WORKING TICKETS—Address requests to Sports Information Office as far in advance as possible. Tickets will not be mailed unless requested and will be held at the Information Window at the main entrance of Memorial Coliseum for pickup on game night.

PRESS DOOR—Entrance to the area set aside for press and radio should be via the Press Door located to the extreme left of the Coliseum entrance foyer.

FRESS ROOM—Located under west stands. Entrance near press door.

COMPS—No individual game allotment.

TELECOPIERS—Due to the increasing use of Xerox Telecopiers and other copying devices, the Sports Information Office does not feel it should try to provide side-court telephone service for such devices. Persons planning to use such devices at the press table should make their own arrangements with General Telephone. Telephones in the Sports Information Office and in the Coliseum hallway will be available for Telecopier use.

WESTERN UNION—Wire facilities are available at court side. Please advise if you will be filing from the Coliseum and also notify manager of Western Union in Lexington.

RADIO BROADCASTS—Broadcasting rights to UK games are assigned exclusively to the G. H. Johnston Agency, 59 East 54th Street, New York, N. Y. 10022 (Telephone 421-8055). One free reciprocal outlet is guaranteed opponent schools visiting Lexington. Any additional stations must clear through the Johnston Agency and the UK Director of Broadcasting, Mr. Pete Manchikes (257-2655). Working passes will be supplied approved stations by Sports Information Office.

SERVICES—Working press and radio will be furnished game programs, brochures, running play-by-play, halftime quickie box and final statistics in the form of a complete, seven-column dittoed box score.

THE UNIVERSITY OF KENTUCKY **. . . The State Is Our Campus**

Located in Lexington, an urban community of 180,000 population in the heart of Kentucky's famed Blue Grass region, University of Kentucky is a state-supported, land-grant institution which celebrated its centennial year in 1965.

The present school, which this fall enrolled 30,678 students and now offers instruction in 10 academic colleges plus a Graduate School and a Community College system of 13 centers, had its beginnings in 1865 when it was established as a part of old Kentucky University. This action by the State Legislature united sectarian and public education under one organization for the first time. Federal funds authorized under the Morrill Act were used to develop agriculture and mechanical arts within KU and, in 1878, A&M College was separated from KU to become a separate state institution on the general site of what is now the 706 acre main campus. Name changes in 1908 and 1916 resulted in the title by which the school is now known.

It is fully accredited in its respective colleges and departments by all of the major professional societies and educational organizations.

President of the University is Dr. Otis A. Singletary, 49, who came to Lexington in 1969 from the University of Texas, Austin, where he was executive vice chancellor for academic affairs.

Dr. Singletary, who is eighth president of the University, served a total of eight years at Texas, progressing during seven (1954-61) of those years from instructor to professor, associate dean of Arts and Sciences and assistant to the president. Then for five years (1961-66), he was chancellor of the University of North Carolina, although he was on leave from October 1964 to January 1966 to serve as director of the Job Corps, Office of Economic Opportunity.

1971-72 WILDCATS AT A GLANCE

LETTERMEN LOST FROM 1970-71 TEAM (6)

Mike Casey (6-4)—Three time All-SEC guard, rounded out career with 1,525 points, making him fifth top scorer in UK history. Assumed team leadership role after missing '69-70 season with broken leg. Hit 50.4 pct. from the field as a senior, averaging 17.0 points a game. Drafted by ABA Kentucky Colonels and NBA Cleveland Cavaliers.

Jim Dinwiddie (6-4)—Started 10 games late in season, averaged 5.4 points, hitting 52.5 pct. from the field. Provided solid floor leadership as playmaker. Scored 277 career points, average of 3.9.

Terry Mills (6-2)—Top reserve at guard, scored 139 points. Good defensive player and fine outside shot. Averaged 6.5 points per game as a senior. Scored 424 career points.

Larry Steele (6-5)—Three-year starter at forward, "Mr. Hustle" scored 314 points, hitting 51 per cent from the field and leading the team in assists with 93. Scored 781 career points and hauled down 499 rebounds.

Clint Wheeler (6-8)—Reserve forward, saw light action but provided valuable opposition in practice.

Tom Payne (7-2)—All-Conference, leading scorer with 17.6 points, second in scoring with 16.9, who joined the professional ranks under the hardship clause.

RETURNING LETTERMEN (6)

Jim Andrews (6-11 C-F)—Team's sixth top scorer with 156 points, ave. of 6.5 and 5 rebounds. Played 306 minutes in 24 games, hitting 52.5 per cent from the field.

Kent Hollenbeck (6-4 G)—Missed last six games of season with severe groin injury and was sub-par for NCAA. Fifth in scoring with 308 points, ave. of 14.0. Led in shooting percentages from field (53.3) and free throw line (88.2).

Stan Key (6-3 G)—Played 154 minutes in 20 games, averaged 3.4 points.

Bob McCowan (6-2 G)—Returns for final year of eligibility after layoff of year-and-a-half. Averaged 7.6 points in 16 games. MVP of 1969 UKIT.

Tom Parker (6-7 F)—All-Conference, leading scorer with 17.6 points, second in rebounding with 8.2. Led in minutes played with 1,020.

Larry Stamper (6-6 F)—Played 212 minutes in 20 games, started four games. Averaged 3.6 points and 2.8 rebounds.

UP FROM FRESHMAN TEAM (4)

Rick Drewitz (6-7 F-C)—Leading rebounder (10.8) and third in scoring (19.3).

Ray Edelman (6-2 G)—Second in scoring (21.6) and fourth in rebounding (5.4).

Ronnie Lyons (5-10 G)—Leading scorer (24.3) and assists (60).

Wendell Lyons (6-5 F)—Averaged 11.8 points in 13 games before bout with mono.



HARRY C. LANCASTER
Director of Athletics

Administration of the University of Kentucky athletics program is under the guidance of Harry C. Lancaster, who was named acting A.D. in September 1968 and permanent A.D. three months later.

One of the first challenges facing Lancaster during his "acting" tenure was to obtain John Ray as football coach to replace Charlie Bradshaw, who resigned unexpectedly.

Lancaster has applied his energies in other areas, hiring coaches Ron Huebner, swimming; Dick Parsons, baseball, and Dan McQueen, golf, all outstanding in their sports as UK undergraduates, thus placing the accent on a youthful staff.

Capital improvements under Lancaster include a new roof for the Coliseum, new surface on the all-weather running track, plus a press box and additional seating at track events.

The latest achievement is a proposed new football stadium to be completed in 1973.

From 1946 until 1970, Lancaster was known primarily as the No. 1 assistant to Coach Adolph Rupp. His freshman teams compiled 204 victories against only 57 losses. He served 17 years as head baseball coach and gave the school its winningest seasons in history by compiling identical 18-8 marks in 1959-60.

A native of Paris (Ky.) High School, he lettered in football, basketball and baseball under Coach Blanfon Collier. At Georgetown College, he lettered in football, basketball and baseball for three years and twice captained the football and basketball

teams. He was Student Body president and president of Kappa Alpha Social Fraternity his senior year.

