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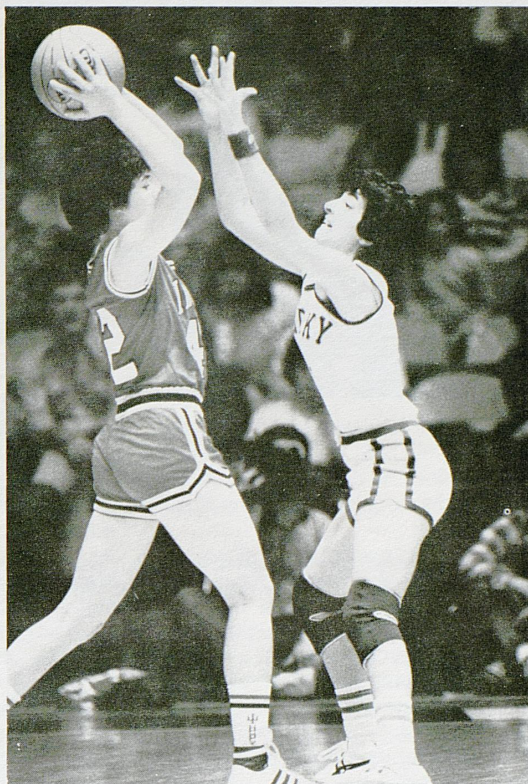

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DR. OTIS A. SINGLETARY

President, University of Kentucky

Dr. Otis A. Singletary has maintained an active role both in academics and athletics since he became the University of Kentucky's eighth president in August 1969.

Great strides toward academic excellence have characterized Dr. Singletary's presidency at UK. The Schools of Dentistry and Pharmacy consistently rank among the best in the nation. Departments such as political science, history, and mathematics have also gained nationwide attention while the UK Library now rates among the best in the Southeast.

Under Singletary's leadership, the University of Kentucky has also become a major research institution. The Albert B. Chandler Medical Center is an established leader in research on cancer and the aging. UK's agricultural college

has provided important research in tobacco and equine diseases while other University research has focused on the field of coal and other energy sources.

Singletary's involvement in athletics is as impressive as his academic achievements. A former president of the Southeastern Conference, Dr. Singletary is a member of the NCAA Select Committee on Athletic Problems and Concerns in Higher Education. He is also chairman of the board of directors of the College Football Association.

As president of the principal institution of higher learning in the Commonwealth, Dr. Singletary is greatly concerned with the University's role as a land grant institution, a "people's university" accessible to all who can profit from education.

In the 13 years Singletary has been president, the University of Kentucky has grown in enrollment to about 23,000

students on its Lexington campus and more than 22,000 students in the University's 13 community colleges.

Recognition of his service to the University of Kentucky was evidenced by the UK Alumni Association which presented to Dr. Singletary its Alumni Service Award, an honor rarely bestowed upon a non-alumnus of the University.

A native of Gulfport, Miss., Singletary holds degrees from Millsaps College and Louisiana State University. An accomplished administrator, Dr. Singletary served as chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro and was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs for the University of Texas system prior to coming to Kentucky.

He and Mrs. Singletary, the former Gloria Walton, have three children: Bonnie, Scot, and Kendall.

the 1984 NCAA Basketball Championships. In 1985, the prestigious NCAA "Final Four" basketball championships will be hosted by UK and held in Rupp Arena.

Having graduated from the University of Kentucky with high distinction in 1954, Hagan has been a long-time advocate of a strong scholar-athlete program.

Hagan, one of the greatest players in UK basketball history, received one of his highest individual honors in 1978 when he became the first University of Kentucky player to be inducted in the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass.

An Owensboro, Ky. native, Hagan is married to the former Martha Milton,

also of Owensboro. They have four children: Mrs. Barry "Lisa" Thaxton of Lexington; Mrs. Jim "Laurie" Hill of West Liberty; Amy, a senior at the University of Alabama; and Kip, a sophomore member of the Transylvania University basketball and tennis teams.

