mitchell's on-court accomplishments earned her PRP's Outstanding Female Athlete of the Year, while her classroom accomplishments earned her the C.W. Miller Athletic Academic scholarship.

Webb was the first signee for Coach Locke-Mattox, dotting the line in April. The 6-2 forward also is the first Lexington signee for the program since Tracye Davis (1987-91). Webb averaged 23 points, 12.3 rebounds and five blocked shots to lead Bryan Station High School to an 18-8 record last season. She was named second-team all-state and had a season-best performance of 35 points, 15 rebounds and eight blocked shots against Franklin County High School as a senior.

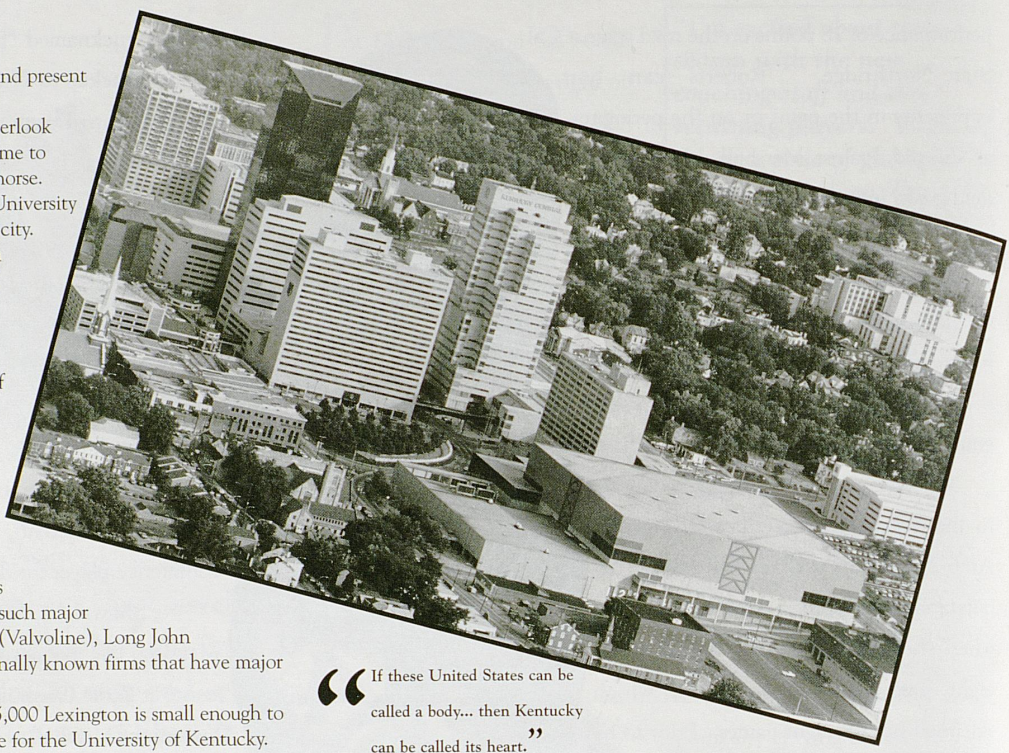

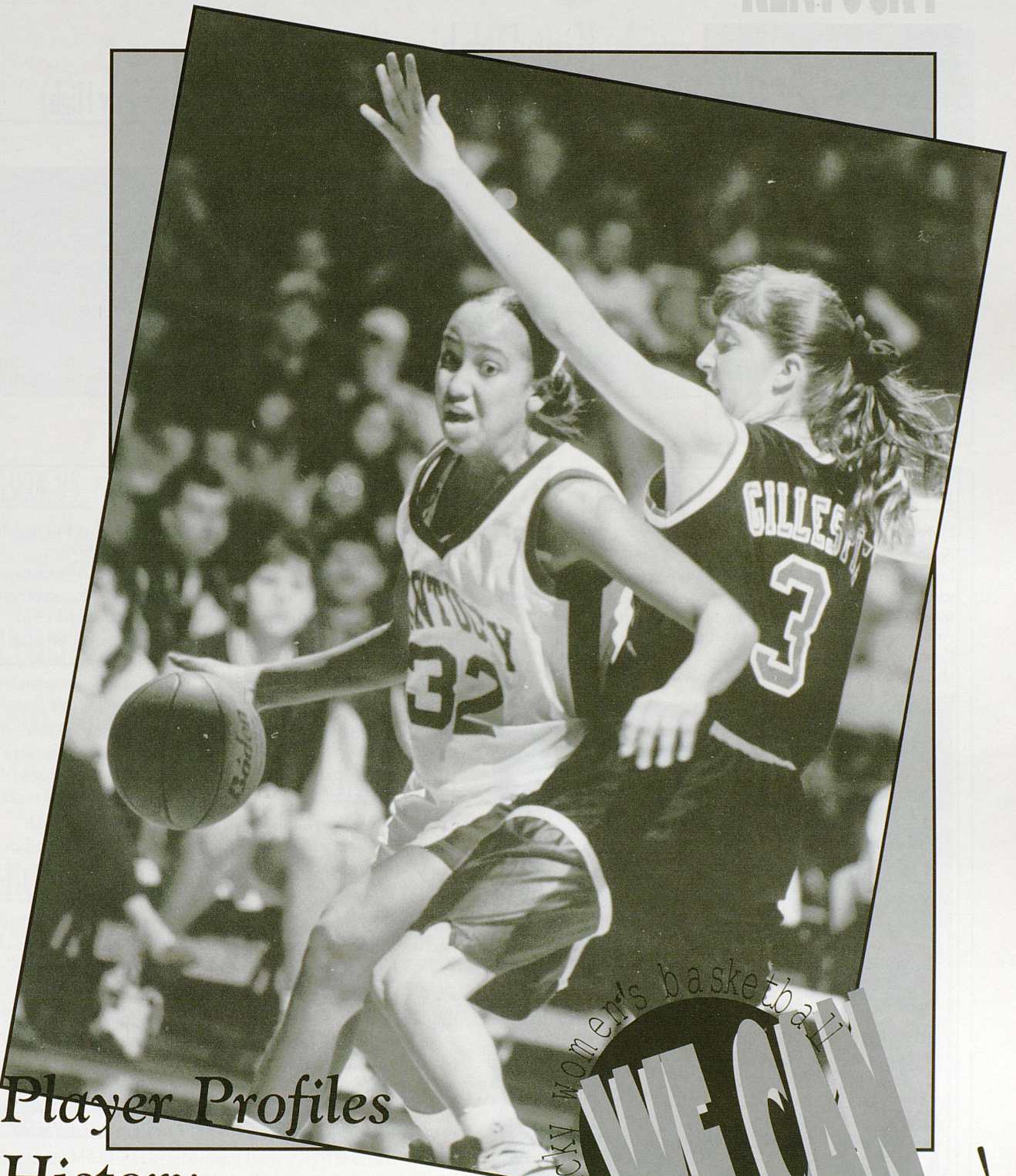
Abraham Lincoln was born in

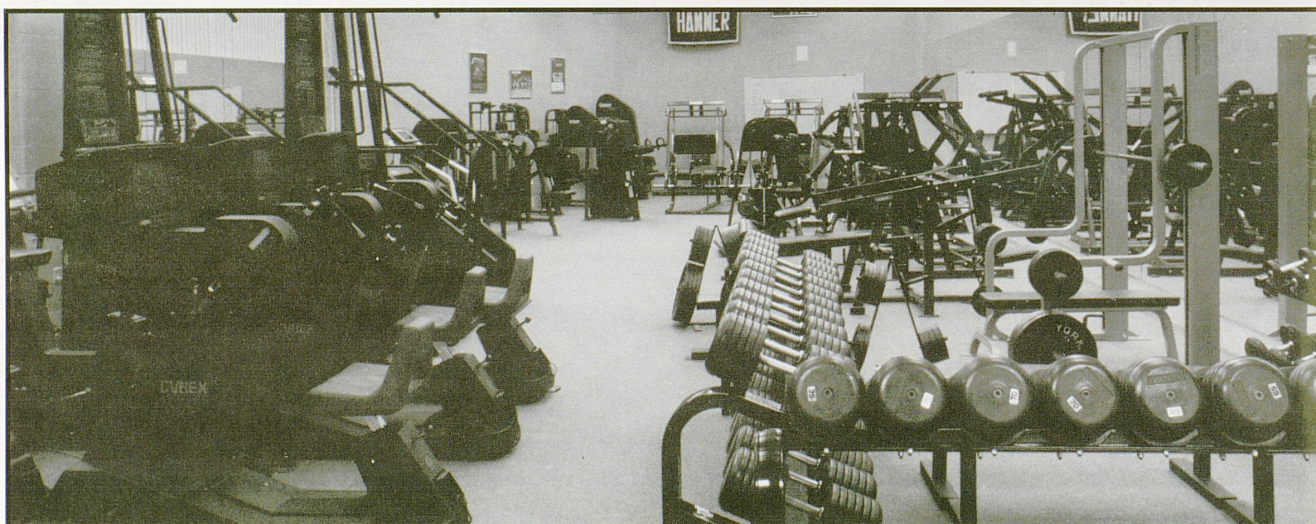
"HOME SWEET HOME"

SITUATED ALONG EUCLID AVENUE ON THE UNIVERSITY OF Kentucky campus, Memorial Coliseum is the home of one of the richest basketball traditions in the nation. It is also home to the University of Kentucky women's basketball team, a team determined to return glory and excitement to a facility that has known a wealth of both.

For 24 years, the historic coliseum housed the renowned Kentucky Wildcats, who won two national championships and 24 Southeastern Conference titles while playing in the facility under the direction of legendary coaches Adolph Rupp and Joe B. Hall. When the Wildcats moved downtown to 23,000-seat Rupp Arena in 1976, the then-11,500 seat Coliseum became the exclusive basketball home for the women's team.

The women's team has carved a 225-80 homecourt record into the history of the now 8,700-seat coliseum. To fans' delight, UK and its opponents have played several exciting and close games in the facility.