He served as assistant football and basketball coach at Georgetown College (1932-33) and Paris High School (1933-34), head basketball coach at Bagdad High School (1934-36) and principal and coach at Gleneyrie High School (1936-42).

Lancaster earned his master's degree in 1943 while serving as a part-time assistant in basketball and full-time instructor in Physical Education from Sept. 1942 until March 1944, when he entered the U.S. Navy as a Seaman 2/c. He advanced to lieutenant (SG) and returned to the University in March, 1946, in time to assist Rupp in winning UK's four NCAA basketball championships of 1948-49-51 and '58.

Traveled To Greece In 1951

In his own right, Lancaster has traveled extensively and received a signal honor when he was invited to prepare the Greek National Basketball Team for the 1968 Olympics. A return six-week tour in Athens was cancelled when Lancaster was asked to stay home and serve as acting athletics chief of staff.

Lancaster had traveled to Greece in the summer of 1951 on a special athletic assignment for the U.S. State Department. The mission called for him to act as an advisor to Greek Basketball Federation officials in Olympic procedures and other matters. He also conducted numerous clinics and coaching schools and gave public lectures on the cage sport. During the summer of 1962, he helped Coach Rupp conduct clinics for Army personnel in the Far East Theater and worked with Rupp on the team's Middle East Tour in 1966 and a clinic in Germany in the summer of 1967.

ATHLETICS AT KENTUCKY

Kentucky's athletic program, a well-balanced and ambitious activity featuring intercollegiate competition in ten different sports, is organized under the Department of Athletics and a corporation known as the University of Kentucky Athletics Association.

The program is conducted without overemphasis or sacrifice of educational objectives and in strict compliance with the rules of the University, the Southeastern Conference and the National Collegiate Athletics Association.

A board of directors, headed by the President of the University in the capacity of chairman, maintains overall policy supervision of the athletic program.

In addition to the UK President, board officers include the Vice-President for Student Affairs as vice-chairman and Dr. W. L. Matthews in the capacity of secretary. Fourteen other men, drawn from the University faculty and the general public, also serve on the board as appointees of the president as does a student representative.

Supervising the steady growth and balanced development of the athletic program is Athletic Director Harry C. Lancaster.

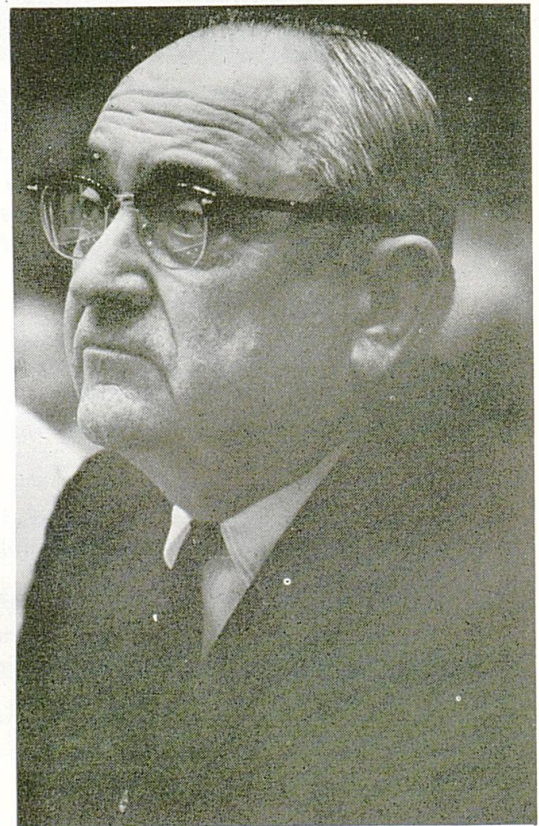
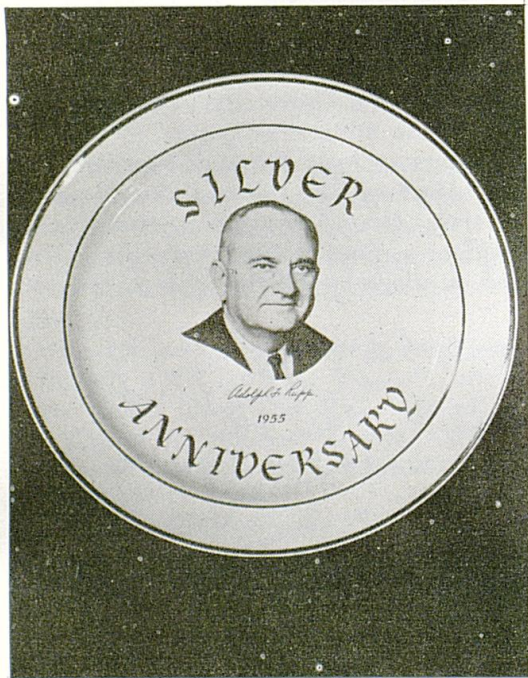

"World's Winningest Collegiate Basketball Coach"

41 Years — Won 858, Lost 183 — 82.4%

In the storied land of Kentucky Colonels, there dwells but one Baron, a man of consummate pride and a molder of powerful teams which for more than four decades have made the name of the University of Kentucky synonymous with the game of basketball.

He is Adolph Frederick Rupp, who was born Sept. 2, 1901, at Halstead, Kansas, where at a tender age he picked up a homemade basketball and shot it through a barrel hoop nailed to a barn door.

From that moment to the present, Adolph Rupp has been associated with basketball, progressing through a starring role as Halstead High School's top scorer and unofficial coach for two years, and playing on two national collegiate championship teams at the University of Kansas.

As a Jayhawk, Rupp was tutored by the famous Dr. Forrest C. (Phog) Allen, "father" of basketball coaching, and was a student under Dr. James A. Naismith, who invented the game at Springfield, Mass., and later served as coach and physical education instructor at Kansas.

During long conversations with Naismith and personal contact with the coaching techniques of Allen, Rupp picked up much of the basketball philosophy that was to carry him to great heights. However, the young farm lad from Halstead had no idea of entering the field of sport in any capacity when he received his degree in business and started beating the streets of Wichita and Topeka. He discovered quickly during that period immediately before the depression that jobs were scarce, especially in the banking business.

Returning to K.U., Rupp got back his job at the Jayhawk Cafe, where he had worked throughout his undergraduate years. He worked on an advance degree, and served as an assistant instructor.

When he heard of an opening at Burr Oak, Kansas, he applied and got the job of history teacher and coach of all sports. One of his first discoveries was that there was no place to play basketball; the only facility available was a renovated old barn that had been made into a skating rink. Basketball was played only when there was no skating scheduled. Rupp got his fill of that situation quickly and eagerly accepted a position as instructor and head coach at Marshalltown High School in Iowa. Once again, disappointment greeted the eager young coach; he had been hired to coach wrestling, not basketball, as he had been led to believe.

Totally unfamiliar with the sport, he purchased a book on wrestling and coached his team to the state championship.

Rupp moved the following year to Freeport, Ill., where he compiled a 67-16 won-lost record, and won two district championships, one sectional title and a third-place finish among 756 teams in the state.