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When Terry Hall arrived at Kentucky in 1980, the Lady Kats were coming off their most successful season ever and beginning to gain national respect. They had been ranked in the Top 20 throughout the 1979-80 season and had finished the year with a 24-5 record and a berth in the AIAW National playoffs.



But the season was just a hint of the great things to come under Hall's guidance. The Lady Kats have gone far beyond respectability and into the perennial role of national contender. They have been ranked in the Top 20 every week and averaged 24 wins per season since Hall's arrival.

In her first year at UK, Hall's Lady Kats went 25-6, winning the Kentucky Women's Intercollegiate Conference and reaching the final round of 16 in the AIAW National tournament. Hall was named the KWIC Coach of the Year that season.

In 1982 and again last season the Lady Kats were considered among the top contenders for the NCAA championship. The 1981-82 squad won the Southeastern Conference championship and reached the quarter-finals of NCAA play before losing to eventual national champion Louisiana Tech on the Lady Techsters' home floor. Last year's Lady Kats were ranked fourth

in the nation but fell to Indiana in the first round of the NCAA tournament.

Hall's record at Kentucky is 72-19, and considering Kentucky's tough scheduling habits (10 games with ranked opponents last season AND this season), a .791 winning percentage is outstanding. Her career record is 165-79. That mark includes one season at Eastern Kentucky, five at Louisville and three at Kentucky.

Hall began her coaching career in the high school ranks. Following her graduation from Indiana State in 1966, she was named head coach at Butler High School in Louisville. In five seasons at Butler, Hall coached her teams to two Jefferson County titles and an overall record of 69-33.

Then it was on to Eastern Kentucky University, where Hall earned her Master's Degree in 1974 and was immediately named head basketball coach. The Lady Colonels went 14-6 that season and won the KWIC title over Kentucky, Louisville, Western, Morehead, Murray and Northern Kentucky.

Hall then accepted the coaching job at Louisville, where she was faced with rebuilding a program. She succeeded, guiding the Lady Cards to a 79-54 record over five years. In 1979-80, her last season at U of L, the Lady Cards won their first Metro Conference championship. Hall also coached tennis and softball at U of L.

A native of Salem, Ind., Hall earned both her undergraduate and graduate degrees in Health and P.E. While attending Indiana State, she starred in basketball, field hockey and volleyball. She was honored with the "I" Woman Award in 1965, and received the prestigious Hillman Award in 1966 as the most outstanding female athlete at ISU.

Coach Hall on Kentucky's Style of Play:

"Our style of play, or trademark, is the fast break. We believe that applying immediate pressure on the defensive team is one of the best ways to win a basketball game. Kentucky is one of few teams in the country totally dedicated to fast break basketball. Defensively, we play whatever defense we feel will exploit our opponents' weaknesses. Our main concerns are controlling the tempo of the game, teamwork, and shot selection by our players."

Coach Hall on Working With the Players:

"I place a high premium on hard work and dedication to the task at hand. I want my players to feel the same way. I try to teach them that "doors of opportunity" open and close very quickly in life as well as on the basketball court. So always be prepared. In the span of a lifetime, their 4 years of college basketball is short, therefore they should work hard, be dedicated, excel, and enjoy the opportunity that exists."



Mike Kindred

**Assistant Coach
Eastern Kentucky University, 1980**

Mike was hired as a part-time assistant at UK in July, and then was elevated to full-time assistant in late September following the resignation of assistant coach Dottie Berry. A 1980 graduate of Eastern Kentucky, Mike served for two seasons as assistant girls' basketball coach at Estill County High School in Irvine, Ky., before coming to UK.

A native of Winchester, Ky., Mike graduated from Clark County High School in 1975. He then attended Morehead State University for one year before transferring to Eastern. He received a degree in Industrial Education, and then taught at Clark County for one year before accepting a job at Estill County.

In his first season at Estill, Mike helped direct the varsity squad to its first-ever winning season in 1982. The following year, the Lady Engineers won their first district championship. Mike's junior varsity squad, meanwhile, was doing even better, finishing with a 15-4 record in 1982 and a 19-4 record in 1983.