The highlight of the Memorial Coliseum era for the women's basketball team came on a cold winter night in 1983. The date was February 5 and the opponent was No. 5 powerhouse Old Dominion, with 6-foot-8 All-American center Anne Donovan. A record crowd of 10,622 fired-up fans packed the Coliseum that Saturday evening and roared hysterically as the sixth-ranked Lady Kats came from 10 points down in the second half for an 80-66 upset win. After the victory, the team, which was led by All-American Valerie Still, climbed to No. 4 in the national poll. In their three remaining games, they averaged 7,600 fans and easily led the nation in attendance that year.

Other exciting and notable games played in the Coliseum were:

February 20, 1994 - Considered a huge underdog, UK's women's team managed to take then top-ranked Tennessee into overtime before losing 95-89 in front of an estimated crowd of 5,727 fans.

January 19, 1993 - Sophomore Stacey Reed drove to the Coliseum's midcourt and made a three-point desperation shot as the final horn sounded to push UK to a 62-60 win over nationally-ranked intrastate rival Western Kentucky. Reed was mobbed by her teammates and the coaching staff at midcourt, but managed to crawl out of the pile while they were still celebrating.

December 5, 1992 - This was the date when Kentucky beat nationally-ranked Connecticut 75-54 to win its 13th UK Invitational Tournament. It was not an easy feat for UK, which had lost the title the previous year to nationally-ranked Houston. Also, UK had to face a sizable young sophomore — Rebecca Lobo — who would later become one of the most heralded female players ever, leading her team to an undefeated season and a national title in 1995.