He also developed nine all-conference players as members of the "Big 7" loop; produced the high scorer in the league three times and a second-place scorer once.

During the four summers of his tenure at Freeport, he attended Columbia University in New York City, receiving his degree of Master of Arts and the Teacher's College diploma Jan. 17, 1930. Rupp, teaching five classes in U.S. and world history at the time, was ready to embark on an administrative career in education.

When John Mauer decided to leave Kentucky and accept the head coaching job at Miami of Ohio, Rupp indicated an interest and was recommended by Craig Ruby, head coach at Missouri.

Rupp, appointed coach in May 1930, was chosen over approximately 70 other applicants for the job. One of his first moves after arriving on the campus for the fall semester was to call Carey Spicer, team captain, and tell him of the wide-open, controlled fast-break offense and man-to-man defense the Wildcats would use. Spicer and the other returning Wildcats, accustomed to the slowdown, deliberate style of

Mauer, became the talk of the South after they won their first 10 games under the new coach and then advanced to the finals of the Southern Conference Tournament before losing to Maryland, 27-29, on a last-second shot.

Since that opening season, which began with a 67-19 victory over Georgetown a week before Christmas in 1930, Rupp teams have been noted for their fast, exciting play and for never having experienced a losing season. Along the way during the ensuing 40-odd seasons at the University, Rupp has garnered just about every honor in the game of basketball.

One of his most important titles is that of the winningest coach in basketball, with 858 victories and 183 losses, a mark which has no immediate challengers, entering the 1971-72 season.

Rupp's road to fame has been paved by the performance of many fine players and teams. All told, 22 All-Americans have played for the "Baron of the Blue Grass." He also has developed more material (30 players) for the professional ranks than any other coach.

Rupp hesitates to name his greatest teams, which include winners of four NCAA titles, one NIT championship, five Sugar Bowl and 12 UKIT trophies, 26 SEC championships since the league was formed in 1933, and the 1948 Olympic crown.

As an outstanding author, lecturer, teacher and outspoken critic, he has been an important voice in basketball throughout the years. In addition to serving in various capacities on selection and rules committees, he spent an eventful year—1970-71—as president of the National Association of Basketball Coaches.

He is a full-fledged member of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame, having been inducted into that shrine at Springfield, Mass., in the spring of 1969, and has been named national "Coach of the Year" four times. He also boasts membership in the Kentucky, Kansas, and Helms halls of fame, and in 1970 was recipient of his alma mater's Distinguished Service Citation, the highest honor bestowed by the University of Kansas and its Alumni Association.

Rupp's accomplishments last season included a conference championship and a record 19th appearance in the NCAA playoffs. Four members of that team—center Tom Payne, forwards Larry Steele and Tom Parker, and guard Mike Casey—were named to All-Conference squads.

Although Rupp's honors are legendary and too numerous to be listed in their entirety in the space allotted in this publication, it seems apropos to single out a few of the major honors, awards and accomplishments, as follows:

- An amazing 858 victories out of 1041 starts for an unparalleled winning percentage of 82.4 percent against major competition.
- Certification by the NCAA Service Bureau as the nation's most successful collegiate basketball coach, both for the decade ending in 1961 and at the 20-year level.
- Selection as the unanimous national "Coach of the Year" in 1966 for the fourth time in his career and runner-up for the 1957 and 1964 seasons.

- Four NCAA Tournament championships picked up by his Wildcats who hold the all-time record of 19 appearances in the national classic.
- Coach of the International Universities Tournament champions in 1966.
- A nominal world championship as co-coach of the successful USA entry in the 1948 Olympic Games which included members of Kentucky's NCAA champions.
- Producer of more Olympic gold medallion winners (7) than any other cage coach.
- An all-time record total of 26 Southeastern Conference titles since the league was organized in 1933.
- Election to the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 1959 and previous selection (in 1944) by Helms Athletic Foundation as a member of their exclusive Hall of Fame.

- Trustee and member of selection and honors committees of Basketball Hall of Fame. Also chairman NABC Hall of Fame Committee and heads the group that selects players to appear in East-West All-Star Game benefitting the Hall of Fame.
- Recipient of the Governor's Medallion in 1959 for meritorious service to the Commonwealth of Kentucky and plaques of appreciation from the U.S. Air Force (1959) and Sugar Bowl committee (1951).
- Election to the Kentucky Hall of Fame (1946); outstanding citizen of Lexington (1949) and twice honorary citizen of the City of New Orleans. Enrolled in the Kentucky Athletic Hall of Fame in 1965.
- SEC coach-of-the-year in 1964 and 1966.
- Chosen "Deltasig of the Year" for 1966 by the International Fraternity of Delta Sigma Phi, professional fraternity in commerce and business administration.
- Development of more All-Americans (21 players honored 32 times) and more material for the pro ranks (30) than any other coach.
- Five Sugar Bowl Tournament championships, a National Invitation Tournament title and 12 trophies from the 18 previous UK Invitational Tournaments.
- Membership on the NCAA Basketball Rules Committee.
- More overseas clinic trips (seven to Europe, three to the Far East, and one to the Near East) for U.S. Government than any other coach. Also visited Alaska in 1968.
- Selected as an official goodwill ambassador to the 1968 Olympics in Mexico City representing the National Association of Basketball Coaches.
- Election to Kansas Hall of Fame.
- SEC coach-of-the-year in 1968, '69, '70 and '71.
- Honored as Outstanding Kentuckian by Southeastern Kentucky Homecoming Committee at Booneville, Ky., in 1969.
- President, National Association of Basketball Coaches, 1971.

Rupp's Teams Play In Most Tournaments

Tournament invitations in pre-Rupp years were almost unheard of as Kentucky played in only eight sectional eliminations. In contrast, the Rupp-led Wildcats have the distinction of playing in more tournaments of all types than any other team. All told, his Blue Grass fives have achieved the unequalled feat of 151 victories against only 40 defeats, covering action in 40 national classics plus 21 conference meets, 18 UKIT's, the '48 Olympics and the International Universities Tournament of 1966.

Although the competition was nowhere near as rugged as the schedules played by today's nationally-recognized Wildcat brigades, Rupp's very first team compiled a highly-successful 15-3 record and Kentucky basketball has been on a winning plane ever since. The most games lost in a single season since Rupp added his touch were 13 in 1966-67. The remarkably low average number of losses per season in the Rupp Era is four and he can boast of never having a losing season.

Rupp's teams have finished as national champion in the press association polls seven times in the last 22 years. They were unranked in the top 20 only in the 1952-53 campaign, when they were idle, and in three other seasons. Possibly his greatest achievement came in the 1953-54 season when the Wildcats rolled unchecked through a 25-game schedule of top-flight opposition to become the biggest-winning, perfect-record unit in all basketball history up to that time.

Rivaling that achievement, in the opinion of the sportswriters and broadcasters, is the tremendous coaching jobs turned in by the basketball miracle man in more recent seasons. In 1956, Rupp guided a moderately talented club to an eighteenth SEC title, third place in the polls and a ninth NCAA Tournament appearance while achieving a 23-5 record. The surprised experts, who had predicted UK would not win its own conference, voted Coach Rupp the runner-up spot as 1957 "Coach of the Year."