Mike is very active in the Big Brothers-Big Sisters program, and currently sits on the organization's Advisory Board in Winchester. He is also an active member of the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and was the FCA's 10th Region representative last year while coaching at Estill County.

Joining the coaching staff at UK fulfills a life-time dream for Mike, a 26-year old bachelor who has always been a "Big Blue" fan.

A former player for Coach Terry Hall at Louisville, Robin joined the Lady Kat staff in September. While at Louisville, Robin lettered in basketball four consecutive years, two of those seasons with Coach Hall at the helm. She was a member of the Lady Card teams that won Metro Conference titles in 1979 and 1981 and is in the record book for best free throw percentage in a season, which she set in 1979. Robin was also an outstanding high school player at Louisville Butler High. She helped her team to the Girls' State Tournament in 1976 and 1978. She was All-State honorable mention for three straight years and played in the East-West All-Star game in 1978. She also played tennis for three seasons and ran track one year at Butler.

Robin is pursuing a Masters Degree in Recreational Therapy at UK. She has a great interest in young people and has participated as a volunteer for Special Olympics for five straight years. She also is credited with starting two Youth Basketball Camps in 1981 and 1982 at the St. Matthews YMCA in Louisville.

A former collegiate softball player at U of L, Robin has umpired softball and officiated basketball and volleyball. She is 23 years old and single.