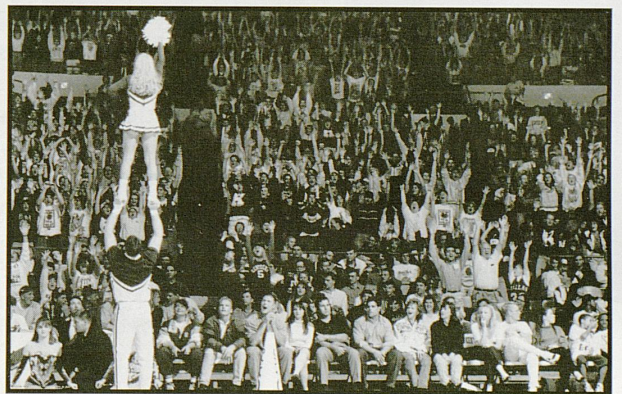
Ohio State series - UK's series with Ohio State has been a nail-biter for both teams. The teams took games into overtime in 1989 and 1991. UK beat Ohio State in regulation in Memorial Coliseum on November 28, 1990, 107-73.

1980-82 - These years represent the seasons when the women's team posted its record 31 consecutive homecourt victories in Memorial Coliseum. The streak was broken on January 31, 1982, with a 70-69 loss to Memphis State.

Although the Coliseum is nicknamed "the house that Rupp built", University President H.L. Donovan is credited with beginning the plans for the Coliseum's construction in 1941 when he recommended a building that would "properly take care of our athletics, our health services, our physical education and our recreation".

Memorial Coliseum was completed in 1950 at a cost of \$3,995,000. The huge building was dedicated to serve as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentuckians who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict. The Coliseum covers an entire city block and has as much space as a seven-story office building.

The facility underwent renovations in 1990 to include a state-of-the-art weight room, basketball and administrative offices, a team meeting room and first-class dressing and lockerrooms. The Coliseum is used primarily for women's basketball games, volleyball matches, gymnastics meets and is the site for UK's annual Midnight Madness Basketball Practice. It has also served as the site of other sporting events, including tennis exhibitions and high school tournaments, and has served as a site for lectures and concerts.

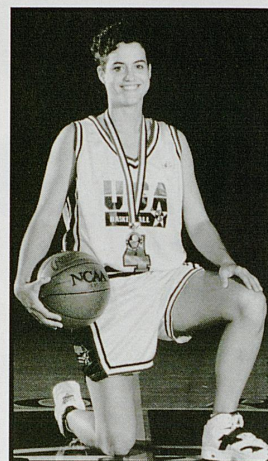

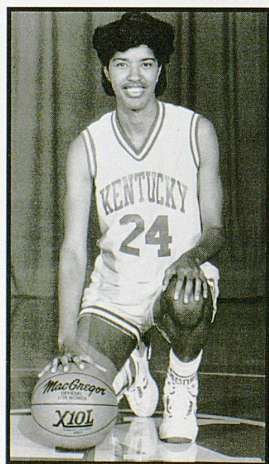
KRISTI CUSHENBERRY

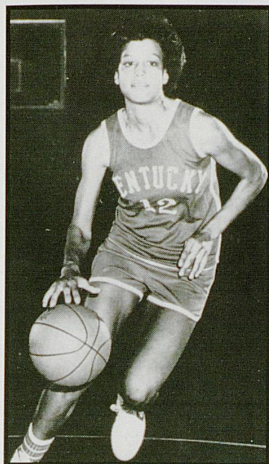
LESLIE NICHOLS

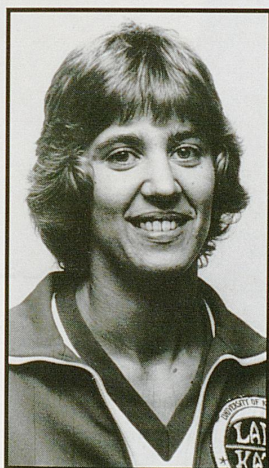
VANESSA FOSTER-SUTTON

A Street and Smith All-American (1977), who ranks third in all-time scoring (1,598). Led her team in scoring from 1974-77, while averaging a school-record 25.5 points per game her junior year.



MARIA DONHOFF

Led UK in scoring in 1977-78, averaging 12.5 points per game. Named NWIT All-America in 1978 after leading UK to a third-place finish.

Ranks ninth in all-time scoring (1,187) and sixth in all-time rebounding (692).



LEA WISE

An All-SEC guard in 1982, who was a member of UK's only SEC Tournament championship team. Was also a member of UK's No. 4 ranked women's basketball team in 1983. Ranks 11th in all-time scoring with 1,179 career points, fourth in all-time assists (461) and 11th in all-time steals (157).