Even that effort went by the boards in 1958, however, as Kentucky's talentless wonders copped the NCAA title for an unprecedented fourth time. The Wildcats were unsung and almost unknown except by reputation and heritage. Not a single man had been honored on the All-Conference fives selected before tournament time and they had lost more games (6) in regular season play than any UK team in 17 years.

If the experts thought that was tops in miracles, they reckoned without the amazing drive of Rupp. With four-fifths of his starting lineup gone, he rebuilt shattered foundations in such an astonishing fashion that the Wildcats rolled through the 1959 season almost unchecked. Although they failed to win the title in their increasingly-tough Southeastern Conference for only the third time since 1943, UK was generally conceded to be the nation's top team. Most experts agreed that the Kentuckians, who finished with a 24-3 record and ranked second nationally, missed a golden opportunity to pick up a fifth NCAA crown as they were upset by Louisville in the tourney opener. This feeling was given meaning as Rupp was accorded "Coach of the Year" honor by United Press International.

The 1959-60 season admittedly was not a great one as the UKats chalked up only an 18-7 mark—second worst season of the Rupp Era. However, many experts considered the outcome to be a tribute to one of the greatest coaching efforts ever turned in. Plagued from the beginning of the season to the end by adversity (sickness, injuries, eligibility difficulties and personnel problems), complete disaster was always imminent and avoided only by masterful juggling (16 different starting combos) and artful strategy moves.

It was a similar story of great coaching technique against the heavy odds of personnel and schedule in 1960-61. Although the final record read only 19-9, a closer look reveals the touch of Rupp was there for the Wildcats were regrouped into a fearsome outfit after early troubles and rolled to 11 wins in their last 12 starts. En route they conquered eventual SEC champ Mississippi State on the road and demolished Vanderbilt in an SEC Playoff for an NCAA berth. They never ran out of gas until stopped by Ohio State in regional finals.

Tremendous Season Envelops In 1961-62

There was no way of anticipating the tremendous season that evolved in 1961-62 except to depend on the proven touch of master rebuilders Rupp. Minus four starters off the 19-9 outfit of the year before, Rupp guided his "Fearless Five" to victory in the UK Invitational and cornered a share of the league title for the 20th time. Finally, lack of bench strength and superior height caused the UKats' downfall in the NCAA regional finals and they stowed away their gear with a surprising 23-3 mark.

Not much could be said for 1962-63, which resulted in the posting of the poorest record (16-9) of the Rupp Era up to that time, except that it easily could have been worse without a dedicated coaching effort. Although their surge fell disappointingly short in quest for a fifth NCAA title, the 1963-64 Ruppmen blazed a torrid path that led to high national ranking all season long. Before a critical lack of height and too demanding a schedule caught up with them, the Wildcats waltzed to titles in two major seasonal tournaments (UKIT and Sugar Bowl) and copped an unprecedented 21st SEC Championship. Again lacking the vital height to control the boards and missing bench strength, the 1964-65 Kentuckians suffered through the worst season in Rupp's 35 years of coaching—a 15-10 mark. The record failed to reflect that the 'Cats threw scares into a lot of good outfits and wound up strong, taking decisions in seven of their last 10 starts.

The 1965-66 season demanded that Rupp pull more miracles out of his seemingly bottomless "bag of tricks" and he did just that—guiding a rebound from the worst season of his career (15-10 in '65) to the second best. Without a starter taller than 6-5, Rupp's Runts astounded the cage world by rolling to a near-perfect season. En route to attaining runaway recognition by both polls as regular season National Champions, the Ruppmen were edged only once in 25 tests. Only the strain of battling a height disadvantage and sickness prevented a successful claim to a fifth NCAA title—which escaped them in the championship game.

For his obviously amazing coaching job, Rupp was chosen as national "Coach of the Year." The vote was a rare unanimous choice of the man whose critics only a year before had decided the "old man" was finally slipping.

The season of 1966-67 goes into the record books as the poorest in Coach Rupp's great career. Despite the presence of two returning All-Americans (one with an ailing back), some vital ingredients were missing and the 'Cats floundered to a 13-13 record.

Not one to be kept down, Coach Rupp molded a predominantly sophomore group in 1967-68 into a big winner which copped the SEC crown and advanced to the finals of the NCAA Mideast Regional. The Wildcats repeated as conference champions in 1968-69, and 1969-70, as Rupp's bombers almost completely rewrote the record books, and then again in 1970-71.

JOE B. HALL Assistant Coach

Joe B. Hall moved up as No. 1 varsity assistant to Coach Adolph Rupp after Harry C. Lancaster was named permanent athletic director Feb. 1, 1969, and capably took over the Wildcat team when Coach Rupp was hospitalized after the Mississippi State game Feb. 8, 1971.



Additional duties for the versatile native of Cynthiana, Ky., included coaching the Wildcat freshman team. His first full year at the helm of the Kittens produced the third highest scoring team in U.K. History. The Kittens scored 1,975 points. The next year, Coach Hall, with just four scholarship players, transformed an erratic group into a smooth-working machine which by mid-season had fans coming early to see them perform.

Coach Hall returned "home" to the University July 1, 1965, with a coaching background of 126 victories against 75 losses. He posted a 19-6 record at Central Missouri in 1964-65 and guided the Mules to their first MIAA Conference championship since 1951 and to their first conference Christmas Tournament title in history.

Hall, a 6-foot-1 guard on the 1949 Wildcat team, entered the coaching profession after graduation from UK in 1955. He spent two years at Shepherdsville High School, achieving Coach of the Year honor in the Mid-Kentucky Conference in 1958 as Shepherdsville finished 12th in the state. Moving into the collegiate field, he served one season as freshman coach and then five years as head coach at Regis College in Denver, Colo., where he posted a 57-49 record.

In addition to his duties at Regis, Hall in 1964 coached the Capital Federal Denver post team in the AAU Tournament and was honored by selection as head coach of the AAU Stripes in the Olympic Trials at Jamaica, N. Y.

At Kentucky, he was known as one of the finest recruiters in the nation, a testimony to his ability to communicate and get along with prospects and players alike, and has proved also his ability as a coach.

W. GALE CATLETT Assistant Coach

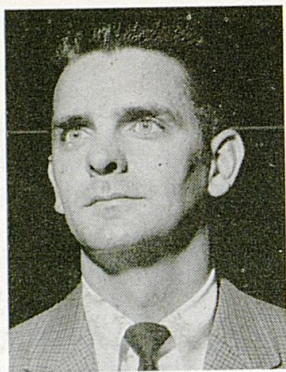
After serving four years as varsity assistant and freshman coach at the University of Kansas, Catlett joined Coach Rupp in August, 1971, replacing T. L. Plain, who took the head coaching position at Utah State.



