

Wims considers himself a student advocate. "I am genuinely interested in the students and their welfare," he said. "I like to support and challenge students so that they can realize their own potential."

Wims, a native of Cleveland, is married and has two children—a son, 13, and daughter, 9.
He received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Kent State, in Ohio.
He said once he gets settled he will resume his doctorate work here in educational policy studies.
Wims has been in the housing field for 20 years.
He first became interested in residence life when he was a resident advisor at Kent State.
"Once you get into housing, either you like it or you don't. And I have really enjoyed it," said Wims, who prides himself on having an open-door policy for students.

Combs' collection given to library

Late governor's papers donated

Political papers and memorabilia of Bert Combs, a late former governor of the Commonwealth of Kentucky and UK alumnus, are being donated to the UK Library. The Combs Collection — a wealth of official correspondence, speeches, executive orders, news clippings, campaign memorabilia, photographs and audio and video tapes — will be dedicated and exhibited in early 1997.

Combs' collection will join the collections of 31 other well-known Kentucky politicians, including seven other governors.

According to Paul A. Willis, director of UK libraries, such collections are important for university research libraries.

Director Willis' persistence and Combs' fondness for UK

brought the collection to the Modern Political Archives.

"I wrote to (Combs) and talked to him repeatedly," Willis said. "It was his widow, Judge Sara Combs, who actually placed it here I think he had a good feeling about the University of Kentucky."

Retired UK law professor Paul Oberst, a classmate of the former governor calls Combs the "most illustrious lawyer and governor of my time."

Combs received his law degree from UK in 1937.

Because he worked his way through school, it took him more than 10 years to graduate.

Combs' political career started with his 1951 appointment to the state court of appeals. In the 1955 Combs lost the gubenatorial election.

Professors team up to form geological theory

UK geology professor William A. Thomas and Ricardo A. Astini of the National University of Cor-doba in Argentina believe a piece of North America broke away and collided with South America.

collided with South America.

According to their theory, a fragment of North America, known as the Argentine Precordillera, broke away \$25 million years ago and reached South America 70 million years ago. The "microcontinent" covered \$2,500 miles during its journey.

"What Ricardo and I have done is put together a timing story, and we think we can pinpoint the exact place on North America from which these rocks came," said Thomas.

Thomas.

This "timing story" is what makes the Argentine Precordillera finding important for geology.

The split and collision of Laurentia



"There are a lot of others (microcontinents). But the thing that's unique about this is being able to say exactly where it came from," Thomas said.

Geologists have known of microcontinents prior to Thomas and Astini's discovery. However, no one until now found both a microcontinent's current and

originating positions.
Originally, the 250,000 square mile microcontinent was attached to North America between Texas and Alabama.

of mountain ridges in Argentina
reaching 600 miles in length and
less than 125 miles at its widest

point.
Thomas and Astini believe the microcontinent was once part of North America because they share identical geologic and fossil records.

"Even though these are very primitive animals (trilobites), there are some very distinctive shape characteristics," said Thomas, "Except for the trilobites in the Precordillera in Argentina, those trilobites are like North America, not like the rest of South America."








Library Microlabs News

A number of changes and improvements have been made in the Library Microlabs that will begin with the start of the Fall Semester. These changes include an upgrade to Windows95 and memory upgrades on many machines; a new Printing Management System, including a charge for printing; a new streamlined system to apply for a computing account; and expanded access to full-test databases via the World Wide Web. For more details, stop by any Microlab, or access the Microlab Web site at http://www.uky.edu/MicroLabs/.



Printing Management System

All UK Libraries and Microlabs are open to the university community and the public, and each day, nearly 20% of all Library and Microlab transactions - including printing - is carried out by non-university users. The dramatically increased demand for printing, coupled with abuse of free printing by some patrons, necessitated a Printing Management System that will 1) create an equitable system for managing printing, 2) reduce printing delays due to unnecessary printing, and 3) reduce the tremendous waste of paper that was occurring in the Microlabs. Beginning this Fall semester, \$.10 will be charged per black and white laser print in all of the Microlabs and in the King Library Reference and Periodicals Departments. Effective September 5, each full-time student will receive their first 50 copies per semester free. \$.50 per page will be charged for color printing. Students will no longer be subsidizing abusive printing, and funds saved on printing costs will be redirected to further improvements in the Microlabs.

-new printers in the Microlabs
-guaranteed reliability and quality of printing
-environmentally sound - less waste of paper and toner
-printing by others no longer subsidized by students
-better access to PLUS account services via three new locations
for adding funds to accounts

-money saved on printing will be applied toward improving

Elizabeth Dole talks trust at Ky. rally

BOWLING GREEN, Ky. Linda Spurrier is a registered Democrat who hasn't decided who will get her vote for president in November. That is not why she attended a rally for Elizabeth Dole on yesterday.

on yesterday.

That reason was 10-year-old daughter Whitney, who would vote for Bill Clinton if given a chance.

"It's important that she know both sides of the political scope," said her father, Sonny Spurrier of Bowling Green. "I'm going to vote Democratic." Virginia Pyzola also brought her two daughters to hear Dole, And she will vote for Bob Dole in the fall, as she voted Republican in

1992, even though she is also reg-istered Democratic. Her reason has little to do with Dole or her husband. It has to do with Bill Clinton's character. "I didn't trust him then; don't trust him any more now," Pyzola said.

trust him any more now, Fyzons said.