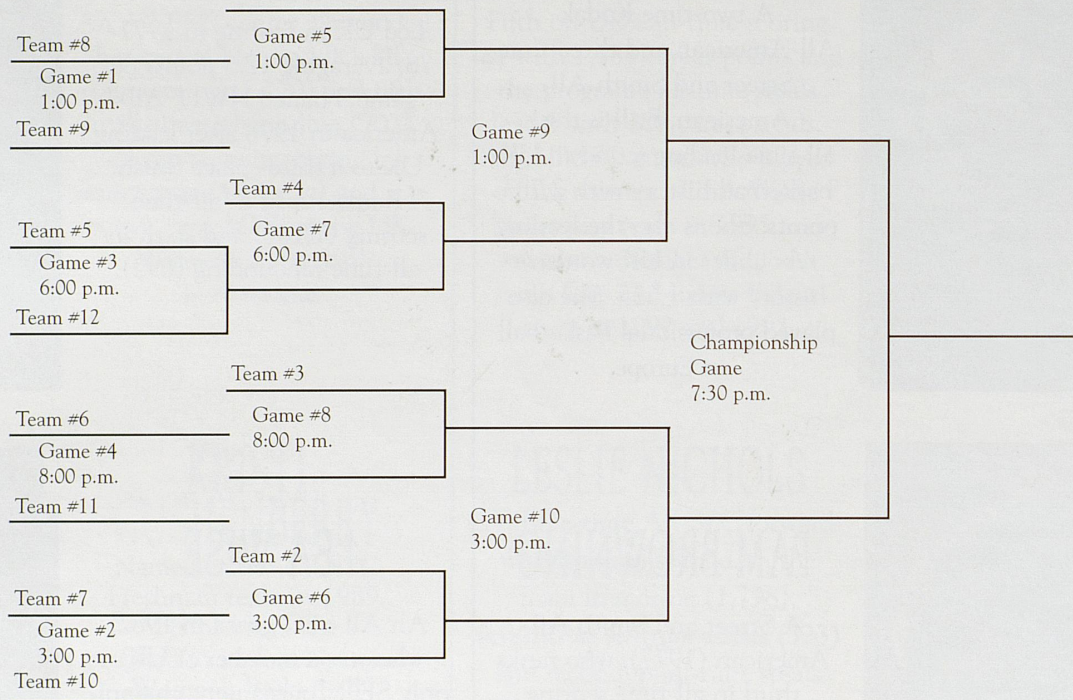
PATTY JO HEDGES

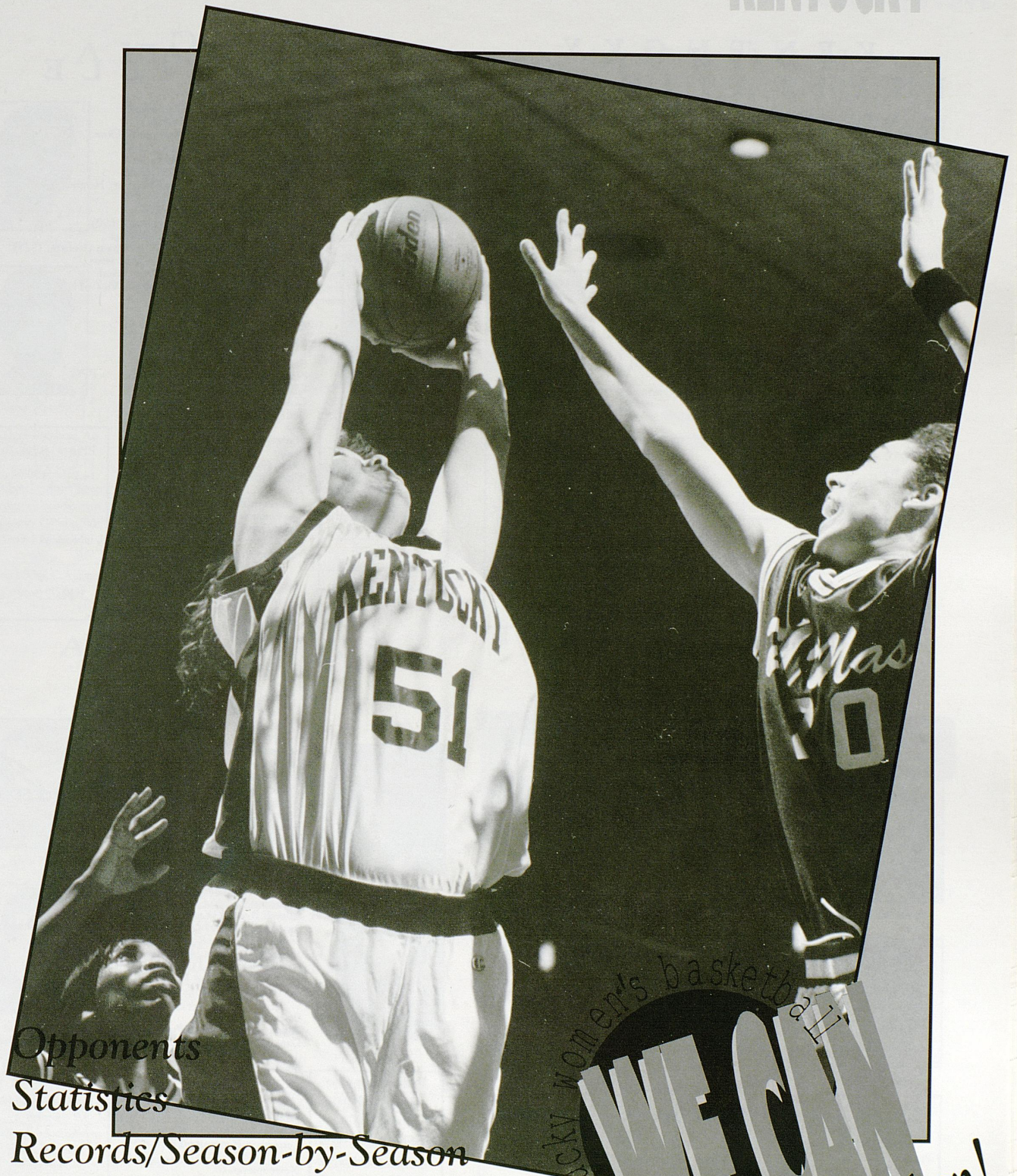
HELP MAKE THE DREAM OF A UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY BASKETBALL MUSEUM A REALITY

That talk has now turned into action with an appointment of a board of directors and a kickoff to a \$3 million capital campaign in mid-1994. The goal is to occupy 10,000 square feet in the Civic Center Shoppes adjacent to Rupp Arena, with the most technologically advanced interactive museum the basketball world has ever seen.

The museum will include memorabilia from the past as well as interactive exhibits that depict the history that is University of Kentucky basketball. Virtual reality will let you step on the floor against all-time leading scorers Valerie Still and Dan Issel.

Since its inception in 1994, the University of Kentucky Basketball Museum, Inc., has raised over \$810,000 toward the capital campaign goal and stirred excitement with Wildcats fans both young and old. The highlight of the campaign was held this past June 9-11. Wildcat Reunion Weekend spanned three days with a tribute dinner, inaugural golf tournament, and shoot-arounds and ended with a statewide FUNDathon that raised over \$300,000 in one day. Nearly 80 former Wildcats players returned to Lexington for the festivities and fans were able to rub elbows with the greats of the past.

But the work is not complete. Contributions from Kentucky fans are still needed. The museum is being designed concurrently with fundraising activities. The UK women's basketball team had the most wins (25) in the program's history in 1980-81 and the fewest losses (5) in 1982-83 and 1979-80.

The Wildcats won the National Women's Invitational Tournament title in 1990.