LISA NEAL

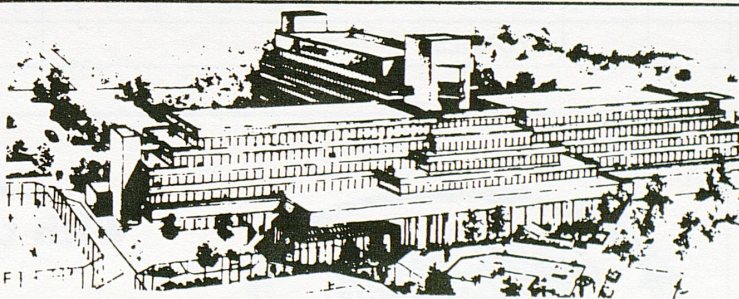
Manager

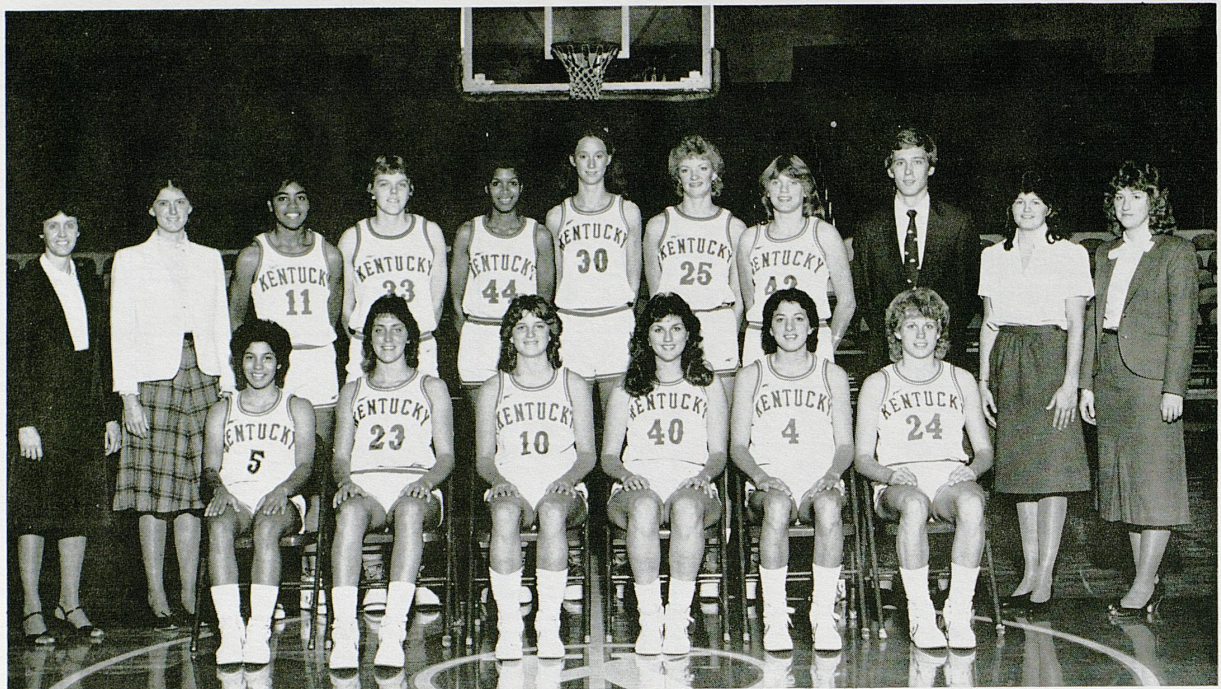

A LOT AT STAKE IN TONIGHT'S GAME

Records: Kentucky 8-7
Tennessee 11-6
Series: Tennessee leads 13-3

Sure, it's one of those "throw out the records" series. But as always, Kentucky vs. Tennessee means much more than another battle in an intense rivalry.

Usually, a Top 10 ranking is at stake. This season, however, Kentucky is unranked and Tennessee, which has lost only to Top 20 teams, is ranked 11th. Still, the SEC race makes this contest a key one for both teams.

Tennessee currently leads the SEC East division with a 2-0 record. Kentucky is 0-3, with games remaining at Georgia, at Florida, at Tennessee and at home against Vanderbilt. Tennessee must travel to Georgia and Vanderbilt and play host to Kentucky, Vandy and Florida.

The Lady Vols are coming off a spirited 63-59 victory over Georgia Saturday night. Senior forward Mary Ostrowski scored 29 points and senior center Paula Towns pulled down 16 rebounds to key Tennessee's big win.

Kentucky is coming off a 77-74 loss at Vanderbilt and desperately needs a confidence-builder with a trip to No. 8 Old Dominion and a home game against No. 5 Mississippi coming up.

Against Vandy Sunday, senior Lisa Collins poured in a career-high 20 points while Jody Runge and Diane Stephens added 13 and 12. But

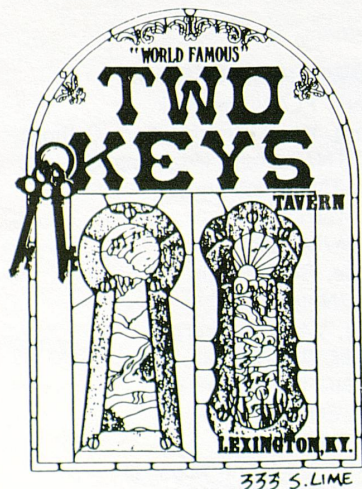

Runge and Stephens fouled out and UK's usual scoring leaders—Leslie Nichols and Karen Mosley—combined to hit only 8 of 29 shots from the field.

Nichols still leads Kentucky in scoring and rebounding with averages of 17.5 and 8.5. Stephens is next in scoring at 13.9, followed by Mosley at 13.6 points and 8.2 rebounds.

Tennessee, which traditionally plays the toughest schedule in the nation, lost to Southern Cal twice when the Lady Trojans were ranked No. 1. Last week, Louisiana Tech assumed the No. 1 spot and defeated Tennessee. The Vols' other losses were to Texas (ranked No. 2 at the time), No. 7 Long Beach State and No. 15 N.C. State. Ostrowski leads UT in scoring (13.9) and rebounding (8.2).

NICHOLS HOPING TO OVERCOME INJURY

When Leslie Nichols first donned a Lady Kat uniform, it didn't take her long to establish a prominent role by starting every game for a team which finished 23-5. Last year as a freshman, Nichols averaged 11.4 points and seven rebounds per game while compiling an impressive total of 38 blocked shots for the season 20 more than any other Lady Kat. Those statistics, along with her outstanding leaping ability and smoothness of style, gave promising hopes for Nichols' future at Kentucky.