Though not directly, Dole pushed the trust button time and again during her speech to a crowd estimated by Kentucky State Police at about 500 at Griffin Park.

"His word is his bond," Dole said of her husband. He is "absolutely trustworthy."

"Inn't that what we want in a president?" she asked.

president?" she asked.

Rep. Ron Lewis, the Republican incumbent congressman in the 2nd District in a tough race against Democrat Joe Wright, was

more direct about Clinton's credibility.

"If he lied to you in '92, he'll lie to you in '96," Lewis said.

The event was billed as a salute to working women and 13 area women who run their own businesses or are executives in the private sector were paraded onto the stage to serve as a backdrop of sorts for Dole, who wandered among the crowd a bit with the help of a wireless microphone. Republican Sen. Mitch McConnell, who is also on the ballot this year for his own re-election against Democrat Steve Beshear, said Dole has always promoted talented women during her career in government.

The gender issue is critical for

her career in government.

The gender issue is critical for the Republicans in the presidential race because polls show they

trail among women voters. Similarly, Dole and running mate Jack Kemp need the kinds of voters represented by Pyzola and Spurrier — registered Democrats who are willing to cross over. "Come on over and join us," Dole said. "It also takes a lot of good Democrats for Dole for us to win." Notably absent from the campaign speeches was any reference to tobacco, which Kentucky Republicans have been using to wallop Clinton with since the president proposed regulation of nicotine as a drug.

Dole said questions about tobacco should be directed to her husband.

McConnell said he has advised

Dole defends tax-cutting plan; Clinton attacks GOP

MILWAUKEE — Throwing himself confidently into the fall campaign, Presi-dent Clinton celebrated Labor Day with a huge battleground-state rally Monday and fresh attacks on Bob Dole's tax-cutting

fresh attacks on Down Johns Belands and De Pere, Clinton laid out his blueprint for the 21st century and said Dole's \$548 billion tax-cutting plan would balloon interest rates and make mortgages, credit cards and car loans more expensive for the middle-class.

Clinton said the country simply cannot

Clinton said the country simply cannot afford it and taxpayers would pay for their tax cuts in the end. "Would you go to the bank yourself and borrow to give yourself a act cut?" he asked a friendly and largely partisan crowd of at least 25,000 on the banks of the Fox River in De Pere.

Dole and running mate Jack Kemp called Clinton's bridge to the 21st century

— a phrase the president has used frequently — "a toll bridge" for which "every inch of the way, you pay and pay and pay."

But Clinton's attacks on the Dole tax plan resonated with the Labor Day crowd that had packed a city park to hear the president in a state that is a bastion of swing voters. Clinton won Wisconsin in 1992, and polls show him running farther ahead in the state than nationally.

An ABC News poll conducted Wednesday and Thursday showed Clinton had edged upward as the Democratic National Convention ended, with 54 percent of registered voters preferring him in one tracking poll — 20 percentage points over Dole. Another national poll, released Fridge before Clinton's acceptance speech Thursday night, gave Clinton a 13-point edge. History also is on his side: In 60 years of Gallup polls, every presidential candidate with a double-digit Labor Day lead went on to win. "A year ago, if we were on this plane and

"A year ago, if we were on this plane and you all told us we'd be in this position, we would be pleased," White House political director Doug Sosnik said aboard Air Force One.

Kemp, campaigning late Monday in Flint, Mich, made light of the latest poll results. "We've got 'em right where we want 'em — overconfident," he told reporters.



It has happened to everyone at least a few times. The power goes out, you miss your favorite television show, the clocks need to be reset and the search begins for the flashlight. Usually power outage that just long enough to irritate control of the search power outage. Things aren't always that easy in the movies. Only in Hollywood could a mysterious force sever all electrical power, telephone and broadcast signals throughout the entire city of Los Angeles and its surrounding suburbs. That means no ATMs, refrigeration, radio, gasoline, traffic lights or communication.

That's the intriguing premise behind The Trigger Effert, the new urban thriller with a fairy-tale twist, starring Kyle MacLachlan and Elisabeth Shue.

The film centers on a couple whose quiet suburban life unravels as the community panies without

its everyday electrical conveniences. A seemingly average, all-langerican family finds itself steal-langerican stores, purchasing a shore steal of the steal of t

glas' Falling Down, the movie gives a dead-on portrayal of a reserved society venting its pent-up frustrations.

Writer/director David Koepp, known for his work as the screen-writer for such big budget productions as Jurasic Park, Mission: Impossible, Carlito's Way and several others, makes his debut behind the camera with a much more subtle piece. While the story isn't nicely packaged, the director's highly stylized visual techniques and ability to create tension through small details make his first effort a very accomplished film.

The Trigger Effect succeeds in telling a quirky, original story while keeping viewers on the edge by slowly building suspense. For a film that pounds home the idea that society will go to extreme measures (including theft and violence) when placed under adverse conditions, the surprising conclusion fails to hammer home that

prevailing theme.
Despite leaving a number of loose ends and unanswered questions, there are few moments that fail to entertain. But its puzzling ending and enjoyable storytelling may have many people going back for seconds.