The Wildcats have made four appearances in the NCAA Tournament (1991, 1986, 1983, 1982).

RECORD: 14-14 OVERALL; 4-7 SEC (9TH)



SENIORS STACEY REED AND KARRI KOACH WERE THE LEADERS OF THE young-but-determined 1994-95 squad. Kentucky had its triumphs and tribulations during the year, finishing at 14-14 overall and 4-7 in the league. Nevertheless, the team managed to stay competitive and play aggressive basketball.

Reed, who was moved from guard to forward at the beginning of the season, led the team in scoring and rebounding for the second consecutive year, averaging 13.8 points and 6.8 rebounds. She was named All-SEC (second team) and became the program's all-time steals leader with a total of 309 career steals. Reed scored in double figures 21 times, reaching 20 points or more on four occasions. She also had four double-double games.

Koach was second on the team in scoring and rebounding, averaging 12.4 points and 5.9 rebounds per game. She led the team in scoring vs. SEC opponents, averaging 12.8 points. She scored in double figures 18 times, including a

career-high 23 points against Vanderbilt.

Kentucky posted several big wins, including a 67-54 victory over St. John's to win its Lady Kat Invitational Tournament title. The team also downed nationally-ranked Florida 63-55 in Rupp Arena before a crowd of more than 5,000 fans. Kentucky lost to Auburn 73-62 during the regular season, but avenged the loss in the first round of the SEC Tournament, beating the Tigers 75-51. In the second round, UK faced Tennessee and managed to hold the score to 34-30 at halftime. However, the Lady Volunteers overpowered the Kats in the second half and won, 74-62.

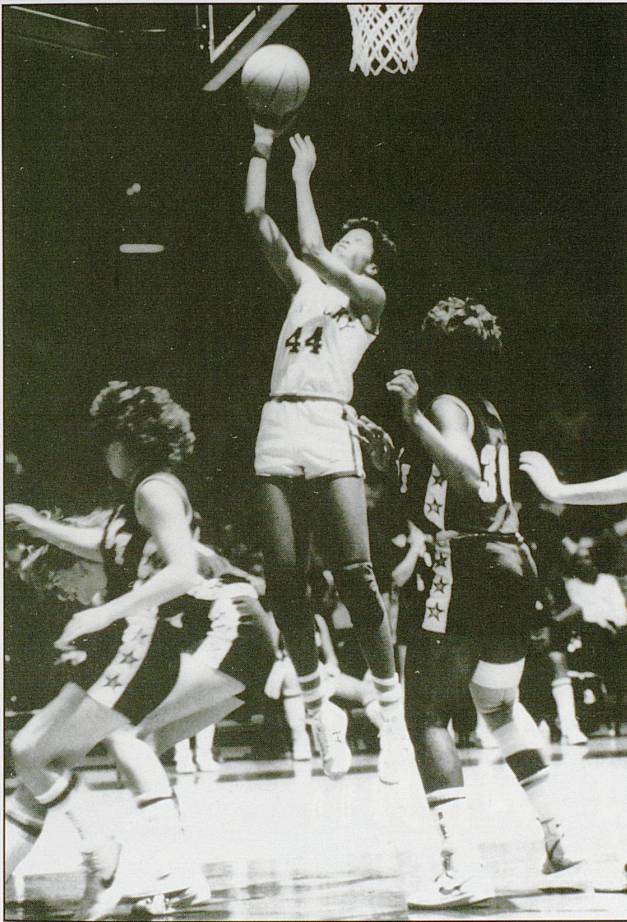
*UK averaged 1,195 fans at home and 1,896 fans on the road for an average of 1,560 in 28 games. *Reed, Koach and Chris Jansen started in all 28 games. *UK averaged 65.6 points per game, while holding opponents to 62.8 points.

*Head coach Sharon Fanning ended her eight-year career at UK with a 134-97 record.

IT WAS THE FALL OF 1974 WHEN WOMEN'S basketball at the University of Kentucky finally reached varsity status, and sighs of relief were heard throughout a state that prides itself in a great basketball tradition. However, women's basketball actually had made its debut at UK exactly 50 years earlier.

KNOWN AS THE "EARLY ERA", a period that spanned 21 years, from the first collegiate game on Feb. 21, 1903, until the last on March, 5, 1924, the women's team experienced many exciting seasons. Under the direction of Coach Jane Todd Watson, the women of UK (known as Kentucky State College) engaged in several matches that took attention away from matches held by the men. Playing before an estimated crowd of 500 spectators, the State (UK) women beat Kentucky University 16-10 in the first intercollegiate game between women's teams in Lexington. The following year, State College beat Georgetown 14-10 and Jessamine Female Institution 28-1.

It's noted that the women had gained the attention of the students and the public in the early 1900s. However, the game was

slowed in part to chauvinistic attitudes of the times and facility inadequacies. Described in the Kentuckian yearbook in 1904 as "fair Amazons", the women had to contend with poor facilities, lack of practice time and difficulty in arranging games due to lack of competition.

In 1910 the women's program joined the Athletics Association, which compelled the men to share practice time and coaching with the women. The women lost their first game that year, but won the final eight on their schedule.

Over the next 14 years, the women would have such fine coaches as:

- DR. JOHN J. TIGERT, a former football and basketball star at Vanderbilt who attended Oxford on a Rhodes Scholarship and later became president at the University of Florida.

- WILLIAM TUTTLE, former UK basketball team captain and football star.

- JIM PARK, former UK baseball, track, basketball and football star. He later played major league baseball and is credited with delivering the first home run pitch to a young Babe Ruth.

- SARAH BLANDING, who played and coached the KSC women, and later became president of Vassar College.

- A.B. "HAPPY" CHANDLER, two-time governor of Kentucky, U.S. Senator and Baseball Commissioner.

- BART PEAK, a UK football and basketball letterman, who later became a Lexington Fayette County judge noted for such punishment of juvenile offenders as making them kiss their parents.

- The first coach of the "modern era" was SUE FEAMSTER, who guided the 1974-75 team to a 16-9 record.