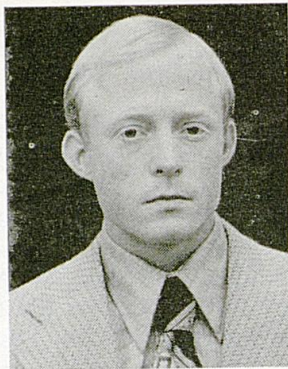
Born Oct. 31, 1940, in Hedgesville, W. Va., Catlett played under Fred Schaus and George King at West Virginia University. He lettered for the Mountaineers in 1961, '62, '63, and was a starter the last two years and co-captain, with Rod Thorn, his senior year. He played in the 1962 University of Kentucky Invitational Tournament.

During his first three years out of college, he was an assistant at Richmond. After one year with Lefty Driesell at Davidson, he joined the Kansas staff, where his freshmen the past four seasons had a record of 35 victories, four losses and a tie, the latter called because of a time limitation.

Catlett is married to the former Marie Vanderwort, whom he met while both were students at West Virginia. She has a master's degree in physical education and was an instructor and women's gym coach at Kansas. They have a daughter, Krista Marie, one-year-old.

RICHARD PARSONS, Assistant Coach—A former Wildcat baseball All-America, Parsons had the distinction of serving as captain of both the UK basketball and baseball teams in 1961. He returned for post-graduate studies in 1968 and helped scout basketball foes. He joined UK as baseball coach in the summer of '69 and was added to Rupp's basketball staff with recruiting and scouting duties.

WALT McCOMBS, Trainer—A 1971 graduate of The Citadel, McCombs was named head basketball trainer in October, replacing Dr. Claude Vaughan, who now devotes full time to the teaching profession. A native of Belton, S. C., the 23-year-old McCombs is a graduate of Parker High School and was a student trainer four years at The Citadel.

JANE ROLLINS, Administrative Secretary—A native Lexingtonian, Jane Rollins attended Sacred Heart Academy, Atherton High School and Bryan-Stratton Business College in Louisville and the University of Kentucky. Described by Coach Adolph Rupp as "one of the most loyal employees of our department . . . she's always willing to do her share to make our program successful," she has been secretary to UK basketball since 1955.

UK RECORD 20-GAME WINNERS

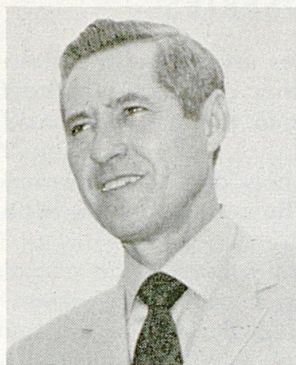
Kentucky lives up completely to its billing as the all-time champion of major college basketball with its run of 14 straight 20-victory seasons beginning in 1945, according to Boston sports authority Bill Mokray. The Wildcats were not permitted to field a team in 1953, but made up for it with a perfect record (25-0) the following season and continued their streak through 1959. Baron Adolph Rupp's warriors also achieved the magic circle with a 20-3 record in 1933 and posted a 23-3 mark in 1962, 21-6 in 1964, 32-2 in 1966, 22-5 in 1968, 23-5 in 1969, 26-2 in 1970, and 22-6 in 1971.

Many years ago, Adolph Rupp was accused by a Big Nine coach of raiding the North for basketball talent. In his denunciation of Rupp, the coach included an old Southern expression, "Carpetbagging."

A short time later, Rupp was invited to speak at a banquet in Ohio, deep in Big Nine territory. The banquet chairman, eager to have Rupp's name on the program, asked what his subject would be.

"My text," Rupp replied, "will be: 'A Carpetbagger in the Holy Land'."

RUSSELL RICE, Sports Information Director—Russell Rice was named sports information director at UK in May, 1969, after serving two years as assistant to Ken Kuhn, who retired after more than two decades of service with the University. Rice came to the Wildcats from The Lexington Leader, where he was a general reporter eight years and sports editor five years. A native of Paintsville, Ky., he won letters in football, basketball and baseball at Van Lear High. After serving with the U.S. Marines in World War II, he attended Kentucky Wesleyan College and received his bachelor's at the University of Kentucky in 1951. He is immediate past president of the Southeastern Conference Sports Publicity Directors Association. He is married to the former Miss Doris Thacker of Knott County. They have four children—Mrs. Rodney Morris of Louisville, Russell James, 20, Judy, 17, and Kim, 6.



JACK PERRY, Asst. Sports Information Director—Jack Perry came to the University in March, 1970, as assistant SID after 15 years service in the library of The Lexington Herald-Leader. A native Lexingtonian, Jack attended the University in 1949-50 before entering the U.S. Air Force, where he served during the Korean War as an airborne radio operator aboard B-29's. He joined The Herald-Leader as assistant librarian in March 1955 and was named head librarian in the spring of 1960. Jack is married to the former Miss Barbara Sanders of Lexington. They have four children—Patti, 18, Debbie, 17, Jack David, 13, and Todd, 11.



GEORGE HUKLE, Basketball Equip. Mgr. and Statistician—An invaluable aide to the Kentucky basketball team for longer than most people can remember, George Hukle has served as official statistician for the Wildcats for a great many years and is in his seventh year as cage equipment manager . . . Regarded as the dean of Southeastern Conference statisticians and one of the nation's veterans, Hukle has been keeping charts for Coach Rupp since 1933 . . . He is credited with popularizing the statistic of field goal attempts in collegiate basketball.

Upon his return from Madison Square Garden after his Wildcats lost, 22-23, to NYU, in 1935, Adolph Rupp was asked about some very questionable officiating.

"I really don't know," Rupp told a Lexington newspaperman. "Riding back yesterday I turned on the radio. A broadcast came on from one of the churches in New York. The minister used as his text, 'He was a Stranger, and they took him in.' That's all I know about what happened."

During a heated contest, Adolph Rupp drew a technical foul for coaching from the bench. Asked by a spectator what he thought of the official's action, Rupp replied, "Hell, my coaching is worth a technical foul any time."

WILDCATS SCHEDULED FOR THREE TV APPEARANCES IN SOUTHEASTERN CONFERENCE SERIES

Defending SEC champion Kentucky will appear three times on the Southeastern Conference television "Game of the Week" series while all other conference schools except LSU, which appears only once, will be featured twice in the most balanced schedule since the series was inaugurated in 1965-66.

The nine-week series over a regional network will feature only one doubleheader, Feb. 26, with Miss. State at Florida and Kentucky at LSU. The series again will be produced by TV Sports, Inc., of Paterson, N. J.

Producer Eddie Einhorn announced that all games to be televised will be played on Saturday afternoons to avoid interference with non-televised conference games. A few games have unusually early tip-off times due to the Winter Olympics and other national TV programs.

Kentucky's appearances before the live television cameras will come against three different opponents this year with two of three games on the road. In order, the Wildcats host Tennessee, and play at Vanderbilt and LSU.

The Wildcats, who have won 18, while losing only seven before the TV cameras, won all four TV games in 1965-66, two of four in both 1966-67 and 1967-68, three of five in 1968-69, all four in 1969-70, and three of four in 1970-71.

ORIGIN OF "WILDCATS" NICKNAME

Kentucky's athletic teams are known to sports fans as the Wildcats. This first and only nickname borne by University varsities had its origin in 1909 in a speech made by Commandant Corbusier, then head of the military department of old State College. Speaking to a chapel audience of students on the showing of the Kentucky football team in defeating Illinois six to two, the Commandant declared "they fought like Wildcats." The tag was popularized by word of mouth and by the press with the result that it has since become synonymous with all major Kentucky athletic teams.