Already this year, Nichols leads the team in scoring and rebounding with 17.5 points and 8.5 rebounds per game. She is second in steals with 31—just two shy of team-leader Sandy Harding. But where Nichols' stats break down is in turnovers. She has committed a whopping total of 75 turnovers—far ahead of any other teammate.

But that has been due in part to the effect of wearing a nose guard to protect the broken nose she suffered during the Indiana game on Dec. 6. She missed the following game against South Carolina and has since worn a protective face mask during games and practice. Just when the soreness started to leave, she broke her nose again—this time, during practice and requiring surgery.

"It's hard to say just how much of a hindrance the nose guard has been because I've played some good games with it on," Nichols said. "But I'd say it probably takes away about 35 percent. It especially affects my peripheral vision. Looking up or down is really hard because I have to look all the way down and sometimes I don't know where I am on the court."

Though Nichols has been able to adjust to wearing the mask, she is hoping her injury will soon be behind her. "I've begun to get used to it now, but I hope I don't have to wear it much longer because it gives me headaches."

Nichols was fortunate to have only missed one game due to the injury. She played in two games before her nose operation and then the Lady Kats were off the following week. But besides the face mask, Nichols said she hasn't been too pleased with her overall performance so far this year.

"Though my turnovers have hurt me, I really haven't been blocking out that well or going to the boards. Just probably in the four games have I started rebounding better.

"My scoring has been a little up and down, but I play pretty well against the good teams," she continued. "I like to play really physical, but I have been committing a lot of fouls that I shouldn't."

Nichols came to UK from Lexington's Henry Clay High School where she was a two-time All-State player and was a fourth-team Parade All-American her senior year. A left-hander, Nichols agreed that she needs to play more ag-



gressively to improve her role as a team leader both on offense and defense and help the Lady Kats reach their season goals.

"We want to improve every game and hopefully be a contender at the end of the season. Sometimes it looks like we're doing that and sometimes we're not," she said. "Hopefully, we'll be more patient and all five players on the floor will come together. A lot of times, we have mental breakdowns and not everyone is into the game at the same time. I guess it's because we are so young and we just have to develop as a team."

SEC: UNDOUBTEDLY THE NATION'S BEST CONFERENCE

Since the Southeastern Conference adopted women's basketball in 1980, it has been considered one of the finest in the nation. And in the last two years, few could argue that it is THE best in the U.S.

As of last week, the SEC had six teams ranked in the Associated Press Top 20: Georgia (2), Mississippi (5), LSU (7), Tennessee (12), Auburn (13), and Alabama (15). Additionally, Kentucky and Florida made earlier appearances in the poll. Moreover, Vanderbilt (13-3) is hoping to crack the Top 20 after a nine-point victory at Florida when the Lady Gators were ranked, a 10-point win over Alabama, and Sunday's 77-74 win over Kentucky. Only Mississippi State, which had a respectable 8-4 record, has failed to impress the pollsters.

Clearly, the SEC is the top conference in the nation this year. Against non-conference foes, SEC teams have posted an incredible 101-23 record for an 81.5 winning percentage. No other conference even comes close to this dominance.

