



show her that you appreciate the inter-
est she takes in you. I am going to
send their apples up this week 3
expect Papa will be up last of this
week he has done shipped all of his
tobacco, but I don't expect he will
be to see you you must go to see
him I will tell you where he will stop

I will just leave it to you about
your staying up there and taking lessons
until Christmas, it will be altogether
owing to whether you think you
can afford to lose so much time
from your lessons to come home