KENTUCKY IN THE SEC

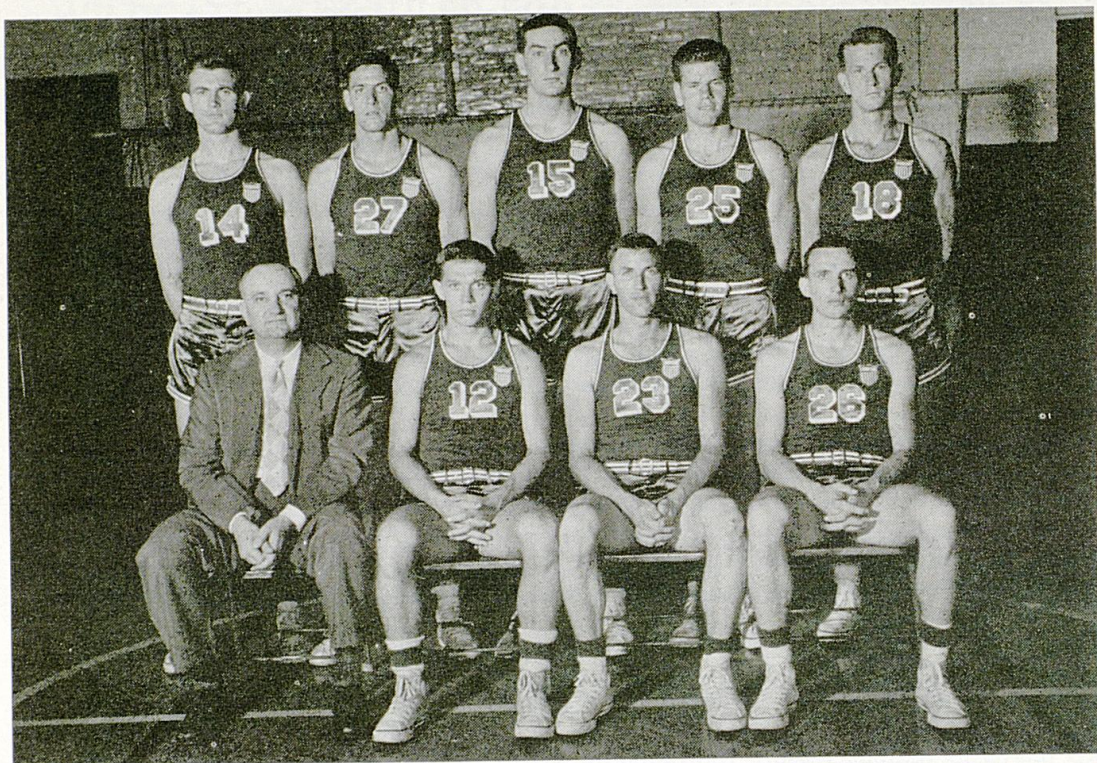
Perhaps the greatest supremacy enjoyed by any team in any sport is reflected by Kentucky's basketball success in the Southeastern Conference since 1933. Against SEC teams in regular season, tournaments and playoffs, UK has annexed a record of 447 victories and lost only 74—a winning average of 85.8 percent. The 'Cats have won 26 league championships and own over 60 team and individual records from regular season and tournament play. Only Tennessee, Vanderbilt and Florida can boast of beating the Wildcats two in a row in the same season and only Mississippi State and Alabama are added to the exclusive club when the basis is widened to consecutive wins over two or more seasons. Kentucky's record against SEC teams, including non-conference games, is shown below.

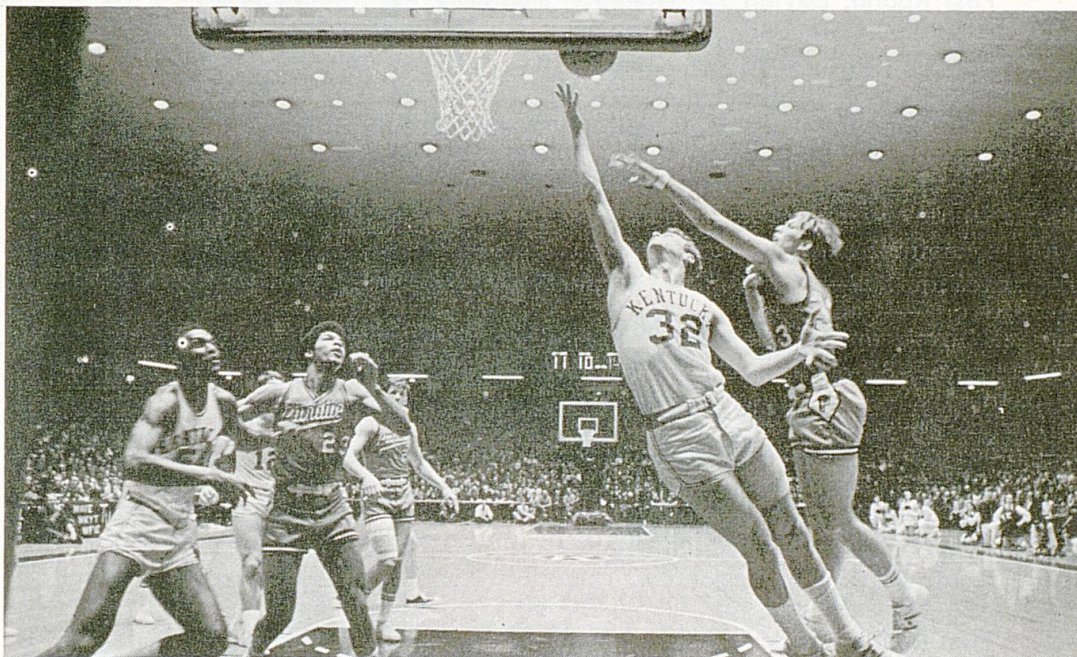

Newcomer Missouri joins returnees California and Princeton, to challenge the Wildcats, who are seeking their 13th crown in the 19th annual UKIT.

California has two wins and two losses to show for its 1960 and 1965 performances. In 1960, they lost to St. Louis, 54-53, in overtime, and won third place by defeating Illinois, 72-54. In 1965, they lost to Indiana, 71-64, and won third place by defeating Air Force, 75-70.

Princeton, which finished third in 1963 with All-American Bill Bradley setting three individual records, lost to Wake Forest, 96-67, and rebounded to edge Wisconsin, 90-87, mainly on the sensational play of Bradley, who set the tournament's individual scoring record with 47 points.

Missouri has met Kentucky only once, losing 81-69, in the Coliseum New Year's Eve, 1960, while California has never met the Wildcats.

Princeton also has met Kentucky only once, winning a New Year's Eve game in Lexington, 30-26, in 1926.

Kentucky has won 30 and lost six games in 18 previous tournaments, missing the championship game only once, in 1957, when they lost a first round game to West Virginia, 77-70.