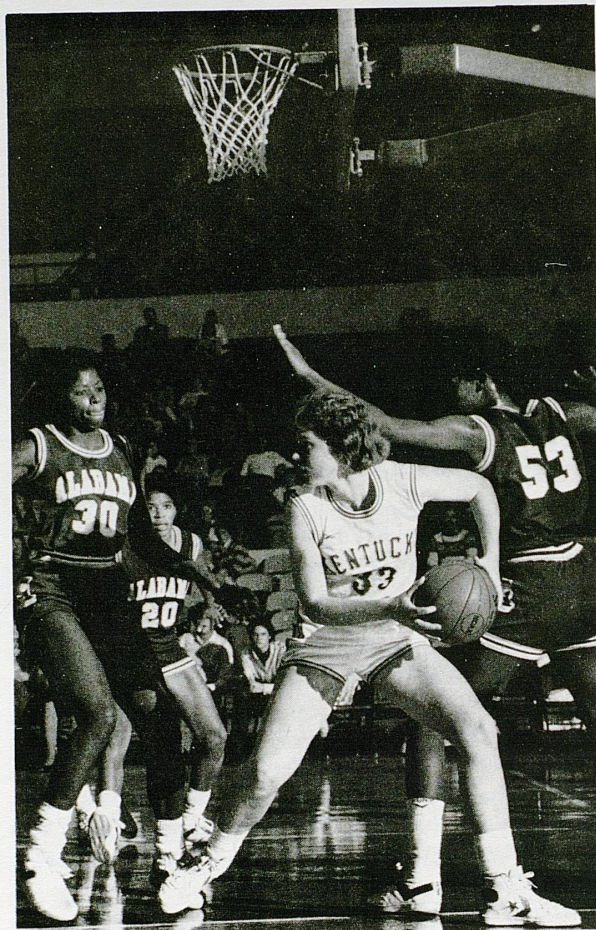
Still, some people think the SEC is overrated. For example, Rutgers Coach Theresa Grentz reportedly said that only three SEC teams deserved to be ranked after her team loss earlier in the season to Mississippi. Perhaps her thinking changed after Kentucky, considered by many to be the weakest team in the conference, handed her 20th-ranked Lady Knights a humbling 74-45 defeat last week.

Only a few nights prior to that the Lady Kats nearly defeated Georgia before falling 69-68. Senior guard Lisa Collins feels that game should silence some skeptics.

"I think any team in the SEC can beat any other," she said. "Our game against Georgia shows that. I think the conference is the toughest it's been since I've been at Kentucky. There were always a couple of good teams, but now you hear about teams that weren't mentioned before."

Collins also feels there is more individual talent in the league this year than in the past.

"There's a great deal of talent in the SEC," she said. "Now there aren't just one or two good players on each team—everyone has four or five players in double figures."



Lady Kats Coach Terry Hall has also noticed the improved talent in the SEC.

"Every team is better than last year, and we put six teams into post-season play last year. Teams have continued to get stronger and stronger because more good players want to play in this conference. We certainly have more trouble recruiting against teams in our own conference than other conferences."

Despite the tough competition, Collins enjoys playing SEC teams.

"I'm really looking forward to SEC games," she said. "I think everyone benefits from the tough conference when it comes to post-season play."

Perhaps the best post-season tournament of all this season will be when Georgia hosts the SEC tournament March 2-5.

