Minutes of the University Faculty November 14, 1949

The University Faculty met in the Assembly Room of Lafferty Hall Monday, November 14, 1949. President Donovan presided. Members absent were:

The secretary read the minutes of August 10, September 19, and October 10. These minutes were approved as read.

Dean Kirwan, Chairman of the Committee on Student Organizations, presented recommendations from the Committee that the following new organizations be approved:

1. Gamma Delta, national Association of Lutheran students
2. An affiliate of the Louisville chapter of the American Society for Metals
3. The Arnold Society of Air Cadets

The Faculty approved the Committee's recommendation concerning these organizations. Dean Kirwan reported further that the Committee on Student Organizations had received a petition for an organization of Catholic students to be known as Phi Kappa. This petition had been presented also to the Inter-Fraternity Council. Both the Council and the Committee refused the petition on the ground that Catholic students were not barred from other social groups on the campus and that all of the organizations included some Catholic students in their membership.

Assistant Dean Horlacher presented the following recommendations from the College of Agriculture and Home Economics, which were approved by the Faculty.

At its meeting on November 7, the faculty of the College of Agriculture and Home Economics made the following recommendations to the University Faculty:

New Course to be Added

Animal Industry 132, Reproduction in Dairy Cattle.

A study of reproductive processes in dairy cattle and the application of artificial breeding to the improvement of dairy herds. Two credits. One lecture and one laboratory.

Removal of Fees

Remove special fees from the following courses:

Animal Industry 102, Advanced Livestock Judging
Animal Industry 122, Advanced Dairy Cattle Judging
Animal Industry 145, Advanced Poultry Judging

Change in Curriculum

Require in the animal industry curriculum one of the following courses:

Animal Industry 22, Judging Dairy Products
Animal Industry 23, Judging Dairy Cattle
Animal Industry 44, Poultry Judging
Animal Industry 2, Livestock Judging

Acting Dean Dickey presented for the College of Education the following changes in courses, which were approved by the Faculty.

Reduce the credit for Education 221a,b Seminar in Administration, from 4 semester hours each to 3 semester hours each.

Reduce the credit for Education 225, Supervision of Instruction, from 4 semester hours to 3 semester hours.

Reduce the credit for Education 227, Principles of Curriculum Construction, from 4 semester hours to 3 semester hours.

Reduce the credit for Education 292a,b, Field Problems in Curriculum and Supervision, from 4 semester hours each to 3 semester hours each.

Raise the credit for Education 158a, Teaching Secretarial Subjects, and Education 158b, Teaching Bookkeeping and Accounting, from 2 semester hours each to 3 semester hours each.

President Donovan addressed the Faculty briefly. He expressed satisfaction in the results of a recent election which passed the two amendments, one lifting the salary limitations of state officers, and the other making it possible to distribute per capita funds on some basis other than the school census. He expressed his appreciation for the efforts of the Faculty and Staff and of the various organizations which helped in getting these amendments approved.

The Faculty adjourned.