The Wildcats beat De Paul, 106-85, in the first round and lost to Purdue, 89-83, in the championship game last year.

Wildcats Mike Casey and Tom Payne made the All-UKIT team with Larry Weatherford and Bob Ford of Purdue, and Joe Meyer of De Paul. Weatherford edged out Casey for Most Valuable Player honors.

SUCCESSOR TO A 'WHITE ELEPHANT'

Only a little more than four decades ago, the University of Kentucky provided its basketball team with its second home—a magnificent new Alumni Gymnasium seating 2,800 spectators.

A great many persons freely suggested that the arena would prove to be a "white elephant" which would never be crowded to anywhere near capacity by the sport that then was considered little more than an innocuous winter-months' pastime.

But the hardwood game blitzed the nation and Kentucky's teams forged to the national forefront in such a crowd-pleasing manner that the "huge" hall soon could not begin to accommodate the large number of fans seeking to whet their new-found interest. In fact, the situation soon developed to the point where only the student body and faculty were admitted and for several years about all that Kentuckians at large knew of their state university's famed cage teams consisted of information gleaned from the radio and newspapers.

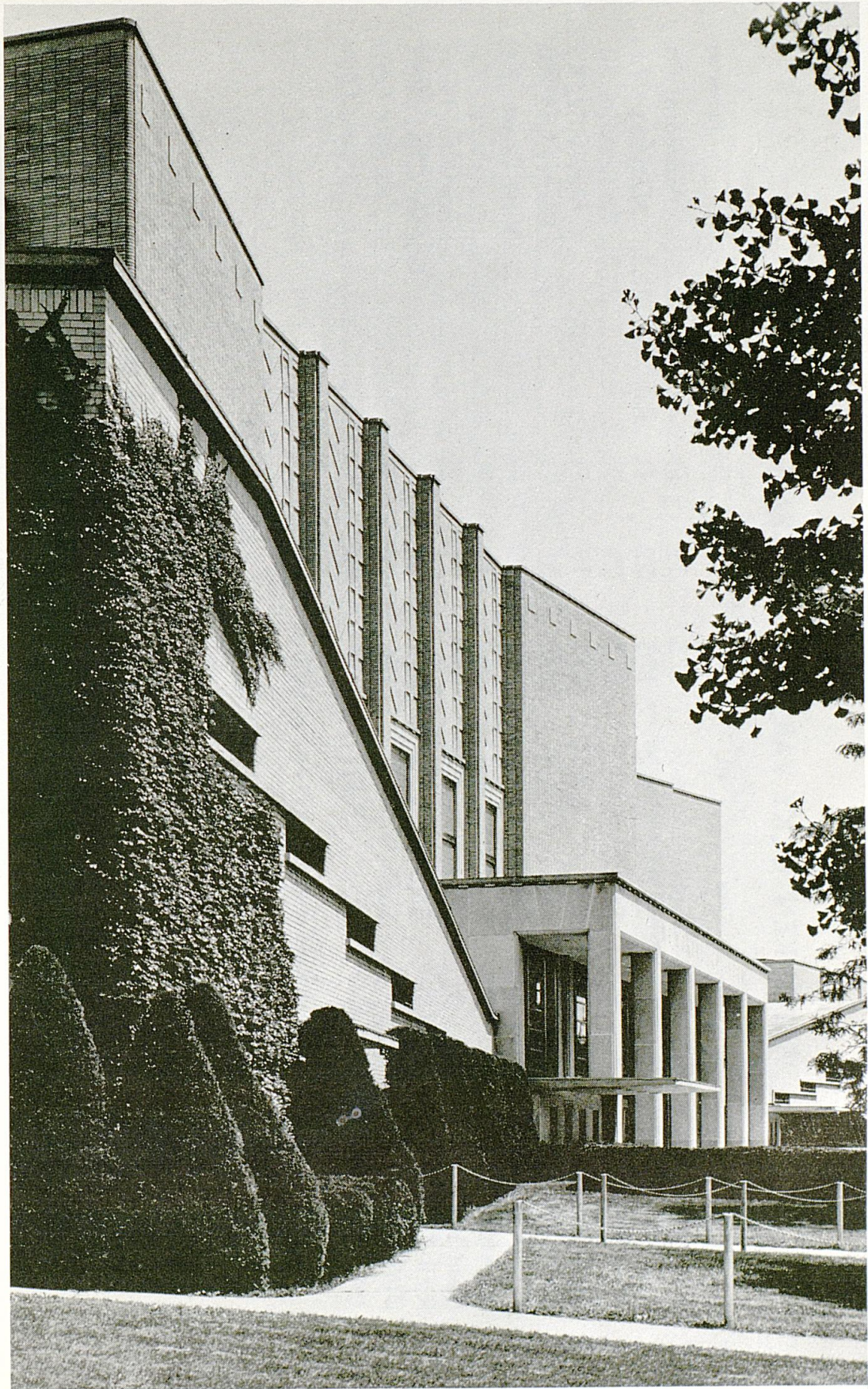
In 1941, when Dr. H. L. Donovan became president of the University, one of his first recommendations was for a building "that will properly take care of our athletics, our health service, physical education, and recreation." From this beginning came the plan that culminated in the construction of 11,500-seat Memorial Coliseum, an unparalleled edifice costing \$3,925,000 by the time it was completed in 1950.

The huge building, which serves as a memorial to the nearly 10,000 Kentucky heroes who lost their lives in World War II and the Korean conflict, covers an entire city block and contains as much space as a seven-story office building. Situated along Avenue of Champions, the Coliseum is used primarily for basketball games but also serves as the site of a sellout community concert and lecture series as well as numerous physical education classes and conventions.

In sharp contrast to the early days in Alumni Gym, the present hall plays host to approximately 150,000 Kentuckians annually for appearances of the famous Wildcat cage teams alone and interest is increasing with such strides, as evidenced by sellout crowds throughout the past several seasons, that even this splendid arena is rapidly becoming too small.

THE NCAA IN MEMORIAL COLISEUM

University of Kentucky's spacious Memorial Coliseum has been the site of portions of the NCAA Tournament eight times since its completion in 1950. First round playoffs were staged in the UK Coliseum in 1955, 1959, 1960 and 1962 while regional tournaments were held in the building in 1957, 1958, 1965, and 1968. The Wildcats played in three regional eliminations, being eliminated by Michigan State in '57; defeating Miami (Ohio) and Notre Dame in '58 en route to their fourth and last National Championship, and dropping a one-point decision to Ohio State in 1968.