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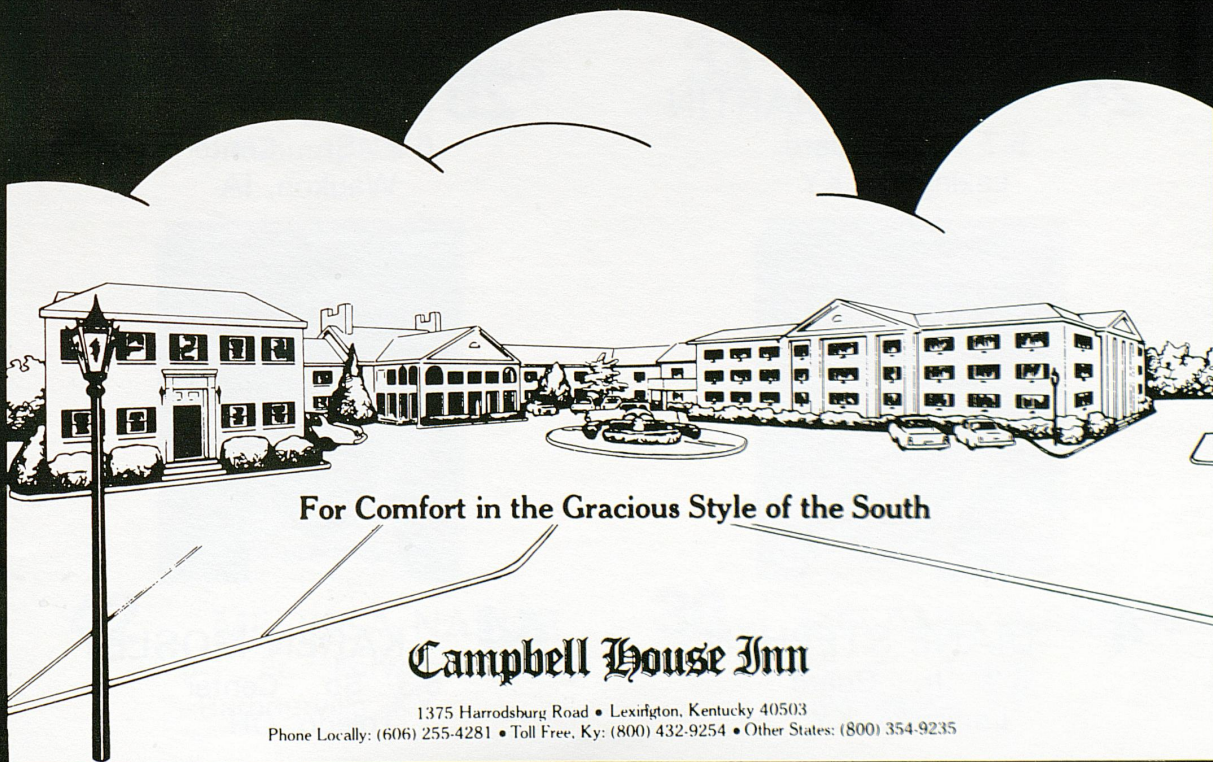
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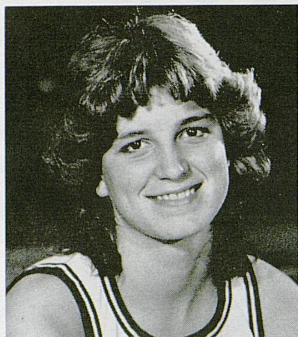

Social, Cultural and Recreational

Opportunities for UK students are not limited to the academic world. Involvement in the social and cultural aspects of University life also is important.

Recognizing this, the University provides the widest range of opportunities for personal and social development. If a student likes music, for instance, the Concert and Lecture Series brings outstanding soloists and symphonies on campus. There are chamber music concerts and hard rock concerts, impromptu bluegrass groups and flute recitals. If one likes to participate, opportunities abound—there are several choral groups, a marching band, the symphony orchestra, the symphonic band—or there is always the guitar with a few friends under the trees. Whichever one chooses, at UK it's available—and there's someone to share it.

There are 22 national fraternities and 16 national sororities on campus. "Rush," or member recruitment, takes place before classes begin, and informally throughout the year.

In addition to supporting the various Wildcat and Lady Kat teams, men and women students take part

as individuals or in groups in competitive sports and in intramural programs. The Seaton Center houses facilities in basketball, volleyball, badminton, squash, wrestling, and table tennis. An Olympic-size swimming pool, tennis courts, and several sports fields are available to students.

A similar variety of opportunities in drama, student government, athletics, service organizations, and recreation, is available.

The city of Lexington also offers UK students much in the way of entertainment. Lexington has a Philharmonic Orchestra, Chamber Music Society, the Lexington Singers, a Council of Arts, and a local Ballet Company. Movie theaters, international restaurants, coffee-houses, top-ranked acts of all types at fabulous Rupp Arena in the Lexington Center, historical landmarks, parks, and shopping centers, thoroughbred and harness

racing, fine fishing in lakes, ponds and streams . . . all in easy distance of the UK campus.

Tailgating at football games, lining up for tickets to see nationally famous Wildcat teams in Rupp Arena or Lady Kat games in Memorial Coliseum, participating in the "Little Kentucky Derby," attending concerts at the downtown arena or in the 11,500-seat Coliseum on the UK campus, visiting the internationally famous Kentucky Horse Park . . . all just a few of the many attractions of Lexington and the University of Kentucky.

