We have one fresh cow and expect another one soon. We are ^{going} along alright in school. We drive

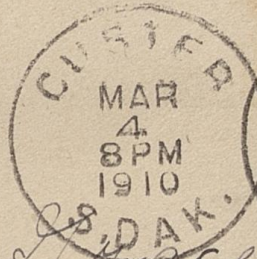

Leona and I are almost the same size. I am a little larger. There is 10 pupils in our grade and there are 27 in the room. There isn't as many in the room as there

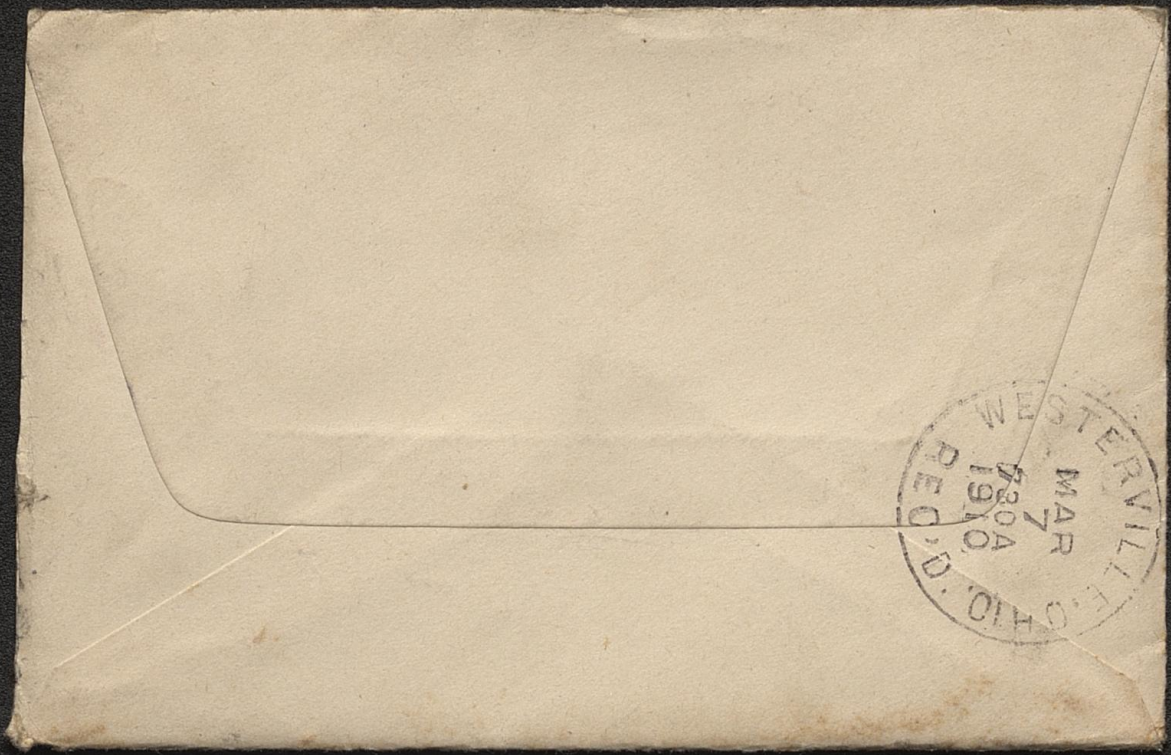

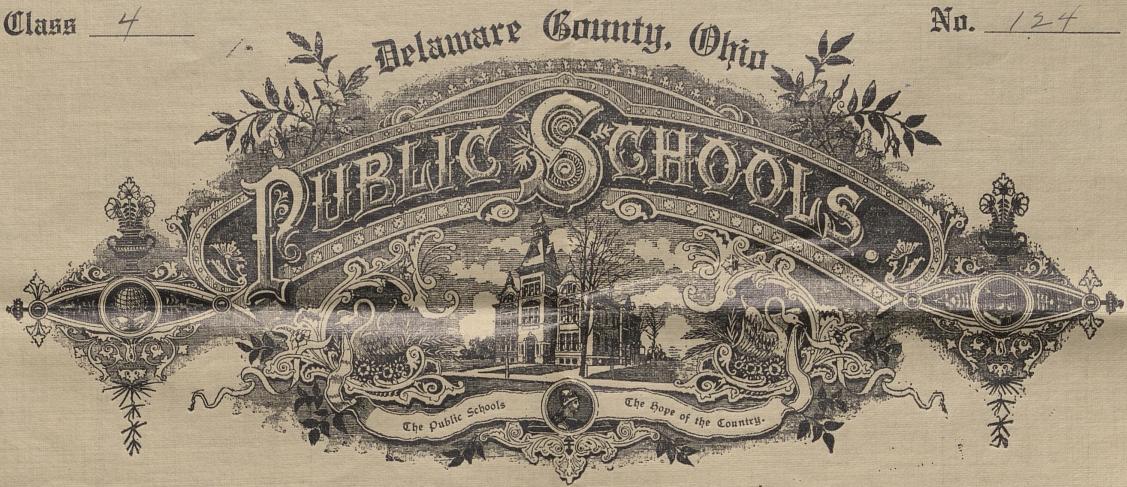

RULES—Four classes of Certificates are granted as follows 1. A **First Class Certificate**, valid five years, is granted when the applicant's average standing is at least 95, and the standing in each study is not less than 90. The applicant must have been for three years next preceding the application engaged in teaching, and twelve months of the teaching must have been in one place. 2. A **Second Class Certificate**, valid three years, is granted when the applicant's average standing is at least 90, and the standing in each study is not less than 80. 3. A **Third Class Certificate**, valid two years, is granted when the applicant's average standing is at least 80, and the standing in each study is not less than 70. 4. A **Fourth Class Certificate**, valid one year, is not granted unless the applicant's average standing is at least 65, and nothing below 55.

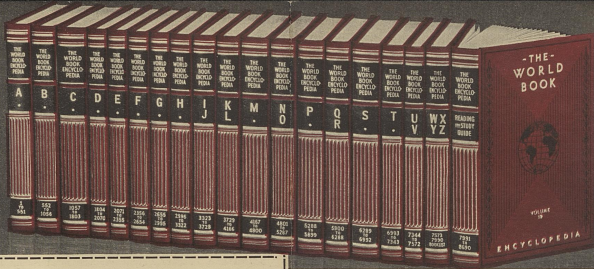

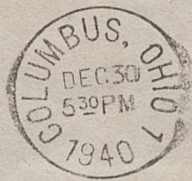

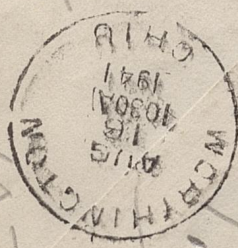