Since then, the team has been directed by coaches DEBBIE YOW, who is now athletics director at Maryland; TERRY HALL, now the coach at Wright State whose teams set the single-game attendance record and earned the program's highest national ranking twice (4th) in 1983; and SHARON FANNING, who guided the 1990 team to the NWIT title.

The program now enters a new era with head coach BERNADETTE LOCKE-MATTOX. The team will have a new style of play and will no longer call itself the Lady Kats, but will instead go by Wildcats.

Numerous players have left their mark on the program in the modern era. Fans might say the first trio to make their presence felt were Pam Browning (1976-78), Maria Donhoff (1977-81) and Liz Lukschu (1977-81). However, the most popular group was the 1982-83 lineup of All-American Valerie Still, who continues to hold the all-time scoring record for both men and women's basketball at UK, Patty Jo Hedges, Lea Wise, Leslie Nichols and Lisa Collins. These five set team, individual and SEC and NCAA records that still stand.

As the UK women's basketball program moves into the next century, it certainly takes with it an exciting history.

A pioneer in the integration of higher education and athletic competition, the Southeastern Conference stands ready to advance intercollegiate athletics in the 21st century.

SINCE ITS FORMATION in 1933, the SEC achieved both stature and stability by designating governing/voting power to the presidents of the member institutions. They have determined the policies of the conference and through the years this involvement has been the principal source of strength in the evolution of the SEC. Throughout its 63-year history, the SEC has provided leadership on the vital issues facing intercollegiate competition. In 1993, the member institutions adopted The Principles of Gender Equity.

COMMITTED TO INCREASING the quantity and quality of women athletic opportunities, each school will provide at least two more women's intercollegiate programs than the number of men's. Faced with the task of conference realignment after competing with 10 members since 1966, the SEC welcomed the University of Arkansas on Aug. 1, 1990, and the University of South Carolina on Sept. 25, 1990. Joining charter members Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, LSU, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Tennessee and Vanderbilt, on July 1, 1991, Arkansas and South Carolina became the first schools added in conference history.

FULLY INCORPORATED into conference competition by 1992, Arkansas and South Carolina participated in SEC championships for all sports except football during the 1991-92 academic year. The SEC was again at the forefront, introducing football, basketball and baseball divisional play and the nation's first-ever Division I football championship game.

SEC SCHOOLS BEGAN ATHLETIC competition with one another almost 100 years ago as members of the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Association. Seven institutions (Alabama, Auburn, Georgia, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, Sewanee and Vanderbilt) attended the SIAA organizational meeting of faculty representatives, called by Dr. William L. Dudley of Vanderbilt, in Atlanta Dec. 22, 1894.

STUDENT TEAMS from the schools began meeting in various sports with little pattern to their contests. The American adaptation of the English game rugby, called football, was drifting down from the East and Midwest. Southerners were quickly attracted to this sport formalized in 1869.

The first football game in the Southeast was played April 9, 1880, at Stoll Field at the University of Kentucky. Kentucky A & M

(now UK) organized a team and in November 1881, played Transylvania College in a three-game series. By 1895 11 current SEC members were playing football. Basketball moved quickly to the South as Vanderbilt was playing at the Nashville YMCA in 1893, just two years after Dr. James Naismith originated the game at Springfield (Mass.) College.

Track was organized on a conference level at the 1895 SIAA meeting presided over by President Dudley who served until his death in 1914. The first championship meet was held at Vanderbilt May 15, 1896. By 1900 eight of the 13 charter SEC members were participating.

The seven-member SIAA expanded to 19 institutions in 1895 (Alabama, Auburn, Central, Clemson, Cumberland, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, LSU, Mercer, Mississippi State, Nashville, North Carolina, Sewanee, Southwestern Presbyterian, Tennessee, Texas, Tulane and Vanderbilt) and by 1920 there were 30 members.

THE LARGER SCHOOLS reorganized as the Southern Conference at a meeting in Gainesville Dec. 12-13, 1920. Professor S.V. Sanford of Georgia called the meeting and served as the first president. Charter members of the Southern Conference included: Alabama, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Maryland, Mississippi State, North Carolina, North Carolina State, Tennessee, Virginia, Virginia Tech and Washington & Lee.

DESPITE AN ORIGINAL LIMIT OF 16, the membership grew to 23 by 1928. In 1922 Florida, Louisiana State, Mississippi, South Carolina, Tulane, Vanderbilt and Virginia Military joined, while Sewanee and Duke became members in 1923 and 1928 respectively. At one time or another the SIAA and the SEC included most of the Southern colleges from Virginia to Texas.

The 13 members west and south of the Appalachian Mountains reorganized as the Southeastern Conference at the annual SC meeting of Dec. 8-9, 1932, in Knoxville. The 10 coast members remained in the Southern Conference. Dr. Frank L. McVey of Kentucky was elected president of the new conference whose charter members were: Alabama, Auburn, Florida, Georgia, Georgia Tech, Kentucky, Louisiana State, Mississippi, Mississippi State, Sewanee, Tennessee, Tulane and Vanderbilt. (Sewanee withdrew Dec. 13, 1940, Georgia Tech on June 1, 1964 and Tulane on June 1, 1966). McVey held an informal meeting of the school presidents in Birmingham Feb. 16, 1933, then the first full meeting in Atlanta, Feb. 27.

THE OFFICE OF the commissioner was formed in 1940 in Jackson due to the great amount of detail work developing, especially in recruiting and eligibility. Former Mississippi Governor Martin S. Conner took office as commissioner Aug. 21, 1940. Conner later became ill and the secretary of the conference, Dean N.W. Dougherty of Tennessee, served as acting commissioner during the fall of 1946.

The office moved to Birmingham with the appointing of Bernie H. Moore as the second full-time commissioner on Feb. 21, 1948. Moore, a former LSU coach, guided the

SEC to national respect in his 18-year tenure. A.M. (Tonto) Coleman succeeded Moore upon his retirement April 1, 1966. The Alabama native, who was reared in Texas and experienced in athletic coaching and administration, served six and a half years.

