The University of Kentucky Research Foundation is a private, non-profit corporation through which funds may be received, invested and expended in the interests of certain legitimate activities of the University of Kentucky. Within the framework of the University, the Foundation operates as an administrative arm of the University in soliciting and administering contracts, grants and gifts originating from extramural sources. These funds are used in support of research, training and other related activities.

UKRF received 441 awards during the fiscal year 1970, its twenty-fifth year of service. These awards totaled more than \$14 million.

While research work during the Foundation's early years was primarily in the physical sciences, it now extends into education, the humanities and the social services as well. The Foundation presently administers funds for projects distributed among almost all the departments and divisions of the University.

Libraries

The University library system includes the Margaret I. King Library and special libraries of over 1.2 million volumes; an extensive collection of source materials—both printed and manuscript—in many fields, including complete runs of most major scientific serials and many others. Among the collections are Ohio Valley history, the works of numerous modern authors, tobacco literature, and the papers of such public figures as Alben W. Barkley, Thurston B. Morton, and Jonett Shouse, which provide a detailed picture of American political life.

UK's King Library is a regional depository for both U.S. federal and United Nations documents.

In addition to the King Library, the library facilities of the University include specialized collections in the following departments and colleges: Agriculture, Architecture, Fine Arts, Biological Sciences, Chemistry and Physics, Education, Special Education, Engineering, Geology, Law, Library Science, Mathematics, Medicine and Pharmacy. Each community college has a library equipped with a selective collection geared to the special needs of the local program.

Board of Trustees

UK's Board of Trustees consists of the Governor, who is Chairman of the Board, the Superintendent of Public Instruction, the Commissioner of Agriculture, Labor and Statistics, ex officio, and 12 competent citizens of Kentucky appointed by the Governor, two non-voting members of UK's teaching faculty, and one non-voting member of the UK student body.

Terms of appointed members are for four years and until successors are appointed and quality. Three of these 12 members are appointed each year. Three of the appointed members are designated to be representative of agricultural interests, three to be alumni of the University of Kentucky and six to be other distinguished citizens of the state representative of the learned professions.

The Governor is directed to make appointments so as to divide representation upon the Board, including ex officio members, as equally as possible between the state's two leading political parties. Appointments to fill vacancies are made for unexpired terms in the same manner as provided for original appointments.

Brief History

The school was started as part of Kentucky University under a cooperative plan authorized by the legislature. In 1878, when the people of Kentucky decided to establish a state institution of higher learning, the Agricultural and Mechanical College was separated from Kentucky University and re-established on land given by Lexington and Fayette County. To provide a separate campus for the new institution, the city of Lexington had donated its 50-acre fairground and park which, during the Civil War, had been utilized as a bivouac area for Union troops. Lexington and Fayette County contributed \$60,000 for the construction of buildings, and President James K. Patterson, whose service to the institution began in 1869, loaned his personal savings to supplement the building fund. Thirty years later the legislature changed the name of the institution to State University, Lexington, Kentucky, and gave it additional financial support. In 1916 the name was changed to the University of Kentucky.

In addition, community colleges may award a certificate for the successful completion of certain prescribed programs of 60-64 semester hours of university-parallel course work known as the Certificate in College Studies.

Besides the two-year degrees that often lead to technical careers, the community colleges provide two years of study in most major fields offered at UK's Lexington campus.

Academic Calendar

UK's academic year normally begins in late August or early September with the fall semester, which ends before Christmas holidays. Classes begin for the spring semester in mid-January and end in early May, when commencement exercises are held.

A four-week intersession runs from mid-May to mid-June, and the regular summer session lasts eight weeks, from mid-June to mid-August.

Admissions

Kentucky residents are admitted as beginning freshmen if they are graduates of an accredited high school and have not attended another school since leaving high school. They must file the application for admission, and their American College Test results.

It is the University of Kentucky's purpose to admit those non-resident applicants whose record indicates a reasonable probability of academic success at the University. In determining this, the University avoids making admission decisions on a single and inflexible standard, such as a cut-off score on a college aptitude test. Other aspects of the student's record are considered with the results of the American College Test.

All students attending the University are enrolled in one of the various colleges, each under the supervision of an academic dean. Each college is made up of several academic departments and offers different major fields of study which the student may elect to follow.

Student Financial Aid

There are 100 major buildings on the 350-acre main campus at Lexington.

Total fixed assets of the University including land, buildings and equipment, amount to approximately \$160,830,000. Campus building projects, in various stages of planning or construction, are estimated to cost about \$16,000,000, and it is expected that planning for an additional \$17,000,000 in construction will be started during the 1970-71 fiscal year. These figures include present and near-future construction at the community colleges.