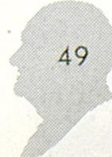

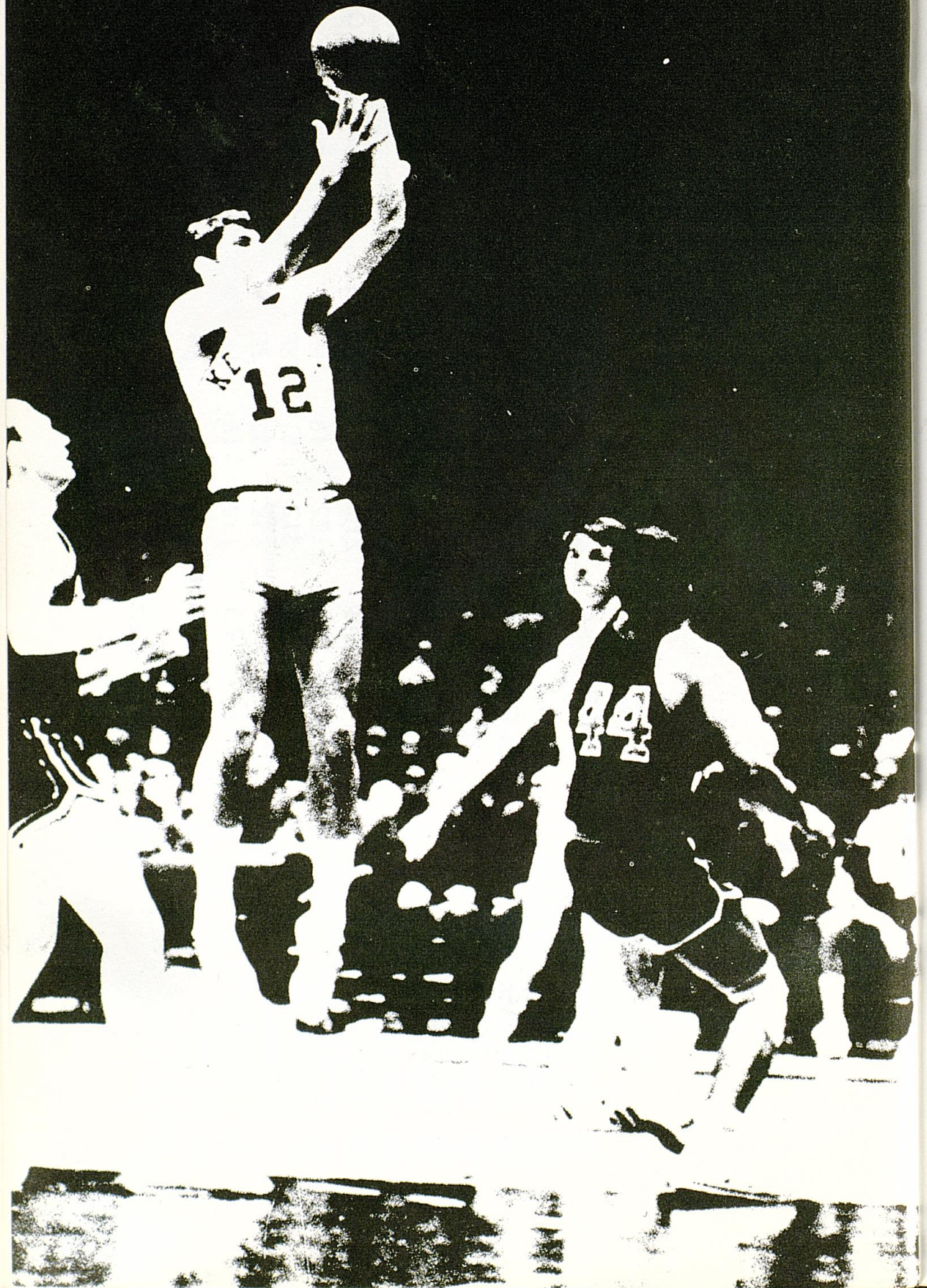

OUTLOOK: Even though John Mengelt, the Tigers' all-time scorer, graduated, coach Bill Lynn is looking for a balanced club that should be stronger on the boards and defense. If F-C Ralph Smith and F Dan Kirkland recover from knee surgery, the Tigers should be improved in '72. Henry Harris, a solid two-year performer, returns to captain the Tigers. He is joined by another all star candidate, Jim Retseck, a quick, strong rebounding forward with excellent outside shooting ability. Starting center Al Leapheart returns and his 11.2 ppg and 8.3 rebounds per game should improve, as should guard Gary England, a part-time starter who averaged 4.5 ppg. Waiting in the wings are guard Mike Christian, the SEC's leading frosh scorer last year with 25.8 ppg, and Ernie Magri, a 7-0 transfer who will add depth to the front line.

'THAT WAS NO ZONE DEFENSE!'—RUPP

Always ready with a colorful quip for doting members of the press-radio-TV corps, Kentucky Coach Adolph Rupp sent his listeners rushing to their dictionaries in 1963-64 when he came up with a colorful description of a new defense installed in early season. Sportswriters who witnessed the special 1-3-1 point defense for the first time against Tennessee in January were inclined to refer to it as a "zone." But Baron Rupp, to whom the term "zone defense" had long been one of the most abhorred in his vocabulary and a pattern never used by his Wildcats, capily denied this. "We never have used the zone at Kentucky and never intend to," he declared with tongue in cheek. "That was no zone. It was simply a stratified, transitional, hyperbolic paraboloid." STHP carried the UKats to a successful quest of the conference title and an NCAA berth. They lost only once in regular season play using the special defense—that coming in the final game with St. Louis. In an earlier upset at the hands of Alabama, the UK defense had reverted to the familiar "Man-for-Man."

KENTUCKY'S COLORS

The blue and white of the University of Kentucky are known to sports fans everywhere. Officially the colors are Yale blue and white, but in the beginning, when the Lexington institution was still known as the Agricultural and Mechanical College of Kentucky, the colors were "Stoll blue" and white. One day back in the 1890's a group of Kentucky football stalwarts met to choose their school colors. Someone suggested blue and white—"blue like Dick Stoll's necktie"—and those colors were immediately adopted. "Dick" Stoll was to become Judge Richard C. Stoll, distinguished public servant and, for more than fifty years before his death, a member of the U.K. board of trustees.

This stems from Rupp's strategy of running the strategic guard-around play of Kentucky's repertoire and the reason, Rupp explains, is simple: "It tells us immediately if the opposing team is playing a zone defense against us."

WHO WERE THE 'FABULOUS FIVE'?

The most frequently asked question tossed at basketball historians and sports authorities is "Who were the 'Fabulous Five' of Kentucky?" The answer is Alex Groza (center), Ralph Beard and Kenny Rollins (guards), Wah Wah Jones and Cliff Barker (forwards). This famous 1948 team, captained by Rollins, won 36 and lost 3 while sweeping to Kentucky's first NCAA title and went on to participate as a unit in the Olympic Games—helping the USA team capture the world championship. Rollins graduated after the '48 season, but the remaining foursome continued to play havoc with collegiate basketball and copped another NCAA title for Kentucky in 1949 on a record of 36-2.

WILDCAT MASCOTS HAD COLORFUL NAMES

Over the years, Kentucky athletic teams have been spurred on in efforts toward victory by numerous colorfully-named wildcat mascots. Records indicate the first animal was given to the University in 1921. Named "Tom," this live Kentucky wildcat died quickly from being in captivity and was replaced with "TNT." Other live mascots followed—including "Whiskers," "Hot Tamale," and "Colonel"—only to pass from the scene due to death or being turned loose in the mountains after they did not thrive out of their native habitat.