Dr. H. Boyd McWhorter, then Dean of Arts and Sciences at Georgia and secretary of the league since 1967, accepted the position upon the retirement of Coleman Aug. 1, 1972. Under his leadership the SEC experienced unparalleled growth. In McWhorter's first year the SEC distributed \$1.57 million in revenue to the member institutions.

Dr. Harvey S. Schiller, an Air Force colonel and faculty chair at the U.S. Air Force Academy, followed McWhorter upon retirement, taking office Sept. 15, 1986. Under his guidance the SEC established itself as a leader in the areas of athletic scholarship and marketing.

ROY F. KRAMER succeeded Schiller on Jan. 10, 1990. Kramer who has served on numerous NCAA committees, joined the league office after spending 12 years as athletic director at Vanderbilt.

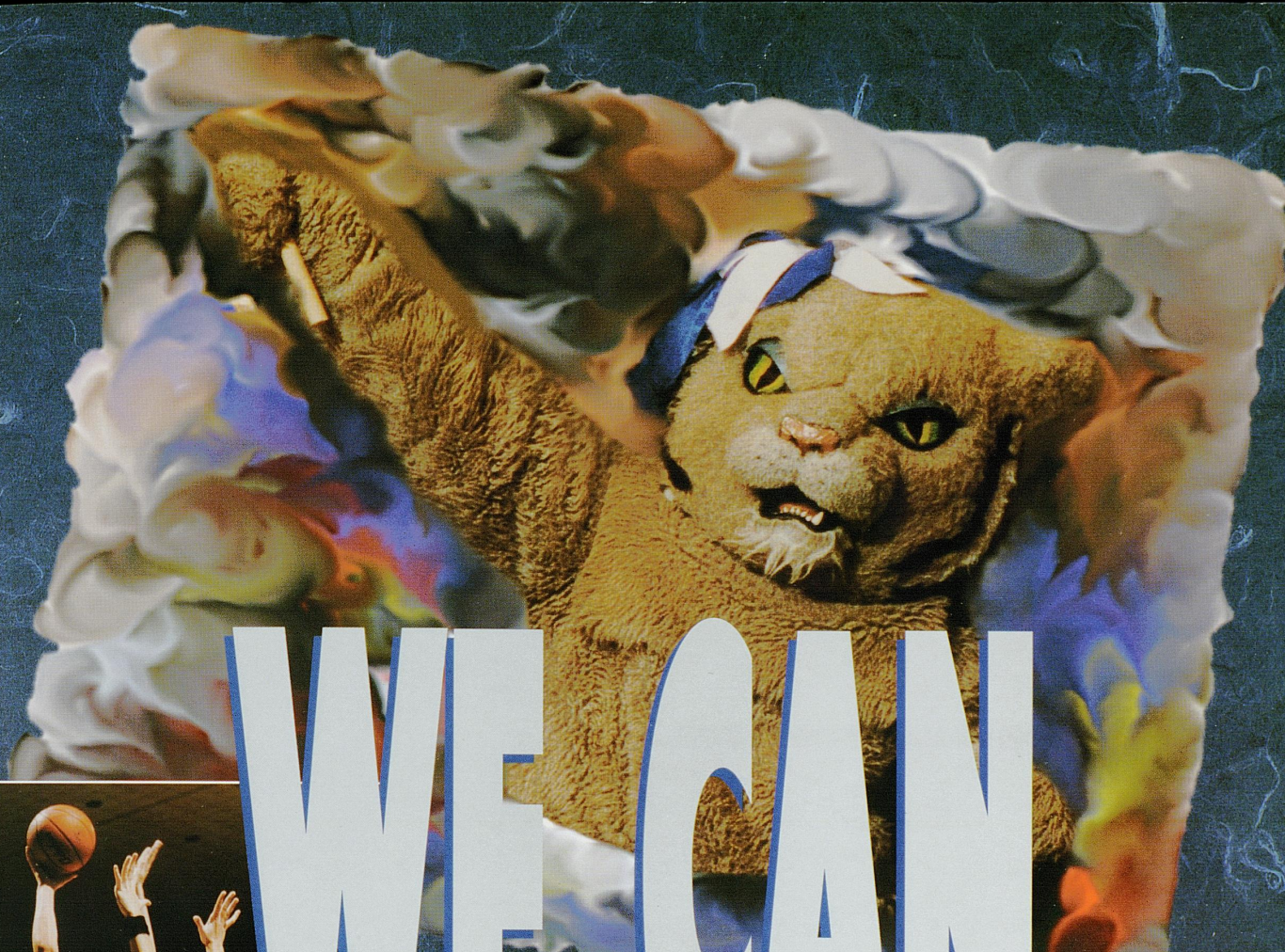
THE FIRST SEC CHAMPIONS were crowned in 1933 in baseball, basketball, football and outdoor track. The league's inaugural championship event was a basketball tournament in Atlanta Feb. 24-28, 1933. Records show the first men's team title for cross country was awarded in 1935, while golf and swimming were added in 1937. The league later began hosting championships in tennis (1953) and indoor track (1957).

In the 1979-80 academic year SEC championships for women were recognized in basketball, tennis and volleyball. The following year golf, gymnastics, swimming and track and field were added. The administration of women's athletics officially came under the auspices of the conference office on Sept. 1, 1984.

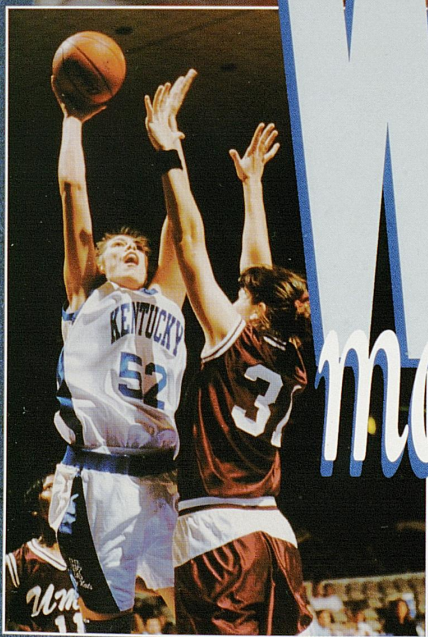
The SEC currently regulates nine men's sports and 10 women's sports: Men: baseball, basketball, football, golf, swimming, tennis and track (cross country, indoor and outdoor). Women: basketball, golf, gymnastics, soccer, swimming, tennis, track (cross country, indoor and outdoor) and volleyball.

