To begin with, in the drive by the student Chesa committee no individuals—only organiza-tions—are asked to contribute. Practically all the organizations approached have separate funds of their own, apart from the allowances of their individual members. They are in every sense au-tonomous; that is, they are not a part and par-cel of the folks back home. They exist as University institutions and also—since the University is situated at Lexington—as Lexington in-stitutions.