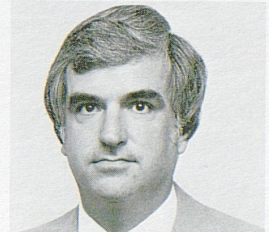

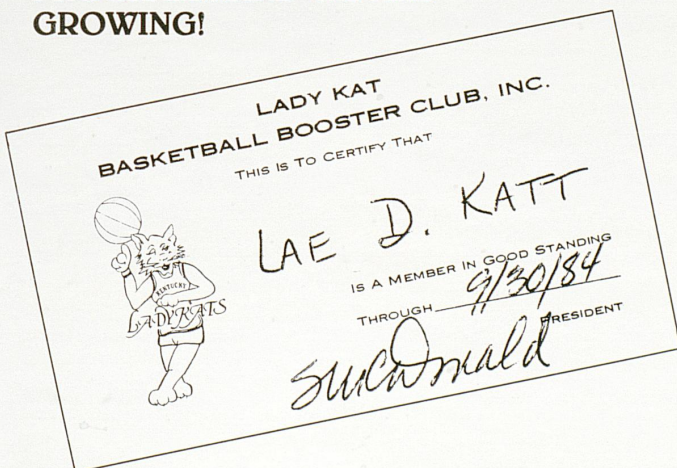
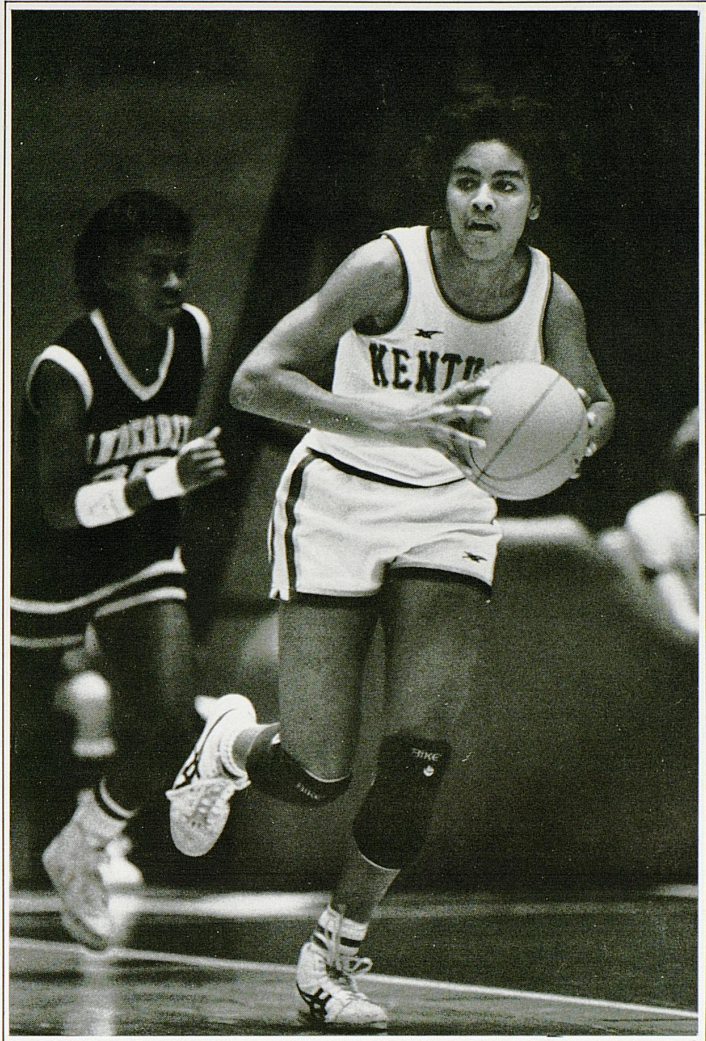