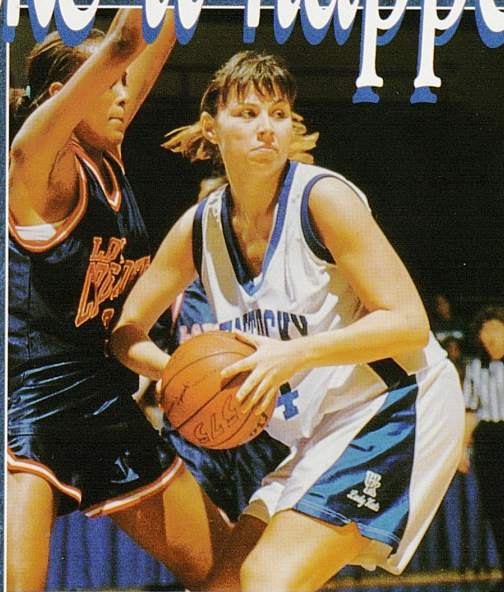

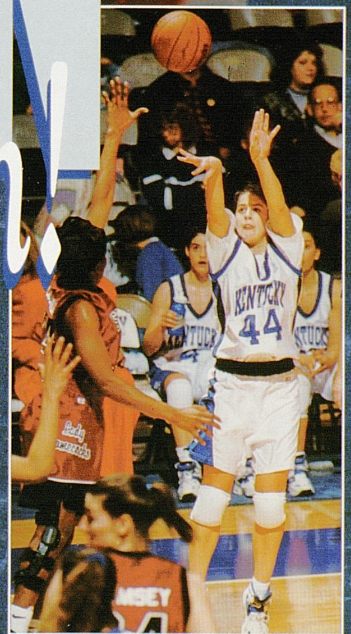

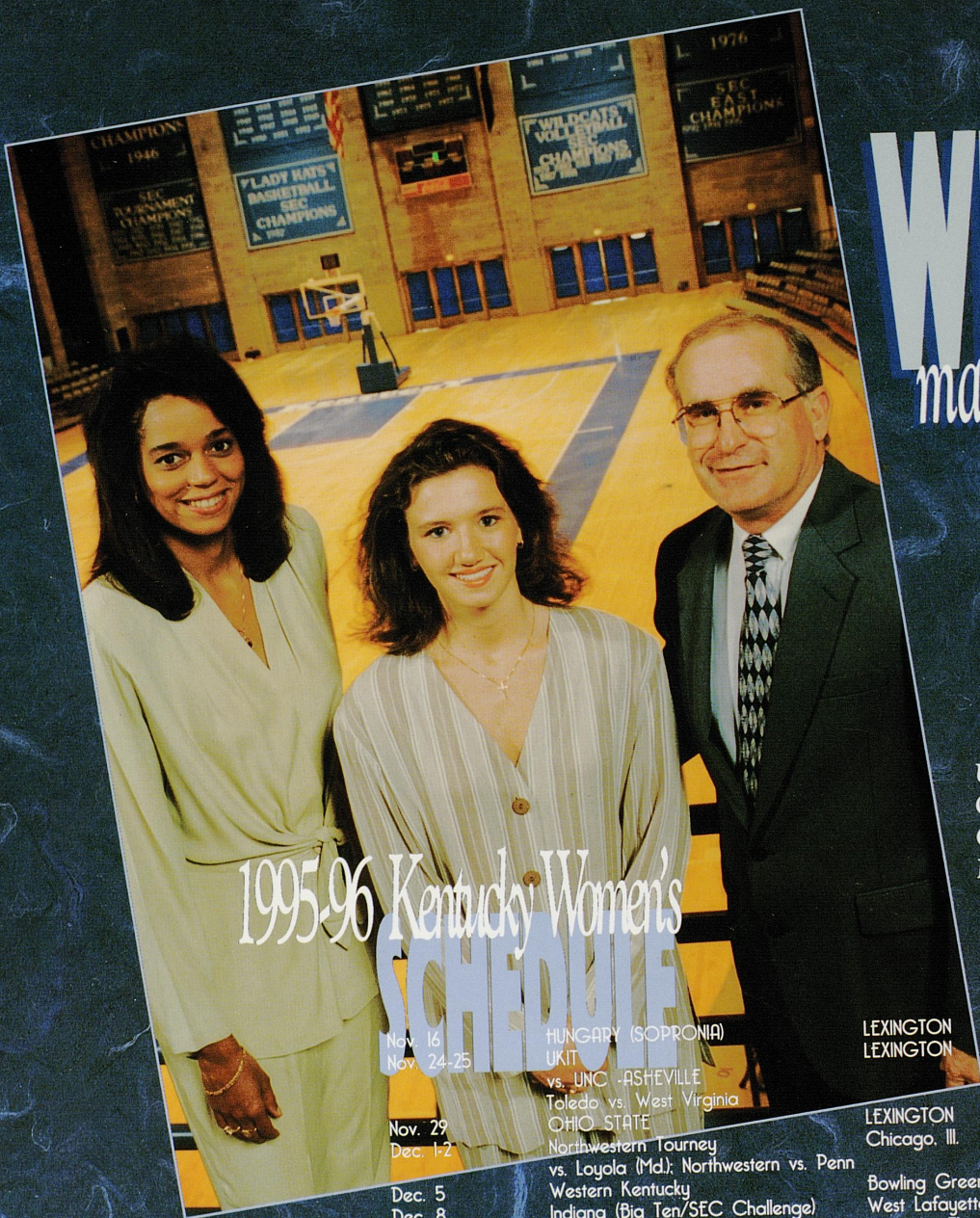
